PORTLAND (AP)—A decision is expected Thursday on whether the Air Force will abandon its facilities at the Portland International Airport, the Washington office of Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore.) reported Tuesday.

Monday Another Million Dollar

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP)—Monday was another million dollar day for British Columbia's fish industry.

A fleet of 330 seiners and hordes of snaller gillnetters ran smack into the middle of the fabulous Adams River run in the Active Pass area and netted nearly 600,000 sockeye, fisheries officials reported Tuesday following a preliminary estimate.

They believe the catch is bigger than that obtained last Thursday when Canadian fishboats hit the Adams run for the first time as it entered the Juan de Fuca Strait.

Canadians have now caught three million sockeye this season

and Americans are not far behind with a catch of 2,800,000.

Fishing in the Active Pass region was stopped Monday night by the Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission after the big catch was taken.

Union gillnetters here said the commission took a "dangerous gamble" by leaving the pass area open for fishing Monday.

The union protested to Federal Fisheries Minister James Sinclair that the result of the "gamble" may eliminate any chance of a fair share for Canadian fishermen.

Some of the seiners now are moving towards Juan de Fuca Strait where fishing resumes Wednesday. Others are heading north.

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
