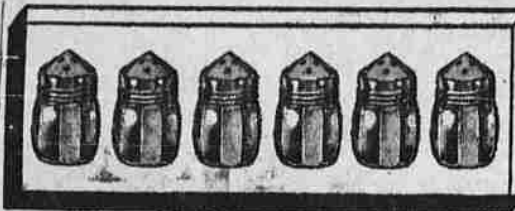

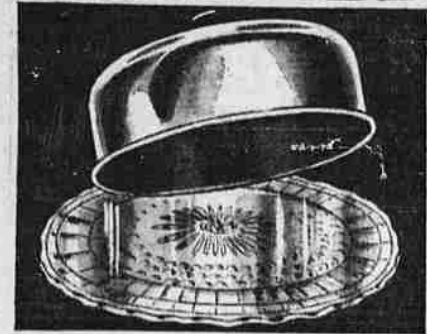

## Brazil's Iron Man Vargas Kills Self After Ouster

(Continued from Page One)

since 1951, was in line to succeed Vargas. The crisis that brought Vargas' ouster and death began Aug. 5 with the slaying of an air force major, Ruben Vaz, during an attempt to assassinate Carlos Lacerda, an anti-Vargas editor. The slaying aroused widespread indignation in both the military and the press. This grew when it was discovered that members of Vargas' personal body guard were involved. Vargas dissolved the guard.

The crisis broke into rioting Aug. 11 following a mass for Maj. Vaz. Two persons were injured and campaign posters for Vargas' Brazilian Labor Party were torn down. "Vargas out!" shouted the mob. The military acted quickly to prevent further disturbances. The army, navy and air force issued a joint declaration pledging their support of the constitution.

Meantime the air force and police arrested Climerio Eurides de Almeida, member of the guard, and Jose Antonio Soares, a palace employe as involved in the Lacerda plot. They also seized Joao Alcino de Nascimento, as the alleged trigger man.

The situation arose at a time Brazil was undergoing severe economic stress. Last week the price of coffee was forced down, and there have been predictions of further blows against Brazilian currency.

The air force, with Vargas' permission, obtained the personal papers of Gregoria Fortunato, husky former head of the disbanded presidential guard, and these papers may have provided material for the final push against Vargas.

every opportunity to reconsider a fact-finding committee.

Elsewhere in the strike there were these developments Monday:

About 1,500 workers went back to work at Oregon plants under varying wage agreements. Largest group was the 750 AFL workers who returned to the big C. D. Johnson operation at Toledo under the practice wage scale pending an industry-wide settlement.

Some 600 APT employees were back at work at the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. plant at Coos Bay at a 2 1/2-cent increase which raised their minimum wage to \$1.90 an hour.

Weyerhaeuser was paying 5 cents an hour more than most other operators when the strike began. The minimum rate varied in the industry but averaged about \$1.82 an hour.

AFL workers were back on the job at the Cape Arago Lumber Co., also at Coos Bay, with a 5-cent hourly increase.

Meanwhile at Hoquiam, Wash., 29 CIO union members and officials were ordered to appear in court Wednesday after a mass demonstration outside the Rayonier Inc. pulp plant. Earlier a superior court ruling had limited the union to four pickets at the plant.

is now on the same legal plane as her husband may sue the latter for a personal tort." He related, however, that this statement was made when it did not directly apply to the case being studied.

Goldstein said, "It must be confessed that the comment by Justice Bell... is provocative in its timing and perhaps suggests, if not encourages, the submission of a case of this nature to the Supreme Court."

He continued that "nearly every state" has adapted legislation enlarging the rights of married women and relieving a wife of common law disabilities which are not imposed on the husband.

But he countered with the strict separation of legislative and judicial. He said upholding the Smith action would to him "amount to judicial legislation." He said it may be in the future that the Legislature may desire to further enlarge the rights of married women, even to the extent of abolishing the common law fiction of merger of unit. But he said it should be "positive" and in terms of "irresistible clearness."

