

Tudor Reports Water Supply Situation Good

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Undersecretary of the Interior Ralph A. Tudor said Wednesday the water supply situation remained good for most federal reclamation projects in the west as of Aug. 1, with prospects for sufficient water to mature most crops despite unprecedented drought in many sections.

Tudor said a Reclamation Bureau report "indicated that the water supply is normal and the outlook is good in the Pacific Northwest, California and most of the Missouri River Basin."

Student Work Permits To Be Revoked Sept. 1

Work permits issued to people subject to the compulsory education law will be revoked by Oakland School District, effective Sept. 1, according to Supt. James M. Cummings.

All children between the ages of 7 and 18 years are required to attend, during the entire school term, a public full-time school of the district in which the child resides, according to Oregon law.

Any child who is subject to the compulsory education law may request a work permit from the office of the superintendent of schools in Oakland—each case will be decided on its merit according to Supt. Cummings.

Value Of Timber Cut Last Fiscal Years Shows Drop

Timber amounting to 2.4 billion board feet was cut on the 18 national forests in Oregon and Washington during the fiscal year ending June 30, Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone announces. This is the second highest volume of timber cut for the Pacific Northwest Region, exceeded only by last year's record. Value of timber cut during the current fiscal year just ended — \$33,966,677 — is a decrease of \$3,658,568 from the previous fiscal year. Also, total net receipts were lower.

The 10 per cent decrease in the value of timber cut reflects generally lower stumpage prices brought about a change in market conditions as well as by lower prices received from scattered tracts of windthrown and beetle-infested timber which were more costly to log.

Net receipts of \$310,872 came from the grazing of livestock, land and power uses. The total net receipts of the 18 national forests from all sales and uses exceeded expenditures for operation, maintenance, and development by nearly \$20,750,000. A substantial share of the expenditures was invested in permanent improvements such as reforestation, range reseeded, buildings, and road construction.

Mr. Stone pointed out that in addition to the cash values received from national forests many intangibles are contributed to the local welfare. Such vital resources as water, recreation, and wildlife are good examples, he said.

Willamette Forest Leads
Individual sales contracts and permits numbering 4,960 accounted for the total income from forest products and timber cut during the year. In the two states, 65 percent of the sales amounted to \$500 or less while 83 percent were for \$20,000 or under. Forest products sales other than timber totaled 476 and produced \$50,252 of revenue.

Leading the region in value of timber cut for the fiscal year just ended was the Willamette national forest, in Oregon, with \$3,909,440. Second was the Olympic forest in Washington with \$4,310,593. Other forests exceeding the \$2 million mark were the Mt. Hood and Umpqua forests in Oregon, and the Gifford Pinchot and Mt. Baker forests in Washington.

Quadruple Amputee Will Be Married Sept. 25

PATERSON, N. J. (AP) — Clarence (Red) Mosley, the Air Force's first quadruple amputee of the Korean War, will be married Sept. 25.

Mosley, 23, revealed Tuesday his plans to wed 22-year-old Ruth Shaw, whom he met at a party eight months ago—about a year after he was discharged from Army hospitals.

Of their first date, Miss Shaw recalls: "I decided then I wouldn't bother seeing him again. But he called me for a date about a week later and I went with him."

It was in December, 1952, that Mosley parachuted from a burning B-26 over Korea. After lying four days in the snow, he was rescued from enemy territory by two South Koreans.

Severe frostbite necessitated amputation of his hands and feet. But now, outfitted with artificial feet and a metal hook for his right hand, Mosley is capable of performing all the every-day tasks. What's more, he drives his own car and bowls.

Diversion Of Filbert Crop Sales Recommended

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—Diversion from regular sales channels of 22 per cent of the Oregon and Washington filbert crop was recommended Tuesday by the Filbert Control Committee.

A crop of 9,560 tons—twice last year's harvest—has been forecast for this year, the committee reported. This would result in 143,000 bags of salable filberts compared with an expected demand of 110,000 bags.

The secretary of agriculture must approve the recommendation before it can be put in effect.

Atomic Specialists Warn Against Smuggled Bombs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Congressional atomic specialists say it is possible Russia may have devised small atomic weapons which might be slipped into this country without detection by customs agents.

The Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee made this comment Tuesday in a report on a bill to authorize up to \$500,000 in rewards for detection of attempts to smuggle A-weapons into this country.

Later in the day, the House passed the bill by voice vote and sent it to the Senate.

The measure is designed to encourage tips by holding out rich rewards for information that can be used to prevent atomic smuggling or to locate nuclear material produced here illegally.

A five-member government board would receive the information and determine how much to pay for it. The President would pass on awards over \$50,000.

Oakland High School Sets Ninth Grade Exams

Physical examinations for children entering school for the first time as well as for all students entering the ninth grade will be given at Oakland High School on Tuesday, Aug. 31, from 9 a.m. to noon, instead of on Monday, Aug. 30, as previously announced.

The office and administrative staffs are available for registration of new students, both grade levels. Parents of children entering school for the first time are reminded that their children must be present at the registration.

Attention is also called to the fact that there will be no registration of new students on Sept. 1, 2 and 3—the first three days of school.

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
