

### North Roseburg Church Slates Ground Breaking

The North Roseburg Church will celebrate its fifth anniversary in Roseburg by breaking ground for a new two-story educational building at ceremonies to be conducted at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, The Rev. Kenneth Dooley, pastor announced today.

The new building, to be constructed before next spring, will contain 12 classrooms for Sunday school, a church office, a pastor's study, a church kitchen and dining room and eventually will house kindergarten students. While plans for the kindergarten are still nebulous, the Rev. Mr. Dooley said it is hoped care can be provided for pre-schoolers with only a nominal fee being charged.

Dooley stated that one Sunday each month has been set aside as building fund Sunday, and all offerings are turned over to the building fund. To date, each Sunday has seen double the usual offerings.

The ceremonies in connection with the ground breaking will see several Evangelical United Brethren conference heads present. The Rev. E. A. Fogg, senior conference superintendent for the Oregon district, will be speaker of the day. The invocation will be offered by the Rev. Floyd Sartwell, director of conference missions; the dedicatory prayer will be offered by the Rev. Dean L. Vermillion; and the benediction pronounced by the Rev. A. D. Campbell. The Rev. Leo M. Thornton will read scripture and Mrs. Thornton will sing a solo number. Also included on the program are musical numbers by the North Roseburg Church male quartet.

Lou Metzger, Roseburg contractor, will have charge of construction of the new building. The Rev. Mr. Dooley said the building is the first of two which is planned for construction for the church. The other will be a sanctuary to replace the one being used at present. Construction will be of frame with a brick trim.

### First Graders' Registration Set For Sept. 3

Registration for all first graders entering school this fall in School District 4 has been set for Sept. 3. Asst. Supt. Marvin Smith said Thursday that parents should accompany their children to the school building the youngsters will attend. Registration will be between the hours of 9 a.m. and noon.

During registration, the teachers will provide information concerning the bus schedule, need school supplies the youngsters should bring and other matters of interest to the parents.

Smith said the school would need to record children's addresses, parents' names and telephone number, health history and general information concerning the youngsters' pre-school experience.

Children eligible to enter the first grade this fall must be 6 years old on or before Nov. 15. Parents must bring birth certificates to verify their children's age, Smith said.

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### Ellsworth Reports Heavy Work Load In Congress; Nine Of Ten Bills Passed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore) reports the past session of Congress put a heavier work load on his office than any previous session in his 12 years as a member of the House.

In a report to constituents, published in the Congressional Record, Ellsworth said one reason for the increased activity was that several improvement projects in his district, after being under study for a period of years, reached the point of congressional authorization.

He listed 10 bills or resolutions introduced by him which were passed by the House. Nine of these also passed the Senate and either have been signed by, or await signature of, President Eisenhower.

The lone exception was the Eisenhower-endorsed bill to authorize construction of Cougar Dam jointly by the federal government and the Eugene Water and Electric Board.

Three of the Ellsworth proposals were included in the omnibus authorization bill for rivers and harbors projects. These authorized inclusion of power generation at Cougar Dam on the McKenzie and at Green Peter Dam on the South Santiam, construction and maintenance of a harbor at the mouth of the Rogue River at Gold Beach, and a water-use and flood control survey in the Coos County area.

Congress also approved his proposal, made jointly with Sen. Gordon, to settle the controversy over jurisdiction of the vast Oregon and California railroad grant lands and bring about distribution of some million dollars of impounded timber receipts of 18 Western Oregon counties.

Other approved bills would: Set up the mechanics for distribution of some three million dollars owed by the government, under a court decision, to various Oregon coastal Indian bands. Permit banks to make loans on timber lands.

Authorize construction, operation and maintenance of the Talent Division of the Rogue River Basin reclamation project together with rehabilitation of the Medford and

all students taking physical education; (c) class fees are listed below for the various classes and departments. Students taking any of the courses listed must pay the stated fee. Fees are for rental of some textbooks which students are not required to purchase and for magazines and supplies used in magazines and supplies used in woodwork, industrial arts, shop, etc., \$1 per student; homemaking classes \$1 per student; agriculture classes \$1 per student; English-social studies (see covers books and magazine costs for both classes and book rental for English Literature units for all grades \$1 per student; sophomores will be charged only 50 cents as they do not take a social studies class.

2. A charge is made for the following items which Sabin points out are not required, but are strongly recommended: (a) student insurance which covers students while under school supervision except for inter-scholastic athletic events and practices, \$1.50 per student; (b) student body membership card, \$3. This entitles students to attend home athletic contests and out of town contests at a reduced rate, (c) School Annual, \$3.

3. Students are requested to buy their textbooks at the student body bookstore. All are urged to buy the books at registration time. Average cost per pupil runs between \$3 - \$15.

