LIVING COSTS UP

PORTLAND — The Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Friday that living costs in the Portland area rose six-tenths of one per cent between April and July. Recreation was up 3.3 per cent, food up 1.7 per cent, housing up .4 per cent, medical care up .7 per cent, apparel was about unchanged while transportation was down 1.8 per cent and personal care down .1 per cent.

U. S. Demands Czechs Pay For Downed Jet

WASHINGTON — The United States, accusing Czechoslovakia of acting "maliciously" and lying, has demanded \$271,384 for the shooting down of an American jet plane last year. Damages were sought for the loss of an F84 jet fighter near the boundary dividing the U. S. zone of Germany from Czechoslovakia March 10, 1953. The pilot, Lt. Warren G. Brown of Henderson, Colo., parachuted to safety. He was flying one of two U. S. planes dispatched to look into the presence of a pair of Soviet-built MIG planes near Pilsen, on the border. The State Department declared radar proved neither American aircraft left the U. S. zone at any time.

Last Of Triplets Born 20 Days Behind Others

DETROIT — A 6-pound, 10-ounce boy gained strength at Herman Kiefer Hospital today, but he had a long way to go to catch up with the other two thirds of the Braxton triplets.

The reason: he other two, both girls, were born 20 days earlier. The boy was born yesterday afternoon, completing a case extremely rare — perhaps unprecedented — in medical history.
