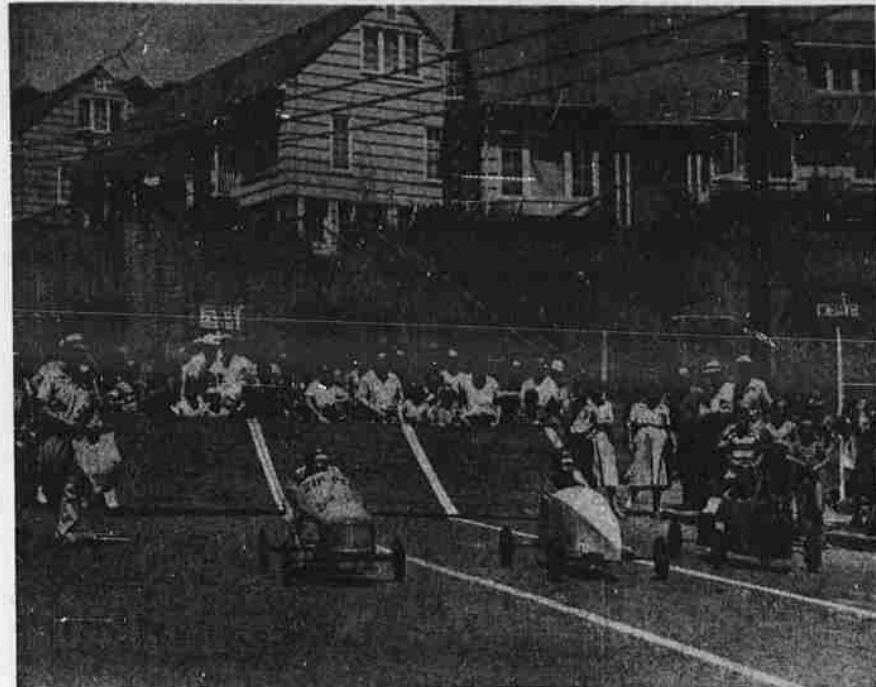


Entries Thrown Wide Open For Applebox Derby On Aug. 28; \$100 Stake In Race

The Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce's Applebox Derby, set now for Saturday, Aug. 28, is being thrown wide open to all boys and girls 14 years of age and under, and the Jaycees have announced that a list of sponsors now awaits.

The races originally were to have been run this Saturday, but due to a conflict with another Jaycee project, the swimming meet, the contest was set back a week.

The races will be run in the morning between 9 and 11 o'clock, and Chairman John Guzzo pointed out that this leaves plenty of time for county fair-goers to work up an appetite for the free barbecue at the fair at 1:30 p.m.

Guzzo said that only official Jaycee wheels will be allowed in the races, and they may be obtained from Barker's Service Station, 630 S. Stephens St. Other wheels may be exchanged there free of charge. New wheels will cost \$5.

'Bobo' Olson Sees 15-Round Decision

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—This may not be "stop the press" stuff but it is news when middleweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson makes an outright prediction.

In a question-and-answer interview that was practically pried out of the 160-pound kingpin, he said he expected to beat the No. 1 challenger, Rocky Castellani, in their 15-round title fight tomorrow night.

"I have trained hard and I have been trained for a 15-round fight," he said.

Asked if he expected to win by a knockout or a decision, he said, "I'm ready to go 15 rounds, come what may."

He has no set plan of battle. "I'm ready for any kind of fight Castellani puts up,"

He was asked what kind of a fight he expected the challenger to wage.

"From what I have read in the papers I expect him to try to jab and outstep me. If that's what he does, I'll press him all the way."

Odds makers have established Olson the 4-1 favorite.

The bout will be nationally televised except for a San Francisco blackout within a 100-mile radius from the San Francisco Cow Palace by NBC.

Starting time will be 10 p. m. EDT.

Most observers think the pulverizing body beatings Olson hands out will win him the fight. But Castellani followers see the former Luzerne, Pa., coalminer, now a Cleveland resident, as a winner due to his flashing speed.

Rocky's left jab is superior. He moves in and out and around the ring faster than Bobo. He probably is the harder hitter with a right hand.

By nightfall, the field will be cut to four players and the brackets are so arranged that all four could be from the U.S.

America's delegation is headed by Harvie Ward Jr., San Francisco; Bill Campbell, Huntington, W. Va.; Billy (Dynamite) Goodloe, Valdosta, Ga.; and Hobart Manley, Savannah, Ga.

Not to be overlooked is 41-year-old Chuck Kocis, veteran Detroit golfer who has never lost a round of golf at the London Hunt and Country Club.

The other U.S. players are John Kraft of Denver, Jim Funston of Detroit, John Veghte of Gloversville, N.Y., and H. H. Haverstick of Lancaster, Ohio.

air bases in French Morocco built in 1950 under an agreement with France as a part of our defensive setup for any future trouble.

Casa Blanca, a modern city, has a population of over 600,000. The majority are Arabs, with many French, Moroccan Jews and various other races. Casa Blanca Air Force base has a complement of 3,000 service men and 500 families of the servicemen live in Casa Blanca. Food, tobacco, soap, etc., are purchased at the commissary maintained by the Air Force. Department stores are owned by the French, but clothing is high priced, especially shoes, so the Americans make all purchases from Sears-Roebuck, Philadelphia, Pa. branch. In fact, Major Jessup stated, big business is carried on with this firm, for besides shoes and clothing, linens and other household necessities are included. There is considerable unrest in French Morocco as the Arab Nationalist party is working to get from under the yoke of the French protectorate, the major said.