## Rain, Cooler Weather Lowers Threat Of Fires

Rain and cool weather in the county temporarily lowered forest fire danger.

Only fire reported was found Sunday by Umpqua Forest smoke chasers in the Bohemia District near Layne Creek. According to U. S. Forest Service personnel, the smoldering blaze had been started more than a week ago from an earlier storm.

The men quickly put out the fire which smoldered in some logs and an old snag. No fires were reported by the Douglas Forest Protective Assn.

## Newby Rules McCall Didn't Violate Law

SALEM (AP)—Secretary of State Earl T. Newby ruled Tuesday that the campaign committee of Tom Lawson McCall didn't violate the spirit of the State Corrupt Practices Law.

The charge that McCall, who won the Republican nomination for Congress in Multnomah County, violated the law, was made by Howard Morgan, state Democratic chairman.

Morgan said that the expense statement for the primary election, listing the expenses of McCall's campaign, was untrue.

Morgan made similar charges in connection with the campaigns of Sen. Guy Cordon and State Sen. W. Lowell Steen, Milton-Freewater.

Newby has rejected all the charges now except those against Steen.

Newby said he would rule soon on the Steen charges.

## Another Hot And Humid Day Expected For Nation

Another day of hot and humid weather was the outlook for most of the mid-continent, Tuesday. Temperatures were in the 90s and high 80s over much of the central states Monday and Tuesday's forecast was for similar readings. It was 99 in Nashville and 85 in Chicago. The hottest weather was in the Southwest with temperatures of 100 and higher reported.

## Defense Dept. Calls For Doctors, Dentists

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department called on selective service Monday to furnish 550 physicians and 150 dentists next December.

It was the first request to selective service for physicians since last June and the first for dentists since February.

## TEMPERATURE LOW

Temperatures for the Umpqua Valley will remain below normal for the next five days, according to the U. S. Weather Bureau. Maximum temperatures will remain in the 70's and low 80's with minimum temperatures ranging from 45-50. A few showers will occur early in the period and again about Sunday.

## Deady-Oakland Junction Strip Open To Traffic

Automobile and truck traffic began traveling this morning over a brand-new section of the relocated Pacific Highway.

Tom Edwards, division engineer for the State Highway Dept., said the Deady-Oakland Junction unit of the highway was opened at 11 a.m. Minor work still is to be completed along the route. Shoulders won't be girded until completion of the Deady-Oakland Junction unit in about a month. Winchester unit in traffic markers will be installed while vehicles are using the highway.

Paving on the section, which bypasses Oakland and Sutherlin, was finished late last week. It's 5.7 miles long, cutting approximately three miles from the old route. Edwards says a minimum of seven minutes will be saved between Deady and Oakland Junction.

Paving work on the Deady-Winchester unit will be started just as soon as heavy equipment can be moved from Deady to Winchester, Edwards said.

Proctor was released Monday after he posted \$750 cash bail and \$250 bail bond.

## Traffic Delays Noted Along Oregon Highways

Construction delays are being noted on three Douglas County highways in this week's report from the Oregon Highway Commission.

## Annie Moss Asks To Meet Accuser

WASHINGTON (AP)—Mrs. Annie Lee Moss, again denying Communist ties, has asked the Army to produce her accusers at a security screening board hearing.

"I am not a Communist, have never been a Communist and have no communistic leanings or sympathies," the Negro woman said in a notarized reply to the latest charges against her.

The Army suspended Mrs. Moss for a second time Aug. 4 from a job with the Army Signal Corps. It said it acted "on the basis of information which was not previously available."

Mrs. Moss was temporarily suspended last spring from her \$3,325-a-year position after Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) brought up her name at an investigation of alleged Communists in the Army. She denied before McCarthy's Senate Investigations subcommittee that she was the Annie Lee Moss said in a notarized reply to the latest charges against her.
