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than had been expected; (2) that the trout had sounded into the depths of the lake and would appear slowly over the next couple of days.

In connection with the last point, field agents said rotenone works slowly, and the picture at the end of the day may not have been a true one.

On Sunday evening, a test was held at the north end of the lake, near the old fish hatchery. Rotenone was spread, and roach appeared on the surface. Monday, trout were discovered dead by the hundreds in log jams at the head of Lake Creek. Most were small.

The Game Commission's mindful of public interest in the poisoning, held off the actual operation until the appointed date, although its agents were ready to go Monday afternoon.

Monday was a perfect day for such an undertaking, and Tuesday only less so. The lake on Monday, where a "dry run" was made to coordinate all phases of the operation, was glassy smooth. It was barely choppy Tuesday, but not enough to raise whitecaps in the water.

For the winning couple, it means a \$1,000 trip by air to the Series. This covers plane fare, tickets to the games, hotel rooms and meals. Tickets to all the New York games have already been secured, and it is expected tickets to the Cleveland game will be received soon.

A contest is being run off this week to determine the winner, who will be named Saturday at the Roseburg Armory between wrestling matches.

Funds raised from the money-raising contest will be used for equipment and facilities for recreational parks and playgrounds in Roseburg. Last year, funds were raised to help pay off debts of the Roseburg Chiefs baseball team.

Hagedorn said the Jaycees believe a "decided lack of playground facilities" exist for younger children in Roseburg. Reflecting that belief, the Jaycees are currently building a city playground on Fowler street with funds obtained from last year's contest.

Fall Extension Courses Offered Area Residents

The first of a series of fall extension courses to be offered Roseburg area residents was announced today by County School Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg.

Barneburg said the courses, offered through the General Extension Division, will begin Monday, Sept. 27. All will start at 7 p.m. in Room 304 of Central Junior High School and will continue through 10 or 11 weeks.

The course starting Monday night is Sc102, Biological Science Survey, taught by Mildred Erickson. It carries three college credit hours.

On Tuesday night, Ed435, Audio-Visual Aids, will start. The extension division said the instructor will be Mr. Grassel. It also is for three credits.

On Thursday night, Sept. 30, class will start in Ed106, Oregon School Law and System of Education. The instructor will be Byron Evans. It carries two hours credit.

Barneburg said it is expected that a course in Oregon history will be given during the winter term.

William Harpole, former city recorder, has been appointed as mayor of Elktion. He will complete the unexpired term of Franklin Moore.

Moore resigned last week because of the pressure of private business, which he said kept him out of town too much, according to Elktion Correspondent Mrs. C. W. Henderer. Moore said he could not devote the proper amount of time to his duties as mayor.

Harpole was selected by the City Council to replace Moore. Carl Licklider was named as a new council member and immediately took over the city recorder's job.

Logger Injured, Trucks Damaged In 3 Accidents

Three logging accidents in Douglas County within the past two days have sent one man to the hospital, burned one logging truck and caused considerable damage to another.

A young Roseburg logger, Stephen Makinson, 16, 327 Sweet Briar Ave., was reported in good condition at Community Hospital Wednesday morning by hospital personnel. Makinson was struck on the head by a snag Tuesday morning.

According to a relative, he was turning a caterpillar around on an independent logging operation in Melrose where the cat hit a snag. Makinson received some bruises but was not seriously injured.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed a logging truck belonging to Al Barrow of Roseburg Tuesday morning. The truck reportedly caught fire above Emile dump on Little River. The driver was unidentified.

A quick jump from the cab of his logging truck probably saved the life of Joe Boudreau of Myrtle Creek late Monday evening. The truck airbrakes reportedly went out 96 miles east of Roseburg on Jackson Creek. Boudreau's truck rolled some 200 feet down an embankment. Damage was estimated at around \$5,000. The truck was brought into Roseburg Tuesday by Mohr Towing Service.

