Put Christianity On 7-Day Week, Leaders Propose

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—Christianity has been staying home from work.

So said leaders of the faith today as they mapped means for putting their religion on a seven-day week.

Too long, said Dr. Athleen Bliss of Kent, England, has Christianity got up and around only on Sundays and kept to the house the rest of the time.

The church, she said, "must also see daily work"—in business, industry and professions—"as a field of service to God."

Dr. Bliss, of the Church of England, is chairman of a 100-member committee of the World Council of Churches Assembly which presents its report on Christian obligations of laymen today.

She said that the church in modern times has emphasized home and family life, but not men's occupations, as its realm of activity.

"This is probably why there are more women than men in the average congregation," she said. "There has been no application of Christianity to work a man does five days a week."

MOTO-POLO SHOW

A spectacular new kind of polo show has been signed to make the final show at the fair Sunday, August 29. It's called Moto-Polo and is played with 6 stripped-down specially constructed "roll-over" cars, three cars to each side. In addition to roll bars, each car is equipped with circular bumpers so that when the inevitable crashes occur, the car can be flipped in any direction. Scores are made by advancing a gigantic 7 foot rubber ball through goals at either end of the field. Rules are enforced by a referee, who drives a specially equipped car, complete with signal lights and siren. The siren is used to remove unwilling cars and players from the field. Head-on crashes, cars flying into the air, rolling over and over, at times climbing over the ball—are incidents in the rough and tumble game. The best part of this show will be the price of the tickets. They are free!
