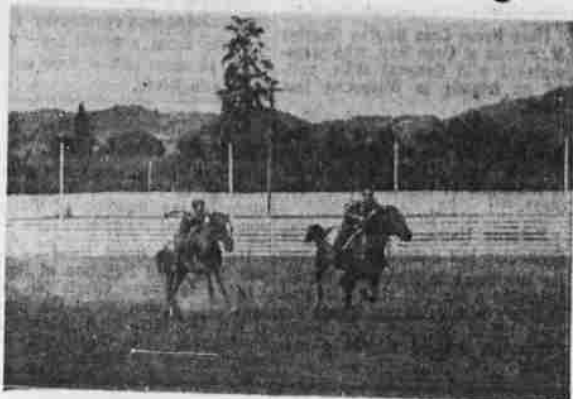


Winston Woman Gathers 7 Winners In Fair Racing

The New York Yankees aren't conceding the American League flag to Cleveland but the first seed of doubt is beginning to grow in the minds of the defending champions.

This suspicion was gleaned from a remark by Allie Reynolds, veteran Yankee pitcher star who helped in all five consecutive championships.

"If they (the Indians) continue at this terrific pace," he said, "they deserve to win."

Reynolds was referring, of course, to Cleveland's sensational .721 winning percentage, a pace never before attained by an American League club. Should the Indians continue at this pace through the end of the season, they will smash the league record of 110 victories turned in by the 1927 Yankees.

The Yankees, traveling at a 693 pace, a feat never before reached by a runner-up club, defeated the Chicago White Sox 4-1 yesterday but they lost ground to the Indians. While the Yankees were winning their sixth straight, the Tribe was extending its consecutive victory string to 10 in Boston's Fenway Park, walloping the Red Sox twice, 6-2 and 9-1.

This gave the Indians a four-game lead over the Yankees. Both teams have 25 left to play.

Dodgers Pull Close
The National League pace continued to tighten as the on-again Brooklyn Dodgers whipped the Braves in Milwaukee 12-3 and 5-4 to pull up to 1 1/2 games behind front-running New York Giants.

The best the New Yorkers could do was gain a split in St. Louis after dropping an 11-inning 5-4 decision to the Cardinals. They overcame a 3-1 deficit to win the night cap 7-4.

Cincinnati's Redlegs strengthened their hold on fourth place, defeating Philadelphia 3-2 and 8-4. Chicago's Cubs came from behind to sweep a twin bill from Pittsburgh 7-4 and 4-1.

In a wild double-header marred by a frefor-all, the Detroit Tigers took two from Philadelphia's Athletics 14-3 and 2-1 and wrested fourth place from the Red Sox by one percentage point. Baltimore, fresh from 16 losses in its last 17 games, surprised Washington with 8-4 and 5-0 victories.

Bob Lemon scattered eight hits in the opener for Cleveland. It was his 11th straight victory and made him the majors' first 20-game winner. He and teammate Bob Feller are the only active six-time 20-game winners.

Until the sixth, when the Indians erupted for three runs on homers by Larry Doby (No. 29) and Vic Wertz (No. 10). Lemon was hooked up in a 2-2 pitching duel with rookie Tom Brewer. Wertz hit home run No. 11 in the second game to help Art Houtteman gain his 14th triumph with a six-hitter. **Yogi Hits; Ford Hurts**

The Yankees finally beat Virgil Trucks on the hitting of Yogi Berra and the pitching of Whitey Ford. Ford hurled a neat six-hitter for his 15th victory. Berra doubled in the first two runs and scored another. Trucks has whipped the Yankees three times, two by shut-outs.

A capacity crowd of 45,922 crest-fallen Braves fans witnessed the Dodger sweep that dropped third-place Milwaukee 7 1/2 lengths behind the Giants. The turnout boosted Milwaukee's home attendance to 1,841,666, setting a new National League record for the second successive year.

The Dodgers blasted 11 Milwaukee pitchers for 29 hits in the double-header. Four of them were homers, two by Duke Snider, one by Gil Hodges and one by Rube Walker. Snider batted in three runs in each game. The Brooks rang up eight runs in the 11th inning of the opener but the Braves had rallied for two runs in the ninth to tie the score at 4-4. Billy Loes breezed to his 11th victory in 14 decisions with a nine-hitter in the nightcap.

Alex Grammas' 11th-inning single drove in the winning run for St. Louis in the opener after Stan

Poppenheim Retains Light-Heavy Crown

Montreal's Luigi Macera failed in his bid to wrest the coast junior heavyweight crown from Kurt von Poppenheim in the main event of the weekly mat card at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

The 202-pound challenger started off in good fashion and won the first fall in 17:02 with a hip roll pin hold, but the champion came back to spill Macera in 8:47 and 4:20. Von Poppenheim did the trick with a German crossbow and a half Boston crab.

Lively action was seen in the semi-final event which ended in a draw between Angelo Poffo and Danny O'Rourke, substituting for Cal Roberts. Poffo got the first fall in 21 minutes with a backdrop and press, but O'Rourke won the second fall before time ran out when Poffo fouled. Referee Elton Owen handed the fall to O'Rourke when Poffo tossed O'Rourke over the ring, then pulled his hair and pounded his face into the ring apron.

Pavo Katonin, substituting for Dale Kiser in the special opener, thumped Mad Med Peters in 8:30 with a surfboard.

