Two men injured in logging and lumber accidents are confined this week.

Franklyn Jones has been confined to his home since last Wednesday when a power saw kicked back, injuring his right knee. Jones and Tom Amos hold a contract for felling and bucking timber in the Little River area.

The second man, Ted Crick, employed by Jones and Amos, was taken to Douglas Community Hospital in Roseburg last Friday after collapsing while at work. According to his employers, a vertebra slipped out of place as Crick was bending over to adjust the saw. He will probably be in the hospital a week.

Glendale School Enrollment 713

Enrollment of students in Glendale public schools (high school and grade school) continued to climb this week after an all-time high of 713 registered students was set last week, reports News-Review correspondent Mrs. Gerald B. Fox.

The figure was also boosted Tuesday when 37 students were enrolled at the Glendale Seventh Day Adventist Church weekday school. More were expected at the church school, according to the teacher, Mrs. Kenneth Mosser.

The public school figure of 713 was reached Friday, but Mrs. Fox says that at least 10 youngsters have since enrolled in the grade schools and another six at the high school.

A breakdown of the figure shows 534 in the grade school and 179 registered at the Glendale High School. The grade school number is 15 higher than 1953, and the high school figure is up by 23 students.

Seven classes have been set up for the first and second graders, Mrs. Fox reports; three for the first grade, three for the second grade and one for the first and second combined.

Registration in other classes reads: third - 64; fourth - 58; fifth - 68; sixth - 62; seventh - 59; and eighth - 57.

Largest class at Glendale high is the freshmen with 63 students. Other classes show: sophomore - 44; junior - 44; and senior - 28.

Spokane Bus Drivers Strike For Higher Pay

SPOKANE, Aug. 31—A strike of 150 AFL bus drivers and mechanics left this city of 180,000 without any municipal transportation Wednesday.

The union, which is asking an 11-cent hourly pay increase plus other benefits, struck Spokane City Lines at 5 a.m. after a final meeting with a state mediator failed to produce a settlement.

The strike, directly affecting some 30,000 regular patrons and nearly 10,000 school children returning to classes Wednesday, was originally called for last week but was postponed by request of Mediator William Samish.

The bus company is a subsidiary of National City Lines and has claimed that patronage has fallen off so sharply since 1947 that it can't afford any pay increases now.

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Quarrier Million Visit State Fair By Tuesday

SALEM, Aug. 31—Oregon's State Fair, which opened last Saturday, already has played to almost a quarter of a million persons.

Attendance during the first four days was 236,985, compared with 192,090 in the same four days a year ago.

The Tuesday crowd was 26,550, or 2,600 more than a year ago, despite showery skies.

Prize-winning livestock in the 4-H Club and Future Farmer divisions were auctioned Tuesday, but there was little competition. For the first time, buying was by sealed bids, instead of in open competition.

Pricing was lower than a year ago, and only slightly above the market.

The kids had their day at the fair Wednesday, with all carnival rides costing only a dime.

McCarthy Takes Stand In His Own Defense

vate conversations within the executive department of the government, declined to testify about those conversations he said he had had with Zwicker.

Harding testified he sat in front of Zwicker at a public hearing McCarthy conducted in New York last Feb. 18 and heard Zwicker mutter "You S.O.B." at the senator at least once.

Harding also said he believes Zwicker also said it again, but that he was not prepared to swear that Zwicker said it.

Counsel for McCarthy said it should be noted that the occasion Harding testified about was prior to the time when McCarthy is alleged to have abused Zwicker. It was the morning of Feb. 18, McCarthy and Zwicker tangled in a closed session that afternoon with the senator questioning whether the much-decorated general was fit to command.

Zwicker was not present during Harding's testimony but came in to the hearing room shortly before the afternoon session began. In reply to questions from reporters, Zwicker said that he did not know whether he would be a witness at the hearings. He said that he was not under subpoena but had been asked by the committee to keep himself available.

Zwicker said "no comment" when newsmen asked him about the quote attributed to him by Harding at the morning session.

The forenoon session was recessed early so that the Senate committee could consider in closed session whether to direct that Lawton must answer questions.

