Farm Forestry Talked At Meet

"Farm Forestry very simply means managing our farm woodlands so we can grow the most per acre possible," County Extension Forester Ed Gilden told a group of Glide Kiwanis members at a Tuesday dinner meeting at Glide.

Gilden explained the working of the farm forestry program, citing several examples of actual practices by Douglas County farmers and woodland owners. He noted the practice of Bill Updegrave, a Glide Kiwanis member, who owns woodland in the North Umpqua Country. "Less than 15 per cent of the total volume of the stand was removed, but with so few trees removed there is little danger of windthrow or sunscald. He has a high quality stand of trees left that will start growing faster now than they have been thinned."

Gilden used several other examples of woodland farming, and remarked that the owners were following the two basic steps of farm forestry: "raising timber as a crop, and having every acre in full production."

Gilden was guest speaker at the dinner meeting, which is a regular monthly affair for the Glide Kiwanians. Future guests will be announced later.

ing for the start of the fair, but Fair Manager Dick Turley pointed out that all exhibits this year will be under roof. Barns are completely roofed, and nearly all activities are to be held either in the pavilion or in front of the sheltered grandstand.

Judging of exhibits is scheduled to begin first thing Friday morning. The remainder of Thursday is being reserved for exhibitors to put their property in place.

The first act of a full entertainment schedule is set for tonight. At 7:30, the elimination rounds of a talent show, jointly sponsored by the County Fair Board and Ott & Rickette Music Store, are expected to be run off. Other rounds will be on Saturday and Sunday.

A carnival was being set up on the fairgrounds today, and it will run through the four days of the fair. Square dancing on the slab of the still-building community building on the west side of the grounds will be held every evening.

Also on Friday, designated Farmer's Day, the second annual Douglas Sheep Dog Trials and a tractor-pulling contest will be held in front of the grandstand at 2 p.m. Some 4-H contests will be held on Friday, also.

Saturday afternoon, a free barbecue will be held in front of the grandstand. Sporting demonstrations by Umpqua Bowmen and Roseburg Rod and Gun Club members will follow. At the same time, a junior fair livestock auction, sponsored by Roseburg Rotarians, will be held. In the evening, horse racing will be the feature of the fair for the first time in ages. A jackpot rodeo will be run off in conjunction with it.

On Sunday, racing and the rodeo will be held again in the afternoon. In the evening, an auto thrill show is billed.

All special entertainment is free of admission charge, according to Fair Manager Dick Turley. Admission at the main gate to the fairgrounds, however, is 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

around restriction of facts to be studied, the fact that any decision would have to be ended and the men go back to work despite possibility of delays and a panel "trigged against labor."

But, he said, he was making a counter proposal calling for arbitration with an impartial chairman, the decision to be binding on both sides.

The meeting came in the wake of these developments:
1. A Longview, Wash., AFL, Plywood Workers Union local voted 183-27 to accept the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co.'s offer of a 2½-cent-an-hour increase. The same offer, however, by 560 Weyerhaeuser employees at Snoqualmie Falls, Wash., voting in a secret ballot.

2. Pickets formed a human chain across the road from the Weyerhaeuser pulp mill at Everett, Wash., when 150 AFL Pulp & Sulphite Workers Union members changed shift Wednesday afternoon. The pickets broke it up when police told them they could not block a public road and night shift workers entered the plant.

3. A Superior Court judge ruled a mass picketing demonstration at the Rayonier Pulp plant at Hoquiam, Wash., last week was contempt of court but continued the hearing and said unions and individuals would have a chance to purge themselves.

4. The King'sley Lumber Co. of Portland, charging breach of contract filed suit in federal court for \$84,000 strike damages against AFL Local 2881. The plant was closed June 24, and the company seeks \$2,000 a day for every day the mill remains closed. The Oregon Board of Conciliation and Atty. Gen. Robert L. Thornton conferred at Portland on procedure for the board's investigation of the 66-day strike.

5. At McCleary, Wash., members of Local 2761, AFL Lumber and Sawmill workers rejected a proposal by the Simpson Logging Co. the 600 striking men return to work at rates prevailing when the McCleary operation was closed by strike. Simpson had assured employees the company would adjust the wage scale to correspond with the majority settlement in the fir industry.

The Longview vote ratified an agreement reached last Saturday and was considered an encouraging sign. The pact included a two-year contract.
