

French Assembly Debate On EDC Is Postponed

PARIS (AP) — The French National Assembly's steering committee decided Friday to ask that debate on the European Defense Community treaty be put off until Aug. 26, four days later than previously scheduled.

The committee, with Premier Pierre Mendes-France present, agreed to ask the Assembly to take up the treaty and EDC policy Aug. 26 and 27 and EDC the following day.

The schedule provides that if the Premier asks for a vote of confidence on the treaty, this vote will be held after the European army debate.

The committee asked that four days, starting Aug. 26, be set aside for Assembly consideration of EDC.

Mundt And Jenkins Support Televised Hearing Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.), who presided over the internal security subcommittee which is studying various proposals for rules to guide Senate committees, particularly during investigations, Thursday strongly endorsed the televising of congressional hearings.

Critics of the way the dispute between Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and Pentagon officials was aired have contended that TV coverage of the proceedings encouraged participants to turn the affair into a "circus" production for living room audiences. Legislation has been offered to bar video cameras from such proceedings by law.

Jenkins and Mundt gave their views Thursday before the Senate internal security subcommittee which is studying various proposals for rules to guide Senate committees, particularly during investigations.

The Knoxville, Tenn., lawyer told the committee he was "wholly unschooled" on congressional investigations when he took the job of counsel last April but his experiences had given him "one or two ideas" on how to do it.

Those ideas included:

- 1) Committee hearings should be given the widest television and radio coverage if a witness demands it, if a committee votes by a two-thirds majority to admit TV cameras and transmitters or if the Senate itself, by a majority vote, votes that hearings of great "national interest" should be televised.
- 2) Congressional probes should approach as closely as possible a judicial proceeding. Thus, Jenkins testified, all parties to the controversy should be required to "file a specific bill of particulars" insofar as possible, setting forth dates, places, parties and events.
- 3) A hearing should be kept strictly "to the issues" and all evidence must be "relevant and germane."

Mundt, who took over the Senate investigations subcommittee chairmanship while the group dealt into the dispute between McCarthy, the regular presiding officer, and Pentagon officials, also came out strongly for TV coverage.

For one thing, Mundt said, televised hearings make it all but impossible for "even the most prejudiced of reporters or of newspapermen" to "slant" stories "which the readers have seen before their eyes and have listened to as it unfolded word by word."

Governors To Share In Highway Planning

SALEM (AP) — The governors of all states will have a part in preparing the new 50 billion dollar 10-year highway program that President Eisenhower will submit to Congress next January, Gov. Paul L. Patterson said Thursday.

The governor, member of a committee of seven governors appointed to work out the states' part of the program, met with President Eisenhower last Monday.

"Our committee," he said, "is asking all of the governors for data and suggestions as to how the program should be carried out. We hope to have all of this data, with recommendations, in the President's hands by Nov. 1."

The main question is how to finance the program. Suggestions, the governor said, include toll roads, federal grants, and low-interest federal loans to the states.

Of the 40,000 miles of main interstate roads, he said, about 90 percent would be relocated, with limited access.

Gov. Patterson said "the President believes the initiative should come from the states, and that's why he's asking first for the states' ideas."

Public Health Service and children's bureau throughout the country and in various other federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity for doctor applicants. For the patent adviser positions, there is no maximum age limit for higher-grade positions. The positions are principally in the Dept. of the Navy in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. 2 Harvard Profs Given Citations

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Wednesday cited Harvard professor Wendell H. Furry and Harvard researcher Leon J. Kamin for contempt.

The voice vote action came without debate after a Republican explanation by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate investigations subcommittee which questioned both men at a public session in Boston Jan. 15.

The contempt citations grew out of the refusal of the witnesses to answer some questions regarding alleged Communists with whom they worked during World War II.

Both Furry and Kamin told the subcommittee they had been members of the Communist Party but had left it several years ago.

The two cases now go to the Justice Department for a decision as to possible prosecution.

Conviction of contempt of Congress carries a maximum penalty of \$1,000 fine and one year in jail for each count.

WOULD OPEN CONTRACT

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A Pacific Greyhound Lines spokesman said Friday the company had notified the bus drivers union it wants to negotiate a new contract now to avert a possible strike next year.

The contract covers 2,150 drivers and 730 agency employees in California, Oregon, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, part of Texas and a small part of Utah.

Mendes-France Wants Changes In EDC Plans

PARIS (AP) — Premier Pierre Mendes-France Saturday sent to the other five nations of the European Defense Community treaty project a long list of changes he wants approved before France gives her ratification.

The message to Luxembourg, The Netherlands, Belgium, Italy and West Germany went by ordinary diplomatic channels. Mendes-France wished to give the other nations plenty of time to study the documents before the Aug. 19 meeting of the six foreign ministers in Brussels.

The Premier was moving ahead with his project despite the resignation of three of his ministers Friday night in protest against the decision to bring up the EDC treaty for ratification. The debate is scheduled to start in the National Assembly Aug. 28.
