Judge Rules Prisoners Not Promised Immunity

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—The trial judge ruled Tuesday that Cpl. Claude Batchelor was not promised immunity by the U.S. Army if he would return to the Allied side.

On the basis of this ruling, Lt. Col. Donald L. Mames, Jr., law officer, or "judge," in the court-martial of Batchelor, turned down a defense motion that all charges against Batchelor be dropped.

Batchelor is charged with collaborating with the enemy and telling on his buddies while he was a prisoner of war in Korea. He at first chose to stay with the Reds but changed his mind.

had handed the chancellor the greatest political setback in his five years as head of the government. Allied observers throughout West Germany reported rising disillusionment and bitterness because Adenauer's policy hasn't gotten Germany back her sovereignty or her right to rearm.

Other anti-Communist quarters in Western Europe grudgingly conceded the Reds had made a gain as a result of the French action but refused to give up hope of finding a way to rearm Germany.

Underlying the feelings ranging from painful disappointment to outright bitterness against the French were fears of setback which might lead the United States to withdraw from Europe. The Communists, with Moscow calling the tune, were jubilant.

Britons looked to Prime Minister Churchill once again to save the day.

McCarthy, Sec. Stevens Both Censured In Report

publican members of the Army-McCarthy committee, reached these conclusions:

1. That charges he used improper influence in behalf of Schine were "not established" in so far as the senator "personally" was concerned.

2. That McCarthy should have exercised "more vigorous discipline to have prevented such improper influence" by members of his committee staff.

3. That "in condoning such activities" by his staff, and "to the extent he permitted their continuance," McCarthy deserves "criticism."

On Cohn—

1. That he made many contacts in executive departments in behalf of Schine and that, in view of his position as counsel of a committee investigating the Army, such contacts "take on a different connotation" than they normally would.

2. That he was "unduly aggressive and persistent" in seeking favor for Schine and that he "conducted an inordinate amount of committee time" in such effort, but

3. That the investigation of alleged subversion at Ft. Monmouth, N. J., was not designed by Cohn as a lever to get preferential treatment for Schine.

On Stevens and Adams—

1. That "the evidence reasonably inspires belief that Secretary Stevens and Mr. Adams made efforts to terminate or influence investigations and hearings at Ft. Monmouth."

2. That they "were also derelict in not registering vigorous protest with the committee" when they first became aware of (Cohn) approaches they considered improper.

3. That all the Pentagon officials involved were "errant" for failing to repudiate suggestions that Schine be given preference in Army orders and duty assignments.

4. That Adams was guilty of "vigorous and diligent efforts" to block McCarthy committee subpoenas for members of Army loyalty boards.

5. That Adams was further guilty of "deliberate and indefensible methods" when he leaked to friendly newsmen advance information on the Army complaint against McCarthy.

6. That Stevens was guilty of "placation, appeasement and vacillation" in his dealings with the McCarthy committee.

The News said the majority found no cause for action regarding two other "defendants," Francis Carr, staff chief of McCarthy's subcommittee, and H. Struve Hensel, counsel for the Defense Department.

"All those I have talked to agree it is the most fitting place to put a memorial to him (Carter) because of the time and money he put into the grandstand and rodeo," said Hughes. "He was one of the staunchest promoters of the rodeo."
