Southeast Asian Problems Listed

WASHINGTON — Foreign secretaries of eight nations meeting in Manila Sept. 6 to form a Southeast Asian defense organization will have three key problems to work out.

Diplomatic sources said they were:

1. How far will the countries go in binding themselves to a common defense of the area.
2. What sort of pledge will they make to combat Communist subversion.
3. What sort of continuing machinery will be set up to keep the countries advised and prepared to meet emergencies.

The United States and the other countries pioneering the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) — Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Thailand and Pakistan — have made no advance commitments, but have exchanged views on all these points.

Communism Road To Dictatorship, Council Claims

EVANSTON, Ill. — A report denouncing communism as the road to "totalitarian dictatorship" and making some criticism of democratic action by Christian leaders today.

The report was discussed by delegates to the Assembly of the World Council of Churches yesterday in afternoon and evening sessions. Delegates to the assembly represent 163 denominations in 43 countries.

The 51-page document concerns the main theme of the convention, "Christ—the Hope of the World."

Some who joined the debate stated it didn't lay enough stress on the second coming of Christ.

Others contended it didn't place sufficient emphasis on the possibility of achieving justice, with Christ's aid, in this world.

And some figured it didn't go far enough in condemnation of communism as a "false hope."

Archbishop Michael of New York head of the Greek Orthodox Church in North and South America and one of the six new presidents of the council, asserted:

"False doctrines which are mentioned in the report, especially that of communism, threaten the whole of human existence. All of these dehumanize life."

"It is this aspect of false hopes with which the church is primarily concerned. The danger for man which these false doctrines present appears to be sorely underestimated in the report."

Russia Protests Defection Of Yuri Rastvorov

WASHINGTON — Soviet Russia has protested U.S. activities in the defection of Yuri A. Rastvorov, Soviet spy now in American hands, State Department officials disclosed Tuesday.

The protest was contained in a note, delivered Monday night, denouncing American intelligence agencies for allegedly committing an act of violence against Rastvorov, a top Far Eastern espionage agent for the Russians.

Soviet diplomatic officials disclosed delivery of the Russian note, and its receipt was confirmed at the State Department.

Its main point was a protest that American agents, who persuaded Rastvorov to defect in Tokyo last Jan. 24, allegedly violated recognized standards of international law.

Nowhere in the note, however, does Russian Ambassador Georgi Zarubin indicate he will accept an American invitation to talk to Rastvorov whenever he desires.

Rastvorov was disclosed to be in American hands some two weeks ago. At a dramatic news conference, he announced he had deserted the Soviets because "I wanted to live like a decent human being."

Alleged Passer Of Checks Held

SPOKANE, Wash. — An alert department store cashier led to the arrest here Tuesday of a woman whom the FBI said had left a transcontinental trail of checks while posing as a prominent Detroit woman for whom she had worked.

Richard Auerbach, special agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said the woman's true name is Ella G. Burnham, but that she had used a long string of aliases.

He said she had escaped three times from the Federal Reformatory for Women at Alderson, W. Va., and had a criminal record running back to 1919.

Auerbach said the middle-aged

woman, with dyed auburn hair, had written \$7,800 in checks in 16 states while posing as Mrs. Arthur B. Sonneborn, a prominent Detroit woman. The FBI officer said the woman had been employed as a domestic in the Sonneborn home from last December to March, and when she left the home 24 of Mrs. Sonneborn's blank checks and her identification cards disappeared with her.

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Legionnaires Set For Convention In Washington

WASHINGTON — Lay that squirt gun down, Mac. Resist the temptation to drop that bag of water out your hotel room window. This is a family affair, this 36th American Legion convention, and nothing is supposed to happen that would shock the wives and kids.

That was the word from Legion national headquarters Thursday as increasing numbers of conventioners arrived for what looks like the least rambunctious get-together the veterans' organization has ever held. The convention opens Monday with a noon address by President Eisenhower.

There's no ban on fun-making as such, and Washington police have been told officially to wink at minor law transgressions, so nobody is likely to mistake next week's doings for a WCTU convention. But anything resembling rowdiness is strictly against the rules.

"Buzzer sticks are out," says Harry L. Foster of San Diego, 13th national chairman of the convention commission. "So are water pistols. Of course, some peddlers will try to sell the things and we can't stop them. But if we see some Legionnaire using one, he'll be taken care of."

A "service committee" of some 600 Legionnaires has been set up to help police deal with any convention-goers who get too frisky.