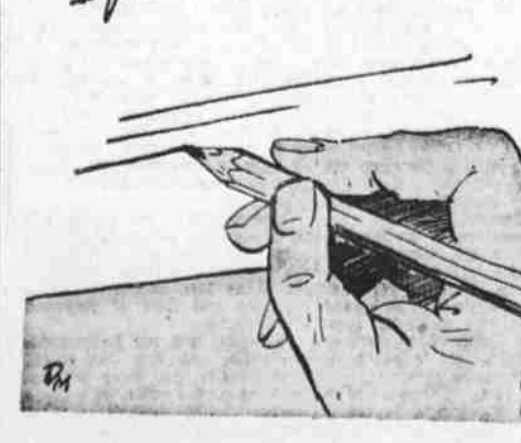
4. Students will have their pictures taken if they buy a student body membership. Photographer will be located in the library during registration week.

### Police To Attend Special School At Grants Pass

Four Roseburg city police officers and possibly one from Winston and another from Canyonville will attend the annual Oregon Police Officers Basic Training School at Grants Pass this year.

Chief of Police Stan Olson made the announcement Wednesday. He stated four new members of the force hired this year would attend the weeklong session which was arranged in Salem Tuesday. The four from Roseburg are: Sam Goss, Robert O'Brien, Kenneth Hunt and Lyle Wescott.

Olson said possibly one police officer from Drain would attend a similar series of meetings in Eugene. Dates have not been set for either session, but all sessions will be held October and November at several different centrally located spots over the state. Schools will be conducted at Salem, The Dalles, Bend, Corvallis, Astoria, Grants Pass and Coos Bay.

The school at Grants Pass will be conducted daily for five days during the week to be scheduled there. The courses will be directed by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents, state police, Portland police and Olson.

Chief Olson will conduct a course one day in a traffic law enforcement and accident investigation. The schools over the state for police officers are being sponsored by the Oregon Assn. of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriffs Assn. Olson reported that cities will not be assessed this year because enough money was taken in from the courses last year to carry over another year.

### Rainfall Comes At Wrong Time For Local Crops

Virtually the first rainfall in Douglas County since April has come at the wrong time.

County Agent J. Roland Parker said the cold, wet weather will slow ripening of melons, tomatoes and cantaloupe and other truck crops. And he added that the rain could start some brown rot in peach and prune orchards in this area.

The summer, while cool, hasn't been a wet one. Through July, only .01 of an inch of rain fell, and none came until Aug. 14. Since then, the Weather Bureau station at Roseburg airport has recorded .86 of an inch. In the last 24 hours, .22 of an inch fell.

That's just enough to make it hard on truck crops, according to Parker. But at the same time, he enlarged, it'll give fall grass pastures "a real boost."

More wet weather is in store if the five-day outlook issued by the Weather Bureau this morning is correct. The outlook calls for continued cloud weather with considerable cloudiness and recurring showers through Wednesday.

High temperatures will range between 70-75 and lows between 48-54.

### County Library Plans Advanced

Organization of the planned Douglas County Library continued to move ahead this week.

County library board chairman Gordon Orsison announced Thursday afternoon that a special library consultant would be in Roseburg Labor Day weekend to meet with board members.

The consultant, Miss Carol Trimble, has been teaching at the library school at the University of Denver, in Denver, Colo. Miss Trimble will make a special trip to Roseburg from Tappan, Wash., where she lives.

Purpose of her visit Sept. 4-6, according to Orsison, will be to discuss library arrangement in the future quarters to join the Douglas County Court House. Miss Trimble will also help board members organize the county library system, which includes setting up branches and stations of the library throughout the county.

In addition to Orsison, the county board members include Miss Doris Gough, Canyonville; Mrs. Dorothy Schultz, Myrtle Creek; Mrs. Portha Randall, Drain; and J. C. Bovingdon, Oakland.

### Communist Atrocities In Hungary Related

CLEVELAND (AP)—Eight more witnesses came before a House subcommittee on Communist aggression Friday to add their stories to testimony that rape, beatings and book-burnings attended the Red's postwar seizure of control in Hungary.

In an ornate federal courtroom, Rep. Alvin M. Bentley (R-Mich), subcommittee chairman, and Rep. Michael A. Feighan, Cleveland Democrat, listened Thursday while seven persons recalled painful memories of atrocities, persecution and deception.

The Soviets had planned the post-war government of Hungary even before that nation surrendered in World War II, Dr. Geca Teft, told the subcommittee. He spoke of his fight as minister of education to keep the Russians from dominating Hungary's schools.

### Telephone Booth Feature Of Fair

Douglas County Fair goers will receive, visually, a short course in the history of the telephone when they view the booth set up by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. according to local telephone company officials.

Three exhibits make up the booth display. In one the history of the development of the telephone is traced from the time of Alexander Graham Bell.

In another display viewers can see the ringer in which a dial demonstration set operates. A live demonstration will be given by a PT & T attendant. The demonstrator will show how a call goes through to its destination.

Meanwhile, in the final display a company cable splicer will demonstrate how the phone lines are joined to make a working unit.