Representatives Of Nine PTA's Presented Gavel

Representatives of the nine Parent Teacher Assn. organizations in Roseburg's School District 4 have been given gavel by the district.

The gavel was presented by Supt. Mike Deller as a symbol of the school's appreciation to the groups. They were made in the Roseburg Senior High School shop class by class members.

Blood Collection Totals 150 Pints In South Douglas

Collections of blood totaled 150 pints at Canyonville and Myrtle Creek Monday and Tuesday. The official total was reported today by Red Cross Blood Recruitment Chairman Mrs. Walter Britnell of Roseburg. She said bloodmobile personnel was "very pleased" at the turnout. It is a favorable comparison to the 300 to 400 pints received on visits of the bloodmobile in the greater population area of Roseburg, she said. She reported 75 people gave blood at each of the two towns.

The bloodmobile personnel also had high praise for volunteer help in the two areas. The visit to Myrtle Creek was organized by Beta Xi chapter of Beta Sigma Phi with Mrs. Robert Iholts as chairman. The chapter was assisted by members of the Eastern Star, Job's Daughters and Lady Lions.

The Lady Lions took over direction of the Canyonville visit under chairmanship of Mrs. Milton Herbert. Eastern Star and Rebekahs 183 assisted. The Forest Glen Hospital staff also aided greatly in recruiting donors, Mrs. Britnell said.

Blood collected was transported by refrigerated truck to the Regional Blood Center in Portland for necessary tests and typing before distribution. Blood banks are now maintained by the Myrtle Creek Hospital and Forest Glen for transfusions.

The next visit of the Red Cross bloodmobile in Roseburg is scheduled Nov. 23 and 24. Facilities will be set up at the Elks ballroom.

County, State Health Officers Will Meet Here

Twenty-one county health officers and several members of the State Board of Health will be in Roseburg Thursday for the fall meeting of the Oregon Health Officers Assn.

Informal round-table discussions will be held at the Hotel Umpqua Thursday and Friday, and a banquet is scheduled for Thursday evening, according to County Health Officer Dr. E. J. Waincott.

Dr. Waincott said those attending will include Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer. Sessions will begin at 9:30 a.m. Thursday.

Everything relative to public health will be up for discussion, Dr. Waincott said. Among the topics which probably will be touched upon are the polio situation, school health problems, proposed health legislation, the governor's home safety program, tuberculosis control, general sanitation, priorities of Civil Defense, the state's mental health program and state and local financing of health programs.

Dr. George Wadsworth, manager of the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, is due to speak on mental health. Dr. Waincott emphasized, however, that the two-day session will be made up mostly of informal discussion. Members of the association feel more can be accomplished that way, the health officer said.

late admittance of their children into previously all-white schools, will try again to take their case to court today.

If they do, it will be the first time since the recent Supreme Court ruling banning segregation in schools that the issue finds its way into Northern courts.

MILFORD, Del. (AP)—Schoolchildren in this southeastern Delaware town enjoyed their third holiday this week today while school officials wrestled with the problem of integrating the community's two schools, one previously all-white, the other all-Negro.

The Board of Education closed the schools last Monday "in the best interests of the children" after threats of violence if white and Negro high school pupils were allowed to continue studying side by side.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court announced Wednesday that it will hear further arguments Dec. 6 on how to carry out its decision against racial segregation in public schools.

Room Available For Upholstery Class Sessions

Two classes in upholstery got underway in Roseburg Monday. Adult Education Director Richard Boss said Tuesday that there was still room for more students in the classes.

Class members are meeting five times (Monday through Friday) weekly for the next two weeks, Boss said.

Area residents interested in attending class may still do so, he emphasized. They can catch up with other class members' work in one of two ways. A person may attend both the afternoon and evening classes or a husband and wife may attend the evening sessions. In either case a single \$3 fee would cover enrollment, Boss added.

Afternoon classes are held from 1 to 4 p.m., evening classes from 7 to 10 p.m. They are held at the Social Arts Building, on Roseburg Senior High School campus.
