persons were reported injured in that incident. Hospitals in another section reported treating at least 10 persons for injuries in clashes with authorities.

Windows of the Standard Oil Co. building were smashed and crowds gathered at the U. S. Embassy, which was placed under heavy guard.

Many rioters, apparently sparked by the Communists as well as traditional anti-U.S. feelings, blamed the United States for fomenting the crisis which brought Vargas' downfall.

Obviously, too, the rioters were incited by the 600-word suicide letter Vargas wrote just before his death yesterday, in which he spoke of "a subterranean campaign of international groups joined with national groups revolting against the regime of workers' guarantees."

After writing the letter, the 71-year-old strong man put a bullet through his heart. Only a short time before, a group of 38 air force and army generals had forced him to quit his post.

Since the beginning of World War II, Vargas had been a staunch ally of the United States, first against Germany and later against communism.

Brazil's new President, 55-year-old Joao Cafe Filho, who automatically stepped up from the vice presidency, is regarded similarly favorable to the United States.

Vargas' body was to leave by plane today for burial at his native city of Rio Grande do Sul in southern Brazil.

Because he died a suicide, Roman Catholic authorities denied him religious rites.

Eight days of mourning were decreed throughout the nation. An estimated 100,000 of the Brazilian masses from whom Vargas since his death has been reported followed throughout the night past the bier in the presidential palace. They waited for hours in double lines stretched for 10 blocks on both sides of the street outside.

## Official Of CIO Dies After Fight; Assailant Sought

CLEVELAND (AP) — A CIO official beaten in what looked like a street fight was killed near his home Tuesday night.

Police Wednesday started checking more than a thousand automobile license plates in a hunt for the assailant of Raymond G. Weirouch, 36, chief steward for the CIO United Auto Workers Union at the Iron Fireman Co.

Joel Liba, 11, who was walking on the way to a store at the time of the fight, gave police part of the license number on the car the assailant drove away in.

Walter Hahn, who watched the fight from a nearby porch, said Weirouch pulled his car to the side of the street and started to get out, apparently knowing he was being followed.

A second car, Hahn continued, stopped at the corner and the driver ran over to Weirouch. "Weirouch seemed to be off balance when the first blow hit him," Hahn added. "They seemed to struggle back and forth for about five minutes with the assailant using nothing but his fists. "I figured it was just a street fight and I didn't want to get involved. When Weirouch fell to the ground I started off the porch to help him and the other man ran back to his car and sped away."

Police discarded a theory the attack may have been linked to union trouble at the plant.

## 2 Women Claim They Saw Flying Saucer, Pilot

OSLO (AP) — Two Norwegian women claim they not only had a close look at a flying saucer but they talked to its "dark-skinned, long-haired" pilot. The women, Aasta Solvang and her sister Edith Jacobson, said the saucerman popped out at them from behind some bushes last Friday near Mofjell, in northern Norway.

Their story was published by the local paper Nordlands Folkeblad. This was the sisters' account: "We were picking berries when suddenly a dark man with long hair — but otherwise looking very much like an ordinary human being — came out from behind some bushes.

"We were frightened at first, but the man appeared very friendly, and stepped toward us." One of them addressed him in English, French, German, and Norwegian. "He didn't seem to understand a word."

The stranger then attempted to communicate by drawing "circles and what looked like pictures of heavenly bodies" on a piece of paper. The stranger finally led them to his craft, which looked like two deer's snappers sandwiched together, about 15 feet across.

The mystery man opened a hatch and crawled into the disc. Moments later the craft "rose from the ground and began rotating, first slowly, then increasingly faster." Then, suddenly, it disappeared at an "incredible speed."

## Air Force Man's Death Is Laid To Terrorists

CHANUTE AIR BASE, Ill. (AP) — Officials at Chanute Air Force Base have reopened the investigation of the pistol death June 6 of an airman, hitherto considered accidental, and linked it to the terrorist Pacheco society.

Maj. Gen. Byron E. Gates, commander of this technical training base of 15,000 men, said an airman held for questioning in the slaying is an admitted Pacheco. He is one of 50 gang members held in the stockade.

The roundup of the 50 on the base followed offenses which Gates said ranged from AWOL to marijuana addition and to "savage assaults on members who had 'rat'ed on Pacheco."

He described the 50 airman as "arrogant" and "faithful to the laws of Pacheco." Many of the men will be given court-martials and dishonorable discharges as a result of the investigation, he said.

## Mao Asks Attlee To Help Change Policy Of U.S.

PEIPING (AP) — Mao Tze-tung, chairman of the Chinese People's Republic, reportedly has appealed to former Prime Minister Clement Attlee and his Labor party delegation for help in bringing about a sweeping reversal of United States foreign policy.

Planned by the top men of his government, Mao received Attlee and the other seven Laborite leaders now visiting China for a three-hour interview Friday. It was the Chinese Communist chief's first close personal contact with Western statesmen.

Reports reaching me said the main points discussed between Mao and Attlee were that (1) the U.S. 7th Fleet should be withdrawn from the straits between Formosa and the Chinese mainland; (2) armament of Japan and Western Germany should cease, and (3) Britain should try to persuade America to take a more "reasonable" attitude toward Communist China.

After the interview, Labor Party Secretary Morgan Phillips gave out this brief, guarded statement: "The discussions ranged over a variety of subjects of mutual interest, including trade. The discussions were frank throughout and the meeting ended in an atmosphere of cordiality and expressions of good will."

## Logging Truck Wheels Roll Over Loader's Legs

A Myrtle Creek "second loader" was rushed to Forest Glen Hospital Wednesday morning after his left leg was run over by the rear drivers on a logging truck, reports News-Review Correspondent Ruth Evans.

The injured man, Marvin Clausen, about 30, was an employe of UPCO Logging. Hospital personnel told Mrs. Evans the extent of Clausen's injuries known by 10:15 a.m. Wednesday was a compound fracture of the left leg. He was also reported in slight shock.

According to reports Mrs. Evans received, Clausen was reaching under the truck to throw another binder around the center of the logs when the accident occurred. He was injured about 7:30 a.m. on Salt Creek Road Landing, eight miles northeast of Tiller, Mrs. Evans said.

Witnesses said the driver of the truck, who was not identified, did not realize that Clausen was there and drove the truck ahead. This caused the rear drivers on the truck to run over Clausen's leg.

The injured man was taken to Forest Glen Hospital by Ganz Ambulance Service of Myrtle Creek.

## Salvage Crew Raises Tug At Bonneville Dam

PORTLAND (AP) — A salvage crew Tuesday raised the tug Mule Duzer which sank near Bonneville Dam Friday with the loss of five lives.

The tug, apparently not badly damaged, was to be towed to Portland for repairs.

It was swamped in turbulent spillway water on the downstream side of the dam. The bodies of three victims still were sought.
