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## Rhee Announces 'Plan' To Drive Reds From Korea

SEOUL (AP) — President Syngman Rhee chose Korea's independence day to announce a "certain plan" for driving the Communists from North Korea, and chief of state Kim Il Sung warned his troops to guard against attack from the South.

"This is not as yet a day of liberation," Rhee told a crowd of 30,000 yesterday in ceremonies observing the ninth anniversary of Korea's liberation from Japan. "It is our hope that the United Nations will cooperate with us in pushing up to the Yalu River and in driving the Communists out of Korea," the 79-year-old President added. He did not elaborate on his "certain plan."

Kim, in an order of the day from his North Korean capital at Pyongyang, declared that "conspiratorial activities of the United States imperialism and the Syngman Rhee gang to wreck the Korean armistice and provoke a new war have become more overt."

## Clutch On Guatemala By Kremlin Revealed

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Guatemalan government overthrown in June was firmly in the grip of the shackles of the Kremlin and was to have been a Communist beachhead for infiltration of other Latin-American governments, Rep. Kersten (R-Wis.) said.

Kersten, chairman of the House Committee on Communist Aggression, announced that his committee had obtained secret documents which show former Guatemalan President Jacobo Arbenz "was in the complete control of the Communist apparatus."

He said his committee, which recently completed a study of Communist tyranny in Europe, would investigate Soviet intervention in Latin America.

## Shun Religion, Russians Warn School Teachers

MOSCOW (AP) — As a new school term approaches, Russia's teachers are being warned to stay away from religion and not to try to instill any "religious prejudices and superstitions" in the nation's youth.

The warning was published by the newspaper Teachers Gazette, which complained that some teachers have been backsliding—"get-

ting married in church, bringing their children to baptism and having ikons in their homes."

Teachers Gazette thus carried forward a newly revived and intensified antireligious campaign that is sweeping through the Soviet press.

Teachers Gazette also assailed what it termed superstitions and the "harmful influence" of the church on children.

## Cathedral Dedicated 345 Feet Underground

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Some 7,000 Roman Catholics gathered 345 feet beneath the earth's surface near here Sunday to witness the dedication of a great cathedral carved out of salt in a centuries-old mine. The ceremony climaxed a project begun five years ago.
