

Deady-Oakland Junction Unit Opens Next Week

Traffic will be ready to roll over the Deady-Oakland Junction section of the relocated Pacific Highway early next week, according to Tom Edwards, division engineer for the State Highway Dept. here.

The contractor now is putting the finishing touches of surfacing on the unit. Paving of the Deady-Winchester section of the re-aligned highway will begin about a week later as soon as heavy equipment can be moved.

The section will be the second major piece of the relocated highway to be opened in the county. Traffic has been using the Anlauf-Divide unit for about a year.

Use of the section will mean the bypass of the first two major communities in the county to be skirted by the highway. It travels through the west edge of Sutherlin and west of Oakland, coming out about three miles north of Oakland. There, it connects to the Oakland Junction-Chenoweth Park unit of the highway, also now in use.

The length of the relocated section is 5.71 miles, according to Edwards. It will cut off three miles distance and a minimum of seven minutes driving time between the two points, he said.

The south end of the unit joins the old highway via a temporary detour just north of the overpass at Deady.

Edwards said no ceremony will accompany opening of the unit.

Glide Residents Protest Location Of County Road

Property owners on the north side of the North Umpqua River near Glide are sponsoring a petition to change the course of a county road running between Wilbur and the Lone Rock Bridge.

Mrs. Arthur Selby, Glide correspondent for 'The News-Review,' said the petitions are out in the Glide district.

County Judge Carl C. Hill said the county court has planned for the road to extend past the Robinson Bridge about a mile west of Glide, to Lone Rock. The petitions ask, instead, that the river be spanned in the vicinity of Robinson Bridge in order that the road connect with the North Umpqua Highway west of Glide.

The road, should it be completed as the county court has ordered, would cut through the site of the Harry K. Coffey Memorial Hospital for Crippled Children and Adults.

The road, which will provide access to Sutherlin-Oakland without traffic having to go through Roseburg, is planned for log hauling to Sutherlin mills.

The petitions, said Mrs. Selby, are directed to the county court.

Helen Glenn Files Suit For Accident Injuries

Helen C. Glenn has filed suit in circuit court against Larry Edgar and Agnes Sartin, seeking judgment of \$35,000 general damages, \$1,389.72 special damages, and \$2,051.02 for medical and hospital expenses.

The plaintiff alleges the defendants were negligent in a traffic collision Aug. 13, 1952, on Garden Valley Road just west of Highway 99. A car driven by Sartin rammed one driven by the plaintiff and caused permanent injuries to her, it is claimed.

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — An Enterprise, Ore. druggist, on a two-week Naval reserve training tour, was killed when his plane crashed into a field six miles north of here Tuesday.

Officials at the Naval Air Station at Geiger Field, Spokane, identified the pilot as Lt. Donald L. Ertz, 35.

He crashed shortly after taking off from the Portland Air Base on a flight to Port Angeles, Wash. Witnesses said the plane suddenly nosed over and dove straight to the ground. The plane, a Navy Corsair from Geiger Field, was one of 12 on the flight to Port Angeles.

Senate Votes Strong Anti-Communist Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Wednesday voted for a 1 1/2 billion dollar increase in the borrowing power of the Commodity Credit Corp., raising the limit to 10 billions.

It was the second increase this year and, if approved by President Eisenhower as expected, will mean a 50 per cent increase in the CCC's borrowing authority in this one year.

Able Young Actors Give Commendable Performance Of 'Mr. Roberts' Offering

A troupe of able young actors had their audience torn between laughter and tears at the Roseburg Junior High School auditorium Tuesday evening as the final show of the six-series Cascade Players, "Mr. Roberts," unfolded.

The story, too well-known to be reviewed here, was presented with a dramatic quality that made its audience forget that a troupe of college players were carrying the action.

Particularly believable in his role as "Doc," as portrayed by Clarence Suiter, Doc, the ever-present Navy surgeon, was done with the ease of a man of 40 years. Suiter, it was learned, is about 21. He made an impression on Roseburg audiences earlier, with his portrayal of the wolf in "The Moon Is Blue."