At the start of the afternoon session, Chairman Watkins (R-Utah) announced the committee had deferred a decision on this. Watkins said the committee would "continue a study" of the matter.

Another senator, who asked not to be quoted by name, told reporters the group would "suggest" to the Pentagon that it reverse the instructions to Lawton and allow him to testify.

Edward Bennett Williams, attorney for McCarthy, had argued the Army was "gagging" Lawton. Wilber M. Brucker, general counsel to the Defense Department, said in a statement at the Pentagon that Lawton, on his own initiative, had come to him and that he had advised, as a legal matter, that Lawton was subject to the President's order even though he has retired from active Army duty.

McFarland Arizona's Democratic Candidate

PHOENIX, Aug. 31—Ernest W. McFarland, staging a spectacular political comeback, today holds the Democratic nomination for governor of Arizona.

Surprising even his most optimistic supporters, the former majority leader of the U. S. Senate overwhelmed State Sen. William Kimball in a lopsided race that was decided within four hours after the polls closed Tuesday.

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Douglas High Registration Up 10 Per Cent

Enrollment in School District 118 is up about 10 per cent over 1953, according to Supt. William Bromley. He anticipates an even higher climb before registration is completed.

A total of 1271 students are enrolled in the district's three grade schools (Tennille, Lookingglass and Dillard) and Douglas High School. Of this number 452 are in high school.

Peak enrollment in the district will come later in September, the superintendent said. Right now he pointed out that some high school students are finishing their summer jobs while some grade school youngsters are out picking prunes.

Currently, the school district has a sufficient number of instructors, Bromley said, but he added that it would probably be necessary to increase the staff if the enrollment went too much higher.

Biggest grade in the district is the first with 190 bright-eyed youngsters trekking to the school rooms for the first time.

Registration by school found 169 at Tennille, one more than last year's final figure. Grade by grade class size was: first - 30; second - 22; third - 31; fourth - 27; fifth - 23; sixth - 31.

At Lookingglass, school enrollment of 101 was up by 15 over last year's total of 85: first - 28; second - 15; third - 21; fourth - 9; fifth - 11; sixth - 17.

A good-sized increase was found at Dillard school. Last year's number of 504 was upped to 549 an "increase of better than a classroom" according to Bromley. By grades enrollment was: first - 130; second - 100; third - 97; fourth - 71; fifth - 72; and sixth - 77.

Over at Douglas High School, Bromley said, enrollment for grades seven through 11 totaled 452. (Seniors are attending Roseburg Senior High School. By grades registration was: seventh - 130; eighth - 100; ninth - 83; tenth - 76; and eleventh - 58.

Last year there was no eleventh grade at Douglas High School, Bromley added. The total then was 358 students in the four grades. This year there is a jump of 36 over 1953.

Dogs Not Allowed To Run At Large

Roseburg Police Chief Stan Olson today issued a reminder to city residents that dogs will not be allowed to run at large—whether they are licensed or not.

He said several complaints have been received recently, and efforts will be made to enforce section 1 of the city ordinance 1148 which deals with dog control.

Chief Olson reminded that a dog must be kept on the owner's property unless it is accompanied by someone. Dogs in public places must be under control of the owner or persons accompanying them.

Licensing is continuing, with the county dog control making household checks in Roseburg. Persons residing in the city may obtain licenses at the City Hall. Persons outside the city limits should apply at the county clerk's office in the Courthouse.

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Three Men Believed Drowned in Alaska

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP)—Three men are missing and presumed drowned after their fishing boat capsized Monday on the Tenana River near here.

Four others reached safety by swimming to shore. All seven were employees of Joint Ventures, Inc., a concern working on the Haines-Fairbanks pipeline.

The 74th Air Rescue Squadron identified the missing men as Doc Kellum, Clyde Yenne and Sam Beloski, all of Big Delta.

Cool Canadian Air Breaks Heat Wave Over East

Cool Canadian air broke an early September heat wave over wide areas in the eastern half of the nation Tuesday but more hot weather was the prospect for Southern states.

The cool air spread into the Ohio and middle Mississippi Valley and early Wednesday the leading edge extended from the St. Lawrence River southwestward into southern Illinois, Oklahoma and northward along the eastern edge of the Rockies.

