The "History of the 1951 Pennant Race" became required reading for the Milwaukee Braves today. Written into the annals of the National League by the New York Giants, this remarkable record provides convincing and recent proof that baseball miracles are possible.

Although firmly believing they are the new team of destiny, the Braves could use a little solid encouragement. They lost two out of three games to St. Louis, including a 2-1 10-inning thriller yesterday, and now trail New York by 5 1/2 games.

Even now, however, they are much better off than the Giants were at this stage three seasons ago. Milwaukee still could do it all alone, without depending on a collapse by either the Giants or Brooklyn.

It could work this way. The Braves have five games left with the Giants. They've lost five more than the Giants. A sweep of the five would cancel out the New York lead. The Braves and Brooklyn play six more times and

the Braves have lost only two more than the Dodgers.

Giants Farther Behind

In 1951, the Giants trailed Brooklyn by seven games as late as Sept. 1. They were still six games behind in the losing column on Sept. 20. Only a complete Dodger collapse in the final week paved the way to the playoff.

The Giants, apparently back in good health after a critical slump, won their third in a row, 5-0 over Philadelphia. Brooklyn again had to hustle for a 7-5 verdict over the hustling Pittsburgh Pirates. Cincinnati took two from Chicago, 7-0 and 1-0.

In the American League, Detroit and Cleveland split a twin bill. The Indians won the first game 4-3 but lost the nightcap 8-2, ending a nine-game winning streak. The Yankees whipped Philadelphia 8-5 for their 10th straight and Chicago edged Baltimore 4-3.

Cleveland now leads New York by 2 1/2 and Chicago by 8 1/2.

Boston jumped ahead of Washington in their private battle for fifth place with an 11-6 triumph. Ted Williams broke his string of 17 hitless times at bat with a single and a double. He also walked four times.

'Bobo' Favored In Title Match

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (AP) — Middleweight King Carl (Bobo) Olson of San Francisco lays his world championship on the line tonight and is a solid favorite to retain it in a 15-round match with the nation's leading challenger, Rocky Castellani of Cleveland.

The bout will be nationally televised and broadcast by NBC, with the San Francisco area blacked out of the TV picture.

The show goes on at 9 p.m., EST, at the Cow Palace.

The balding, 26-year-old Olson captured the middleweight crown from Randy Turpin of England in 1953, turned back the threat of Kid Gavilan in Chicago last April in one of his greatest fights, and he hasn't been beaten in his last 15 bouts.

The last time he was beaten, in fact, was in a bid for the title against Sugar Ray Robinson here in his adopted home in 1952.

Castellani, at 28 a seasoned ringman without much of a punch less, in fact, than the champion, who is not famous for chilling his foes — has not been whipped in 10 straight matches. He was last defeated in 1953 by Pierre Langlois.

Olson and Rocky have had 62 professional fights apiece, each has lost five, and both tined up for this struggle by belaboring a young man named Pedro Gonzalez. Rocky won a decision; Bobo ended the matter in four rounds.

Olson has been guaranteed \$120,000 by Rocky's manager, wealthy Al Naiman of Cleveland. Rocky will get 60 per cent of anything over the net above that sum.

The match will be scored under California's system of 11 points per round. An even round is scored 5-5-5. A good margin might be scored 7-4, and a genuine knockdown 8-2.

The Braves drew 48,057 to an afternoon ladies' day contest with the Cardinals, the largest crowd ever squeezed into County Stadium. Milwaukee came from behind with two out in the ninth to tie the score at 1-1. But a triple by Wally Moon and a long fly by Solly Hemus brought victory to the Cardinals in the 10th.

Bobby Feller won the 260th game of his brilliant career in the opener against Detroit with home run support from Vic Wertz and Dave Pope. The Tigers fell upon three Indian hurriers for 14 hits in the second game, including a three-run homer by Bob Nieman.

Baltimore ended Jack Harshman's string of scoreless innings at 34 by scoring three runs in the fifth but the White Sox held on for their one-run triumph, getting the winning tally in a two-run uprising in the eighth. Nellie Fox, who had a perfect day at bat with four hits, drove in the deciding run.

The Yankees got a late-inning scare from the usually docile Athletics, who knocked out Eddie Lopat with five straight hits in the eighth. But after scoring five runs the A's were checked by Johnny Sain. Philadelphia put two out before Sain finished off by getting Elmer Valo on an infield grounder.

Medal scores of each player on the two-man teams will be totaled over the 72 holes of the par 72 level Sur Le Lac course to determine the winner.

The players teed off in 11 foursomes and two threesomes for Friday's round. One more round will be played Saturday and two Sunday.

Southerners Favored In Canada Golf Meet

LONDON, Ont. (AP) — Harvie Ward and Bill Campbell, a pair of southern shotmakers who are overdue in championship competition, were favored to sweep through semifinals in the Canadian Amateur Golf Championship Friday, and clash in Saturday's final.

Ward, transplanted North Carolinian who now registers out of San Francisco, and Campbell, tall West Virginian, have played some of their finest golf in this tournament.

Both won two matches in Thursday's play over the London Hunt and Country Club course and both are firm favorites in the 36-hole semifinals.

Ward meets Lyle Crawford, 21-year-old salmon fisherman from Vancouver, B.C., while Campbell faces Harry Haverstick, three-time Pennsylvania State amateur champion from Lancaster, Pa.

Myrtle Creek Slates Eugene's Cascade Entry

The weekend's amateur baseball slate gets under way Friday night when Myrtle Creek of the Evergreen League takes a host role at Sutherlin's lighted field against Eugene of the Cascade League.

Third Offer Thought Considered By Macks

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — With the advent of a third alternative for the Mack baseball family, the future of the Philadelphia Athletics American League franchise began to take on some sort of focus Friday.

It was far from a clear picture—and still subject to sudden change—but latest developments added up to this:

The Macks have two, maybe three offers, to consider. Roy and Earle, the feuding sons of baseball's elder statesman, 91-year-old Connie, Sr., hinted Thursday at the third offer and even suggested they might bury the hatchet and accept it.

This is reported to be a local "angel" who would buy Connie's 42 per cent of the stock for \$600,000 and then invest two million rebuilding the team, fixing up the park and paying off some pressing debts.

In this setup both brothers would remain in the front office, retaining their controlling 58 per cent of the stock. A top flight general manager would be brought in, however, to handle independently the baseball end of the business.
