Campaign Aims At Deemphasis Of The Kremlin

MOSCOW (AP) — A campaign is underway to de-emphasize the Kremlin as the seat of Soviet government power and to establish the ancient walled fortress as a symbol of Russian history and culture.

Government leaders are moving out to scattered villas and many government departments already have been established elsewhere in Moscow. A plan has even been announced to move the bodies of Nikolai Lenin and Joseph Stalin from their Red Square tomb to a planned new pantheon in the outlying Lenin hills.

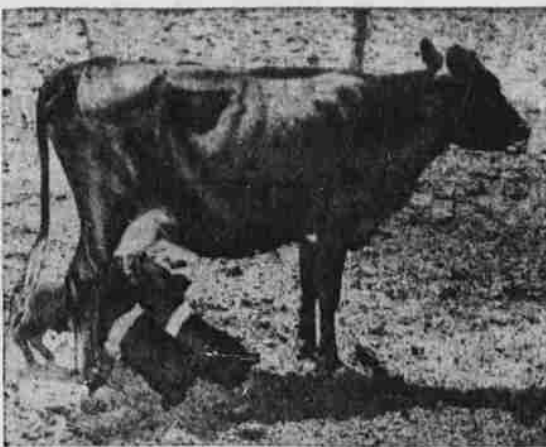
Just across Moskovoets Square from the Kremlin, on the banks of the Moscow River, the steel framework of a new skyscraper is going up. Muscovites say upon completion this will provide government offices, enabling remaining officials at the Kremlin to leave.

Persons present at the British Embassy dinner for former British Prime Minister Clement Attlee and his Labor Party delegation during their recent visit to Moscow said Communist Party Secretary Nikita S. Khrushchev told them the government hopes to open the entire Kremlin to the public as a museum within a relatively short time.

The informants said Khrushchev did not tell them the government was planning to leave the Kremlin altogether, but said such a conclusion might be drawn from the plans to make it a museum.

Judge Couldn't 'Afford' To Pay His Income Tax

RENO, Nev. (AP) — A county judge who was fined \$5,000 Friday for evading federal income taxes explained Saturday why he did it; but he couldn't afford it.

Judge John S. Belford said he found the steadily increasing burden of taxes a practical impossibility to meet.

So, said Judge Belford, he filed no returns at all for the years 1951 and 1952 rather than turn in phony returns.

The judge, who pleaded guilty to the charges Friday, said he would pay his taxes "just as quickly as I am financially able to do so."

He said in a statement that he had no intent to defraud the government. Federal Judge John Rose who sentenced Judge Belford, said Friday he agreed.

The charge said Judge Belford's gross income was \$8,203 in 1951 and \$9,064 in 1952.

He said in his statement: "As so many other people, I have found the steadily increasing burden of taxes a practical impossibility to meet. I have a large family with three teen-aged children. In addition—the burden of unusual sickness and support of those not in my immediate family further depleted my assets."

Not filing a return is a misdemeanor; filing a false return is a felony.

Had Belford been convicted of a felony, he would automatically have lost his judgeship under Nevada law.

He indicated he does not plan to resign, and said he does not plan to withdraw his candidacy from the Nov. 4 election, when he seeks another 4-year term. He is unopposed.

Belford could have been fined up to \$10,000 and jailed one year on each of the two counts of tax evasion.

Tacoma Man Is Elected Toastmasters President

WASHINGTON (AP) — Charles H. Griffith of Tacoma, Wash., has been elected president of Toastmasters International, which calls itself the largest public speaking club in the world.

The club, its tongue nestled gently in its collective cheek, reported Saturday that Griffith's initial comment on learning of his election was this:

"I'm speechless."

Other officers elected include Irv L. Saucerman, Portland, Ore., treasurer.

Plans Disclosed To Build Atom Bomb Proof City

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Plans for a 50-million-dollar "atom bomb proof" city were disclosed Saturday by Hal B. Hayes, millionaire contractor.

The project calls for houses equipped with Geiger counters and bomb-proof bedrooms, also a small canal to serve as an escape route, and safety sealed wells for auxiliary water supply. Hayes, considered an authority on atomic blast-resistant construction, often has been consulted by federal experts on atomic defense problems. The plans were drafted for 100 acres in Minneapolis. The homes would sell for \$15,000 to \$25,000.

Learning from studies of A-bombed cities that one of the first tragedies is the breakdown of the water supply, Hayes has set up an auxiliary water system.

He proposed to drill wells 100 feet deep and sealed with lead capping to prevent contamination. The well water can be used for drinking and for fighting fires. The water also will feed the canal through which inhabitants can escape from the area if they need to.
