Dental Benefits For Outpatients Again Given Vets

Two groups of veterans again are entitled to additional Government paid outpatient dental benefits, Veterans Administration announced today.

VA has just completed an interpretation of Public Law 494, 83rd Congress, that was enacted July 15 last. Under the law and as a result of VA's interpretation, eligibility for additional dental benefits was established for the following two groups.

1. Disabled World War II and post - Korea veterans, undergoing vocational rehabilitation under Public Laws 16 and 894, who need care for dental disabilities or conditions in order to prevent interruption of their training; and,
2. Spanish-American War veterans including those of the Philippine Insurrection and the Boxer Rebellion, who need outpatient care for dental disabilities or conditions.

Public Law 494 excludes the "two groups from the restrictions of the Independent Appropriations Act for 1955 - especially that which states veterans with noncompensable service-connected dental disabilities or conditions must show they existed at time of discharge. For the latter veterans the Appropriations Act further stipulates they must apply to VA for dental care by December 31, 1954, or one year after discharge, whichever is later. Public Law 494 also removes this filing restriction for PL 16 and 894 trainees and for Spanish-American War veterans. VA's interpretation of PL 494, which became effective yesterday, further removes the restriction of "one-time" dental treatment for these two groups. Now both groups may apply for dental care at any time and may be furnished needed treatment on a recurring basis instead of only once.

Approximately 57,000 Spanish-American War veterans and 25,000 PL 16 and 894 trainees comprise these two groups at present.

Portland FHA Office Resumes Issuing Loans
PORTLAND (AP) - The Portland office of the Federal Housing Administration has resumed issuing home loan insurance commitments, Guy J. Arrington, director, reported Tuesday.

The office halted work on pending applications Aug. 2 so new regulations governing home loans could be clarified. Arrington said that under the new regulations the FHA will insure as much as 90 per cent on the first \$9,000 of a loan and 75 per cent on the rest. Repayment has been extended to 30 years in some cases and mortgages may be for as much as \$20,000. He said the backlog of applications on hand would be cleared up as soon as possible.

New Journalism Building Ready For Fall Term

Journalism students at the University of Oregon will start classes this fall in a brand new building - a building designed especially to meet the needs of modern journalism education.

Eric W. Allen Hall, the University of Oregon's newest building and the home of the school of journalism, will be completely finished and furnished by the time fall term opens on the campus. Freshmen arriving for New Student Week, Sept. 19 to 25, and old students who register during the same week, will be accommodated in the new hall.

Journalism school officers already have been moved into the new building, which, according to Dean Gordon A. Sabine, is being completed ahead of schedule. Formal dedication ceremonies are planned for Oct. 9.

Named after the first dean of the University Journalism school, Allen Hall is one of the largest journalism education buildings in the United States and one of the

few buildings planned and constructed for journalism classes. Completed at a cost of \$550,000, it is a modern three-story-brick-faced structure. A feature of the building is the Eric Allen Memorial seminar room, a partial reproduction of the living room of Dean Allen's home, where he met often with students while dean of the school, from 1916 until his death in 1944.

Complete laboratory facilities are included for advertising-copywriting communications research, typography, copyediting, photographing and newsprinting. Facilities also include a radio - television broadcasting studio, reading - reference room, and auditorium with motion picture projection booth.

Offices of the Oregon Daily Emerald, student newspaper, are on the third floor of the building. State headquarters of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Assn. and Oregon State Broadcasters Assn. are also in Allen Hall.

SCOUT SITE CHOSEN

With the monsoon rains of July and August, flooding ravines the animals have been forced from their usual haunts to the more heavily populated highlands.

Contracter Views Yukon Dam As Not Too Difficult

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) - Harry Morrison of the worldwide contracting firm, Morrison-Knudsen, does not regard possible development of hydroelectric power at the rapids of the Yukon River as too difficult.

Morrison said here Tuesday Alaskans should push for preliminary surveys and studies now so information will be available when the time is ripe for construction. Morrison and his wife, Ann, and Mr. and Mrs. Paul Nations were here to look over M-K projects in the Fairbanks area before departing for Anchorage. Nations is editor of the Emkayan, the company's monthly magazine.

Flying in a company plane, the Morrisons visited Kitimat, B. C., to view Alcan power generators. From there they flew to Labrador where they inspected a new rail road. Before that they toured the Near and Far East where they looked at dozens of M-K projects.
