Chipping By-Products Getting Big Business

Chipping sawmilling by-products is getting to be big business in the western states.

Converted to chip size, bark-free slabs, edgings and trims are prime raw material for Kraft pulp mills and hardboard plants, the region's newest conservation-conscious industries.

In a 15-page illustrated report, The Lumberman, in its August issue, traces the beginning of sawlog barking from 1947 to the present and states that about 85 mechanical and hydraulic barkers are now at work in the western states cleaning logs before they are cut into lumber.

New Classrooms At Myrtle Creek Given Inspection

The Myrtle Creek school board met in special session Wednesday, to inspect the two new classrooms at Myrtle Creek and the eight classrooms at Tri-City.

Supt. Al Neet reported that school board expects to accept four of the eight rooms at Tri-City next Wednesday night. Rooms may be occupied after Labor Day.

Architect Van Svarverud, Roseburg representative for Freeman, Haslip, Tuft and Hewlett of Portland, was present to discuss the finishing of the 10 rooms.

Supt. Neet was authorized to work out a student insurance program with Robert Jones of Jones and Dyer Insurance Co. that will take effect Aug. 31. The same company was given the entire insurance program for bus transportation by the board.

Jerry Warren of Warren's Studio and Camera Shop in Myrtle Creek was awarded the bid on audiovisual equipment by submitting the lowest bid of three. Warren's bid was \$1,318.95.

The board signed a five-year contract with the Myrtle Creek Building Supply stipulating that they will replace all electrical appliances in the home economics room each year.

Supt. Al Neet reported that School Dist 19 is evaluated at \$5,408,144 this year and that the current millage is 47.1 as compared to 61.7 mills last year. Neet credits the reduced millage to three factors: 1. a decreased amount of money to be raised this year, 2. more income other than tax sources than there was last year, 3. increase of school property valuation.

Neet announced school will open Aug. 31, and reminds students who are in grades 1 through 6 living south of the city limits, are to go to the Tri-City School.

NO SCHOOL

There will be no school at Tye Camp this year, according to Oakland Dist. 1. Officials said no logging operations will be conducted in the area, and the presence of only four children in the camp would not warrant the opening of a school since costs would be prohibitive.

Regents' Action Called Underhanded In Firing

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — One of two University of Michigan faculty men fired for refusing to cooperate with congressional Communist hunters Friday called the university regents' action "very underhanded."

Dr. Mark Nickerson, associate professor of pharmacology, also said the action was "a very serious blow to freedom of thought."

Dr. Nickerson, 37, and Dr. H. Chandler Davis, 38-year-old mathematics instructor, were dismissed by the regents, Dr. Clement Markert, 37, a third faculty man who balked at some questions asked by a house Un-American Activities Subcommittee at Lansing last May, was ordered reinstated. He is a biology instructor.

The regents' action appeared final, with no avenue of appeal.

Mahoney Concedes Defeat For Governor

BALTIMORE (AP) — George P. Mahoney Friday conceded the Democratic nomination for governor to Dr. H. C. Byrd, long-time president of the University of Maryland.

Mahoney's announcement ended a two-month fight to upset the outcome of the primary election on June 28.

Despite recounts Mahoney initiated in three of the state's 2 counties and four court actions which went to the Maryland Court of Appeals, things stood just where they were when the votes were counted eight weeks ago.

Byrd held an 80-72 margin in county unit nominating votes, which govern the nomination much as electoral votes determine the outcome of a presidential election. Byrd also had a 4,000 edge in the statewide popular vote.

Communists Make Attack On Nationalist Island

TOKYO (AP) — Communist China today announced a small-scale hit-and-run raid on Quemoy, a Nationalist-held offshore island. There was no indication that it was a prelude to the Reds' loudly heralded threat of invasion of Formosa.

A Peiping radio broadcast said 40 Communist soldiers made two separate landings on Quemoy Monday night, killing 11 Nationalist soldiers before pulling back to the mainland 15 miles away.

Internal Security Witness Refuses To List Positions

WASHINGTON (AP) — A witness before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, involving the Constitution's protection, has refused to say whether he worked through various groups identified as Communist fronts in seeking repeal of the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act.

Chairman Jenner (R-Ind.) said Friday, in making public testimony taken at a closed-door hearing here June 22 from Abner Green of New York City, that it offered "an excellent primer" for anyone interested in knowing "how a Communist front operates."

Green was identified as executive secretary of the American Committee for the Protection of Foreign Born. The Senate investigators introduced publications of the organization so listing him and said a subpoena had been served on him at the group's New York office.

Invoking the Fifth Amendment guarantee against possible self-incrimination, Green declined to tell his present occupation or any job he has held since he was "a soda jerk" in Brooklyn and Manhattan drugstores about 20 years ago.

Green, who appeared before a subcommittee task force studying Communist propaganda, also refused to say whether he now is a member of the Communist Party or whether he has been since 1938.

He was questioned principally about what the committee described as propaganda attacks on the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act, and to a lesser extent, about efforts to bring about the repeal of the McCarran Internal Security Act.
