The major part of digestion occurs in the small intestine. Secretions from the liver and pancreas insure the splitting of the foods into substances which can be absorbed into the blood. Tiny glands distributed over the inner surface of the intestine also give off intestinal juices which are necessary for the completion of digestion.

The end products of digestion—simple sugars, amino acids (broken down proteins), fatty acids, glycerol, and other elements of food, such as vitamins, salts and water, are of no use until they are absorbed into the blood and carried to the cells of the body.

Most absorption of food substances takes place within the small intestine. The exceptions to this are the absorption of alcohol by the stomach, and the absorption of water, some inorganic salts, and sometimes glucose by the large intestine.

Small finger-like extensions of the lining of the small intestine project into its hollow lumen. These extensions are called villi. They expose an enormous surface along which absorption can take place. Movements of the villi, from side to side and to and fro are brought about by smooth muscles in their walls. In helping to

U. S. Geological Survey Installs Gauging Stations

The U. S. Geological Survey has completed installation of four additional stream gauging stations in Douglas County, according to County Surveyor Ben Irving.

The stations are located on Little River about a quarter mile below Cavitt Creek, on the North Umpqua River at Brown's Bridge, on Cow Creek above the Glenbrook bridge and on Elk Creek about a mile below Drew.

This brings to about 15 the number of such installations in the county, Irving said. There were already gauging stations on the Umpqua River at the Smith Bridge above Elkton, on the South Umpqua at the Winston Bridge and at Tiller and on Cow Creek above Asale. There are several stations on the North Umpqua and its tributaries above Copeland Creek.

At the stations, the cross-sectional area of the streams and the current velocities are measured at various water elevations. From the data obtained, the amount of water flowing past a given point may be computed.

The Geological Survey publishes the data collected from these and other stations in Oregon at regular intervals.

The stream gauging stations are established by the USGS in cooperation with various interested agencies, including the office of the state engineer in Salem, the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, U.S. Engineers and the California Oregon Power Co.

Data will be especially useful in the county's water resources survey now under way, Irving pointed out.

Irving and a Corps of Engineers representative, this week inspected past corps work along the river in the Melrose and Loon Lake areas.

Other classes may also be requested. If enough demand is shown and an instructor is available, every effort will be made to organize the class, Boss said.

Two Injured Men Taken To Eugene

Two Eugene men, injured Wednesday when their panel truck was sideswiped at the north end of the Myrtle Creek bridge, were transferred to Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene Friday afternoon.

N. L. Jennings, driver of the panel, was reported in fine condition by Myrtle Creek Hospital attendants. Jennings received lacerations of the forehead and a cerebral concussion according to investigating state police officers. His passenger, George Rude, suffering from a fractured left hip and contusions of the face, was reported doing as well as could be expected.

According to the state police report, the two men were traveling in a right way at a speed of 20 to 25 miles per hour before noon Wednesday. An international tractor with a lowboy trailer, operated by Mervin Mark Millard of Eugene, was heading north slowly. As the vehicles approached, an unidentified car was reported to have come out of the Riddle road.

Jennings is reported to have swerved to miss the car and subsequently sideswiped the tractor. State police said no citations were issued. They reported extensive damage to the panel truck, owned by the Rubenstein Furniture Co. of Eugene.

The driver of the tractor was uninjured. State police said the unidentified car and driver did not remain on the scene.

21 Inspectors, Engineers Hold Conference Here

Building inspectors and engineers from 11 western Oregon cities were in Roseburg Friday to start a plan for their own training in professional problems.

The city hosted 21 persons associated with the Oregon chapter of the West Coast Building Officials Conference. All seemed in favor of establishing a school under the school of civil engineering at Oregon State College.

It was pointed out during the meeting that building inspectors from the smaller cities often have several other duties in addition to inspection. That leaves little time for them to keep up on technicalities involved in their jobs.

Another case in point mentioned was that ordinances often are inadequate for modern building requirements. Building codes in smaller cities often are incomplete. In the larger communities, though, standard building codes are frequent.

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Officers charged the brother, Jack, 19, with violation of basic rule. He said he cut the corner, near Melrose Dairy at 10 miles per hour while he and his friend were on the way to the football game. Harry Harris, CV Star 17, was cited by state police for following too closely in traffic. He told officers he was passing another car just before the collision.

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No Objections Raised To Plan For RR Crossing

The possibility of soon opening up a rich timber and mineral area southwest of Riddle became a probability Friday afternoon when no objections were raised to a county plan for constructing a railroad crossing near Doe Creek.

The Public Utilities Commission conducted a hearing in the County Courthouse on the matter at the request of the county.

The Southern Pacific Co., represented by attorney Joseph Larkin, made no objection to the proposed crossing if the PUC finds it is necessary for the public welfare.

PUC Examiner C. E. Jaqua said it will be a few weeks before the commission's findings are reported.

But, county and railroad officials are already discussing a secondary property settlement and are outside the realm of the PUC. An easement must be arranged so the county can construct the crossing on SP's right-of-way.

The proposed crossing would cross the tracks at a right angle at a point near Doe Creek, north of Cow Creek and about seven miles from Riddle. An earlier proposal for a crossing at a lesser angle was vetoed by SP and the PUC.

A road already extends into the area, where several million feet of secondary mineral and timber is not now accessible. The road was built in 1903, but not used since 1919 when SP constructed a culvert where a small underpass had been.

Dist. Atty. Robert M. Stults presented the county's case at the hearing. He told before members of the county court and a few other interested persons.

Several persons testified as to the necessity for a crossing and the fact that the place proposed is the only logical one. They included Elmer Metzger, county commissioner; Floyd Frear, county road engineer; Tom Clark, manager of the timber department of Roseburg Lumber Co., and Robert Kischel, county land agent.

It was brought out that some timber cut in the area and some chrome ore which has been mined are sitting there, with operators anticipating construction of the crossing. At present, the only access is over private property where loggers and miners must "pay high tribute" to the property owner, Frear said.