The meeting is scheduled whether a vote is taken or not. Meanwhile, Associated Plywood crews are to meet Saturday at 4 p.m. in the Knights of Pythias Hall, Roseburg, to discuss future activities.

Both the Weyerhaeuser and Associated crews are represented by Local 307.

### Appeals Court Reverses Conviction Of Provo

NEW YORK (AP)—The U. S. Court of Appeals Friday reversed the treason conviction and life sentence given former Army Staff Sgt. John David Provo.

The court said Provo should not have been tried in New York, and also the government had no right to cross examine him on a collateral issue of homosexuality.

Provo, a former San Francisco bank clerk, was convicted of aiding the Japanese after the fall of Corregidor in the Philippines.

He was accused, among other things, of broadcasting for the Japanese, and of causing the death of a fellow American prisoner by giving derogatory reports on him to their captors.

### County Residents To Honor Gov., Mrs. Patterson At County Fair On Saturday

Area residents were getting ready today to pay honor to Gov. and Mrs. Paul Patterson during their visit to the Douglas County Fair Saturday afternoon.

Events planned to honor the governor and his wife continued to steamroll, following announcement of the visit. Their stay in Roseburg promises to be jam-packed with things to see and do.

Welcoming the Pattersons at Winchester Bridge at 11:45 a.m. Saturday will be a special reception committee headed by Brig. Gen. Curtis T. Beecher, GOP Central Committee chairman. Meanwhile, radio station KRNR has made plans to record the governor's arrival at the bridge.

According to Gen. Beecher, the recording will be broadcast over the station's noon newscast, if plans work out. The committee, the governor and his wife will be ushered directly to the fairgrounds by a motorcycle escort provided by Roseburg City Police.

The committee will ride in a limousine provided by Douglas County Coroner L. L. Powers.

At the fairgrounds the group will be met by a special reception committee headed by Dudley

Walton. The governor and his wife will be taken to the barbecue area in front of the grandstand where the Pattersons will officially open the "Governor's Day" barbecue.

Directly following the barbecue, Gov. Patterson will present a plaque to Douglas County's "outstanding farm family." Following the presentation, the state official will then speak briefly to the audience. He will be introduced by State Sen. Paul Geddes.

According to Program Manager Bob Grant, KRNR hopes to broadcast the governor's speech from the fairgrounds.

After the speech, the governor and his wife will be ushered out of Roseburg by the motorcycle escort. They will be en route to Ashland, where Gov. Patterson will participate in the dedication ceremony of the Talent reclamation project.

Towing Services Kept On Jump By Minor Accidents

Local towing services were kept on the jump last night by a series of minor traffic accidents caused by slick highways.

Most serious happened shortly after midnight this morning about five miles south of Roseburg on Highway 90. State police said Roy Raymond Kellar, Myrtle Creek, stopped his car on the highway and got out to investigate when the lights of a wrecker parked alongside the highway blinded him.

A second car, driven by Walter F. Middlestead, Myrtle Creek, came over the brink of a rise behind the southbound Kellar car and smashed into the parked car. The Middlestead vehicle wound up in the ditch.

Both Kellar and Middlestead were cut and bruised, but no hospital treatment was required, officers said.

The wrecker, Kellar found, was hooked onto a stalled freight truck. All three vehicles were towed to Roseburg by P & B tow truck.

Between them, P & B and Billy Mohr towing service towed a total of 15 cars which had been involved in minor accidents.

County Zoning Right Bill To Appear On Ballot

ing was still a long way off, but the commission needs the power so it can begin work on zoning when the time comes that preliminary work is out of the way.

Zoning covers regulations for use of land, heights of buildings and yard areas in keeping with the existing use of the land and needs of the future, according to Bell. He said this would promote health, safety and welfare of the county and its communities.

Bell said the regulations would come in the form of an ordinance for the urban area of the county adjacent to each city. Once these urban areas are zoned they can be combined into one countywide ordinance with common zoning ordinance text.

Bell pointed out emphatically that the County Planning Act Oregon does not allow regulation on lands used for "grazing, agriculture, horticulture or for growing timber. Thus, farm and forest lands are not controlled or regulated by the terms of the zoning ordinances in the county areas outside cities.

### Basic Programs Will Be Same At Junior Highs

Joseph Lane and Roseburg Junior High Schools will carry the same basic program this year, according to Dist. 4 Supt. M. C. Deller. The two schools will be approximately equal in size with seventh and eighth graders attending both schools.

Both junior high schools will register at the same time, each in their respective buildings. The registration times are as follows: Sept. 2, 9 a.m. to noon, and 1 to 2:30 p.m., last names A to L inclusive. Sept. 3, registration hours the same, last names M to Z inclusive. Both seventh and eighth graders will register at the same time.

Fees are required of all students Deller said, the total amount being \$5. Fees should be paid at registration time.

Students who did not attend school in Roseburg last year should bring report cards or some evidence of their promotion to the grade in which they are requesting registration.

Regular classes will begin Sept. 7 and students should come supplied with pencil, three-hole wide line notebook and paper.
