

Russian Students Given Turndown

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—A request by 15 Russian student-educators to visit the United States has been given a polite turndown and a suggestion to try later.

The Soviet students, in a move which appeared to be a trans-Atlantic prong of the Soviet's post-Stalin cultural offensive, had asked for a chance to get acquainted with student life in America.

The U. S. government's "not now" was pinned to the date they had chosen—sometime in August. School's out in August, the rejection noted, and wouldn't some later date be better?

Officials said today the notification went last week from the U.S. embassy at Moscow to the Soviet foreign office.

The request from the 15 students came as a reciprocal gesture. As pictured, the Russians' visit would be in return for trips made to Russia by several American college editors during the past year or so.

Touhy Back In Prison After Short Freedom

JOLIET, Ill. (AP)—His bid for freedom cut short by court action, Roger (The Terrible) Touhy was back at Stateville prison Friday, still insisting he was framed in the kidnapping of John (Jake The Barber) Factor.

But Factor says he is willing to testify again against Touhy, who has served more than 20 years of a 99-year sentence for kidnapping him in 1933.

Touhy, 56-year-old Chicago gang leader in the prohibition era, was brought back to Stateville from Chicago Thursday after two days of liberty. The U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals ordered his return to prison pending outcome of the state's appeal of a federal judge's decision releasing him.

Roseburg Lumber Co. Allowed Tax Write-Off

The Roseburg Lumber Co. has been allowed a quick tax write-off for its facilities here, according to the Office of Defense Mobilization.

The company was on a new list of firms revealed to have received allowances on facilities valued at more than \$1 million. It was allowed a write-off of 30 per cent of \$1,542,905 for lumber, wood debarking and chipping facilities.

New York Paper Refuses Support Of Polio Drive

NEW YORK (AP)—Refusal of the Syracuse, N. Y. Post-Standard to support a second polio fund drive this year has brought a reiteration by fund officials that the raising of 20 million dollars is imperative.

Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said in a telegram to the newspaper "a great program created by the people is in jeopardy and the proper care of those who will have polio this summer is in danger."

The Post-Standard said in a front page editorial Tuesday that Syracuse already had given "a whopping \$150,000 to the polio drive in January" and a further appeal now was unfair to other worthy causes. The newspaper said:

"In the last year for which statistics are available, polio with a death rate of only 1.1 per 100,000 raised 51 million dollars nationally, whereas heart disease, with a death rate of 494.4 raised a mere \$6,700,000. Cancer with a death rate of 139.6 raised 18 million dollars."

"If polio is able to raise this community without consideration to the needs of others, it may well sound the death-knell of organized, scientific fund raising on a basis which is fair to all and in which all share according to needs."

In reply to the death rate figure, O'Connor declared the polio fund campaign spends much money to care for persons who get polio but do not die of it.

"Most polio victims live and require care which is expensive," he said. "We hope to be able to prevent paralytic polio through a vaccine, but until we get one, those afflicted must be cared for. This is the real purpose of the polio emergency drive."

O'Connor said the foundation has 11 million dollars on hand, but its obligations for the rest of the year amount to \$32,600,000 and it is counting on the emergency drive to make up the difference.

Doctor States Emilie Smothered In Pillow

MONTREAL (AP)—The Quebec medico-legal expert who performed an autopsy on quintuplet Emilie Dionne explained last night that she accidentally smothered herself in her pillow during an epileptic seizure.

Apparently anxious to dispel any notions that Emilie died of epilepsy, Dr. Rosario Fontaine amplified his earlier findings.

Fontaine said that following his investigation last Saturday he had announced that the 20-year-old girl "died of acute asphyxiation during an attack of epilepsy."

Two Salem Children Are Fatally Injured

SALEM (AP)—Two children died in Marion County accidents Friday.

The two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton DeLeon, was injured fatally when he ran into the side of a moving truck at Salem. The driver was identified as John Winthrop Bower, Portland.

Rhonda L. Thornton, 15-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert D. Thornton, Idanha, was crushed when a car driven by her father backed over her as she played in the driveway at their home.

Well Driller Strikes Oil Instead Of Water

DENISON, Tex. (AP)—A water well driller, completing a well 1 1/2 miles southeast of Denison, struck oil instead of water recently.

Driller J. L. McClure shut the well down Aug. 7 after bailing up a bucket of crude from 282 feet. He got in touch with the property owner, Jack Winburn, who swore him to secrecy until the find could be confirmed.

"We still need water," Winburn laughed.

Short Of Goal But Must Spur Effort, UN Told By Head

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The U. N.'s chief executive said Monday that the organization still falls short of its goals but that the threat of world destruction must spur it to work for cooperation.

Making public his 1953-54 report to the General Assembly, Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld said in a foreword:

"Such an account confirms the diversity and scope of the efforts by the governments of members to develop effective international cooperation through the United Nations. It is also a reminder of the wide gap between purpose and achievement."

Partly to blame, Hammarskjöld said, is the world itself:

"At present the organization is severely handicapped by the fact that it has to function in a world where the necessity of coexistence is as yet not fully recognized. But this is, in itself, an additional and compelling reason for doing everything possible to strengthen the United Nations. The increasing danger of destruction will sooner or later force us out of a system of balance of power into a system of peace and universal international cooperation."

16 Crewmen Bail Out Of Crippled Airplane

NEWARK, Ohio (AP)—Sixteen crewmen bailed out of their huge Air Force tanker yesterday before it crashed in a cornfield near Buckeye Lake.

The pilot, Capt. George French, 32, of Los Angeles, ordered the ship abandoned after one of its four engines caught fire and two others went dead.

Three of those who bailed out were injured—none seriously.

Studebaker To Reduce Prices By About \$100

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Studebaker Corp. says it will reduce prices by about \$100 on its 1955 models.

The announcement was made yesterday, a day after workers at the big automotive plant voted to accept a 14 per cent pay cut in a move to save their jobs and the company.

The company also said it soon may obtain a "big volume" defense contract for guided missiles.

British Embassy Wines, Dines Georgi Malenkov

MOSCOW (AP)—The British Embassy wined and dined Premier Georgi Malenkov and other top Soviet officials Wednesday night as its part of the Moscow social whirl for former Prime Minister Clement Attlee and six other visiting Labor Party leaders.

It was Malenkov's first visit to a western embassy, and more evidence of the Soviet effort to win Britain closer to Russia and away from solid alliance with the United States.

The party ate, exchanged eight champagne toasts and talked until well after 1 a.m. The Russian premier joined in Ambassador Sir William Hayter's traditional British drink to the health of Queen Elizabeth II, then proposed his own toast to "peaceful coexistence."

Johnny Ray In Portland For Theater Dedication

PORTLAND (AP)—Johnny Ray, whose unusual singing style brought him national fame, returned to Portland Thursday. He was among a party of motion picture actors and actresses.

They were here for the opening of the new million dollar Fox Theater.

Ray grew up in the Salem area and sang in Portland before becoming famous.

Jeff Richards—who was signed by the Portland baseball team in 1946, then farmed out to the Salem Senators and later went to Hollywood—was among the delegation of actors.

Others included Edward Arnold and Van Heflin.

The bills call for: Distribution of tribal funds to Indians of the confederated bands of Umpqua and Calapooias of the Umpqua Valley and the Tillamook, Coquille, Tootootoney, Chetco and Molalla tribes; and appropriation of \$206,880 for school construction on the Klamath Reservation at Chiloquin.
