

Grand American Shoot To Open

VANDALLA, Ohio — They hold the dress rehearsal Thursday for the clay-target sport's greatest show at the 35th Grand American Trapshoot.

The event is the preliminary handicap, a 100-target affair in which the shooters are placed according to their ability from 17 to 25 yards back of the traps from which the targets emerge.

The contest, expected to attract more than 1,700 shooters, is patterned exactly after Friday's Grand American handicap. The No. 1 event in trapshooting, the preliminary carries a guaranteed prize of \$1,000 to the winner, but he may pick up an extra six or eight thousand in various purses.

Although the preliminary and the "roaring grand" are exactly the same, the difference in practice is about the same as that between the 5th race at Louisville and the Kentucky Derby.

In 54 years only one man has been able to win both the preliminary and the Grand American in the same year. R. R. Barber of Paulina, Iowa, turned the trick in 1905 with 98 in the preliminary and 99 in the grand.

The big clay target carnival wound up its 16-day events Wednesday by deciding its class championships. The 16-yard races covered 600 targets per entry and a total of 675,000 of the clay were thrown.

Wednesday's big star was Arnold Riegger, 34-year-old, 5-foot-10, 200-pound bachelor from Seattle, Wash. He broke 400 targets at 16 yards Wednesday, wrapping up the "champion of champions" title over 36 other state champions and adding the double A class laurel to his long string of victories.

He broke 200 extra targets without a miss after tying seven others in the champion of champions race and needed an extra 125 in a row to take the double A title after being deadlocked with five others at 200. The events were spread over two days.

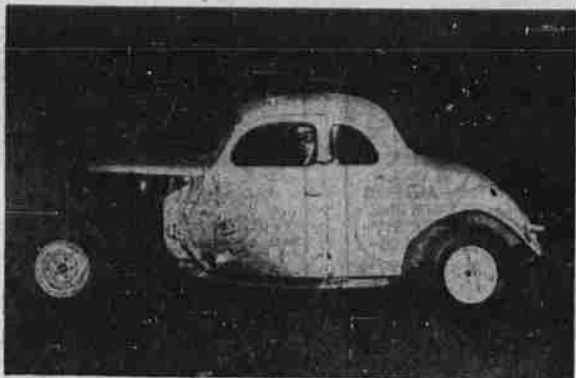

U. S. Border Patrol Positions Now Open

The U. S. Border Patrol has an urgent need for a large number of physically fit young men who would like a career in Federal law enforcement work, according to Roseburg Postmaster Clyde W. Carstens.

To secure enough qualified candidates for early appointment, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, in cooperation with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, is undertaking a recruiting program in the Portland area, Carstens said.

Representatives of the U. S. Border Patrol will furnish information to anyone interested in making application for the position of Patrol Inspector at Room 108 in the U. S. Courthouse Building, S. W. Broadway and Main, Portland.

Beginning salary of Patrol Inspector (Trainee) is \$3,795 per year. After satisfactorily completing a year of intensive training, a new officer's salary is raised to \$4,205. Further advancement can be achieved through regular with-in-service examinations. All appointments being made now are indefinite, and will be for service on the Southern Border of the United States.

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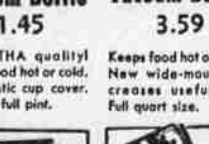
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