But it was warm south of the cool front and temperatures early Wednesday were mostly in the 70s and a few 80s over the southwestern states and Florida.

Readings were in the 50s over most of the northern Rockies, including the northern Rockies and the western coastal section. A few 40 degree temperatures were reported in eastern North Dakota and northern Minnesota.

Showers and thunderstorms in and ahead of the cool belt extended over all of New England southward through the Ohio River Valley into northern Texas. There also were showers and thunderstorms in the central and northern Rockies while light rain fell in Western Washington. Akron, Colo., reported winds of 45 m.p.h. with gusts to 78 m.p.h. early Wednesday.

Early morning weather conditions: New York 77 and cloudy; Atlanta 76 and clear; Miami 81 and clear; Dallas 78 and showers; Denver 69 and clear; Seattle 59 and rain; San Francisco 53 and clear; Los Angeles 65 and clear; St. Louis 66 and clear; Madison, Wis., 49 and clear; Grand Rapids, Mich., 52 and clear; Minneapolis 55 and cloudy; Chicago 57 and partly cloudy.

Pair Arrested After Wild Chase Through City

An 18-year-old airman and his 17-year-old Oakland companion are in jail following their arrest Tuesday night by city police, who had to chase them at high speeds on Stephens Street before catching them.

The airman, Fredrick Wilson, Warren Air Force Base, Wyo., is charged with reckless driving and illegal possession of liquor by a minor. The Oakland youth is charged with being drunk on a public street and with the possession count.

Officers said the chase took them on Oak, Parrott, Mosher and Stephens streets. The pair were nearly out of the south limits of the city before their patrol car caught them in traffic. Wilson, they said, drove up to 65 miles per hour during the chase.

A third youth in the car was judged by officers as being an unwilling companion, and he was allowed to return to his home in Oakland. Part of a case of beer was found in the car.

bombardment of Amoy and other Communist bases within gun range of Quemoey.

The destroyers, turned over to the Nationalists last month, are the former USS Hilary P. Jones and the former USS Benson.

Even as the Nationalist sea and air attacks continued, top government officials conferred on plans for a five-hour visit to Formosa Thursday by U.S. Secretary of State Dulles.

The secretary, due there from Manila at noon, will attend a briefing by U.S. officials and call on President Chiang Kai-Shek. Chiang is expected to discuss in broad terms the whole Far East situation.

Dulles is to leave for Tokyo at 5 p.m. Chiang said intelligence reports indicate the Communists have four army corps, about 100,000 men, in Fukien Province, of which Quemoey, Amoy and other coastal islands are a part.

The spokesman said Communist artillery within range of Amoy had been almost doubled prior to a five-hour bombardment of the Nationalist island Friday.

The Nationalists have said their combined attacks are in retaliation for the Red bombardment.

Monday fall on ice above the 8,000-foot level. He suffered an ankle fracture but despite this, made considerable progress down the steep slopes.

In the early stages he fastened crampons—spiked metal shoes—on his knees and descended below the freezing level. That was after he regained consciousness and told his companions, Sam Tompkins, 42, and Robert Lee, 41, to go for help. They were hurt, Tompkins being found semi-delirious Tuesday afternoon when found near the ranger station here, hobbling along with an injured knee.

Lee got down Monday night late and touched off the search, although his story was nearly incoherent.

A Seattle group, headed by Al Randall, joined in the search for Oman—but failed to find him because of the progress he had made down the mountain—and at the same time was looking for a member of its own eight-man party, Cleo Brooks.

In the course of this, Randall came upon George Watts, 20, Salem, who had suffered a broken arm in a fall and slide of some 200 to 300 feet, Ron Coon, 17, Salem, was with him and was unhurt. Randall headed Watts to a hospital at Stayton. A third climber with Watts and Coon, Ed Keech Jr., 17, Salem, had taken a different route up the mountain at one point but got into no trouble and returned.

Brooks, who got lost when he lagged, finally made his way unaided Tuesday evening to the Detroit ranger station.

Morley, the day's only fatality, was a widely known Portland lumberman.

A Stanford graduate, he was to have left Thursday to enter Harvard law school.
