PORTLAND — Consumers here enjoyed lower coffee prices Wednesday as the result of the 10-cent-a-pound wholesale cut announced by some wholesalers Tuesday.

One large grocery chain reduced brand name coffee to \$1.09 a pound, then cut its two special house brands to \$1 and \$1.02. Another chain went even lower, dropping brand name coffee to 99 cents and offering its house brand for 89.

Chinese Rescued One Person Aboard Airliner

TAIPEH, Formosa (U. S. A.) — A Chinese Nationalist news agency said Wednesday the Chinese Communist navy apparently rescued one passenger aboard the British airliner shot down by Red fighters near Hainan Island July 23.

Eight persons were rescued by a U. S. flying boat, but nine others, including three Americans, are listed as missing. One passenger died soon after being rescued. The interior ministry's Taiwan News Agency, which claims ex-

tensive underground contacts on the mainland, said a seriously injured foreigner arrived in Canton Aug. 7 aboard a Communist gunboat.

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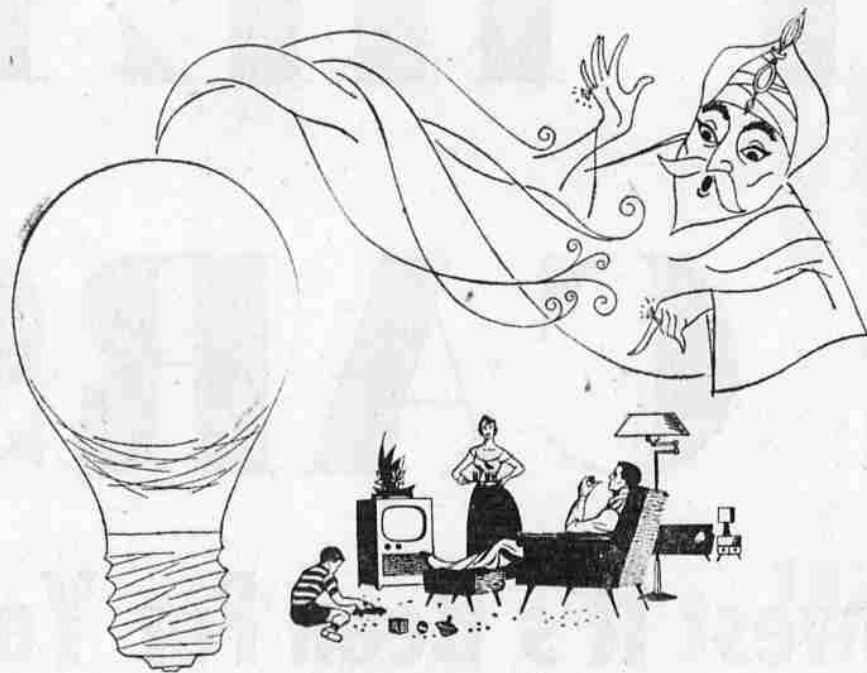


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