Musial's second homer of the game had tied the score in the 10th inning. Dusty Rhodes, whose two triples had gone to waste in the first game, led the Giants' attack in the second with two homers and two doubles. Willie Mays hit his 39th homer for New York in the opener.

Klu Knocks 2 Homers
Ted Kluszewski smashed two homers, his 38th and 39th, to tie Mays for the league lead in Cincinnati's double win. Rookie Art Fowler outpitched Robin Roberts, Philadelphia's 18-game winner, in the opener.

Bob Wilson hit two homers, one a grand-slammer, doubled and drove in six runs to help Steve Gromek win his 15th game for Detroit. Gromek precipitated a near riot in the ninth when he charged out to Marion Francano after the Philadelphia pitcher had hit him with a pitched ball in the ninth. Gromek threw several punches before the two combatants wrestled to the ground. Players from both benches joined the fracas. After peace was restored, both pitchers were ejected.

Orioles catcher Clint Courtney backed up Joe Coleman's shutout pitching against Washington with five hits in five times at bat in the nightcap. Cal Abrams and Gil Coan had three hits apiece in Baltimore's first-game victory.

Cards Eye '55 Mound Staff

ST. LOUIS — Three rookie hurlers, plus veteran Harvey Haddix as the backbone, could form the nucleus of a top-flight corps of starting pitchers for the St. Louis Cardinals next season, something they have missed in 1954.

Brooks (The Bull) Lawrence, 29-year-old Negro who has compiled an 11-5 record since coming up in mid-June, heads the list.

The other two are Gordon Jones, 24, who has been with the club about two weeks, and Ralph Beard, 23, who came up with Lawrence.

Jones turned in an eight-hit performance yesterday to defeat the Milwaukee Braves in 10 innings 2-1. His bid for a shutout was spoiled in the ninth.

Beard, although he is yet to chalk up his first victory against two defeats, has turned in able performances during his nine appearances for the Cards.

He has pitched in 44 innings, allowing only 15 earned runs for an ERA of 3.06. Only 12 home runs have been hit off the trio.

The Cards hitters have carried their share of the load this year but ineffective and spotty pitching has the club mired in sixth place in the National League.

BRIDGEPORT, Pa. — A field of 64 girls opened competition Monday in the sixth annual U.S. Girls' Junior Golf Championship at Gulf Mills Country Club.

Defending champion Millie Meyerson of Los Angeles is seeking to become the first girl in the 11 to 17 range to win the tournament twice and also to keep the title on the Pacific Coast where it has been for the last four years.

Mon. day's 18-hole qualifying round will cut the field to 16 competitors for four rounds of 18-hole matches.

Carole Jo Kabler, Sutherland, Ore., is entered.

Other west coast entrants include Ann Quast of Everett and Ruth Jensen of Seattle.

Webfoots Win Four In Far Eastern Tour
SINGAPORE — The University of Oregon basketball team won all four games it played last week in its Far East tour.

The Ducks first defeated the Chinese newspaper, Nanyang Siang Pau, Singapore League champions, 68-53. They downed an All-Star Singapore team, 81-58. Next they defeated the Amoy team from Hongkong, 74-62, and Friday night they won from an All-Malaya squad, 88-61.

Earth Appears Round 17 Miles Up, Says Flier

DAYTON, Ohio — Trees turn olive drab and dry grass looks like straw from 17 miles up, says the man who flew higher in the sky than any other human.

And the earth really looks round up there, observes Maj. Arthur Murray, the 35-year-old Pennsylvanian who started his military career on a horse and recently broke the world's altitude record.

Colors on earth "seemed to start changing," its roundness showed clearly and the sun was "so much brighter it was almost blinding," he told a press conference.

The conference followed an Air Force announcement the veteran combat and test pilot was the man who took a Bell X-1A rocket-powered experimental aircraft to new heights.

Air Force Secretary Harold E. Talbott announced the record last Saturday but withheld announcement of the pilot's name until Friday. Exact date of the record-breaking flight — or flights, nobody is saying which — and the exact altitude still are Air Force secrets.

But informed observers speculate the new record must be in the neighborhood of 90,000 feet. The former record, set Aug. 21, 1953, by Marine Corps Lt. Col. Marion Carl in a Douglas Skyrocket D38-11, was 83,235 feet.

FORMER SENATOR DIES
SAN BRUNO, Calif. — Arthur W. Orton, 80, former Oregon state senator and representative, died here Friday of a heart ailment.

He was a member of the House in 1909 and served in the State Senate from 1917 through the special session of 1920. He had lived in California the past 10 years.

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Jay C. Hormel, Meat Packer, Passes Away

AUSTIN, Minn. — Jay C. Hormel, 61, head of the George A. Hormel meat packing firm, died early Monday following a long illness.

He supervised experiments leading to the first successful method of canning pork which led to a greatly expanded market for hogs. His firm became well known in labor relations when the Hormel company introduced an annual wage plan for its packinghouse workers in 1931. The plan guarantees year-round employment.

He became president of the firm in 1928 upon retirement of his father and became chairman of the board in 1946 following death of his father, George A. Hormel, who established the company in 1881.

INDIAN DRIES DISCOURAGED
MADRAS, India — Bootlegging and moonshining are increasing in Madras after seven years of prohibition, says a government report.

The report gives little encouragement to India's dries, who look on Madras as one of the key areas in their fight to extend prohibition over all of India. It paints a picture in many ways similar to that of prohibition America and calls for a bigger enforcement staff and stiffer penalties if there is to be "any appreciable decline in the incidence in the crime."