Also an audience-pleaser was Scott Lehner in the role of "Ensign Pulver." The part seemed particularly close to Lehner, and it was easy to believe he would look and act in such a manner were he a real ensign in Uncle Sam's fleet. The role was unrestrained and so was Lehner. The burden of comedy lay lightly on his shoulders.

Mark Tapscott, the "Mr. Roberts" of the play, handled his lines with ease and candor, and was particularly good in his final scenes: the leave-taking from the crew which depended upon him for guidance. Tapscott, too, has won favor with local audiences in earlier shows.

The most difficult role, and done admirably by Richard Hatt, was that of the Captain. Done in a poor-man's Queeg manner, the psychotic captain quivered and stomped his way through several sequences.

Possibly because the action called for it, the crew handled the action necessary for back-area duty sailors as if they were born to it. The show, done for the fifth time, had the look of a veteran about it.

Once again the troupe acted with a skeleton set, the major portion of it being left in Eugene. The play is to make three more appearances at the University Theater in Eugene, and those who missed the local performance would do well to see it there. The dates will run the latter part of September.

The set, used at the center-doubling, did a lot to help audiences catch important lines, and by-play that might have been lost on a deeper stage.

Those who have seen the entire series have expressed the hope the troupe will return next year. Horace Robinson, director, states that only two of the present members are leaving, which guarantees an experienced group of actors, well-seasoned and accustomed to each other and to audience reaction.

McGuire Rebutts Criticism Of Ground Observers

The coordinator of Douglas County Ground Observer Corps had a rebuttal to the comment on value of the corps Tuesday noon when he spoke to the Roseburg Kiwanis Club in the Umpqua Hotel.

Arthur W. McGuire, Winston, described the corps as protection from the leaks in an umbrella. The "umbrella" he referred to is the radar net protecting the United States from foreign air attack. McGuire pointed out that radar's effect in mountainous terrain is hampered.

It follows, he said, that the human element is needed to plug "holes" in the radar screen.

McGuire answered the comment of Col. Robert Dacey, who said a weakness of the ground observer system is its link with the Air Defense Command, rather than with Civil Defense. Only in Oregon and Washington, he explained, is that the case.

McGuire answered that the GOC is designed to put jets into the air in case of an alert. He added, though, that he considers GOC as an integral part of Civil Defense.

He followed his rebuttal with a plea to club members for support of the Roseburg GOC, located on China Wall. Air spotters, he revealed, have been standing expense of utilities at the GOC station. Six hundred dollars in the original city budget was trimmed from GOC support when the budget was defeated the second time in June.

He asked club members to consider an interorganizational committee to work up means for keeping the station operative.

Dr. John's Disappearance Political Hydrogen Bomb

BONN, Germany (AP) — Dr. Otto John's treason to the West is a kind of political hydrogen bomb. In four weeks since the Bonn republic's security chief — a noted protegee of the British Secret Service — deserted to the Soviet zone, his explosive case has:

1. Poisoned Allied — German relations and strengthened Russian diplomacy.
2. Shaken the European army project, which faces the French National Assembly's crucial vote in a couple of weeks.

3. Thrown grave suspicion that all German and Allied intelligence organizations may contain other Soviet double agents.

4. Humiliated Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's government and high Allied officers, who had worked here with John for years in top-secret anti-Communist espionage.

The human suffering from Dr. John's defection ranges from tragedy to trivia.

1. Dead by his own hand, U.S. Counterintelligence Capt. Wolfgang E. Hoeler is still a mystery figure. The German — born naturalized American had been John's school chum in boyhood. He shot himself when questioned by other CIC officers in Berlin three days after John's treason.

2. Mrs. Lucie Marlen John, seven years her 45-year-old husband's senior, has been left stranded by him in the West. For her, much public sympathy is expressed.

3. Half a dozen night club cuties are bereft of the companionship of Dr. Wolfgang Wohlgenuth, the "parlor Bolshevik" who squired John in his car into Berlin's Soviet sector the evening of July 20. Trice married, author of a book on hot trumpet playing and patron of Khrushchendam gay spots, Wohlgenuth has not risked a return to his lucrative Western medical practice.
