

Rubinoff's Violin Mastery Demonstrated At Concert

Bold music pictures were painted Wednesday evening at Roseburg Senior High School Gymnasium by Rubinoff and his violin.

His program, which dipped briefly into the masters, consisted primarily of "pop" pieces and a few current, juke box favorites. Some of the arrangements, and we assume they were all made by the violinist, traveled a long way from the original composition before returning to familiar strains.

Rubinoff is a heavy fiddler who plays with much gusto. Without doubt he is a master showman. During his evening performance before more than 500, Rubinoff played his Stradivarius and directed the orchestra, a group of about 150 students, in playing the violin.

The audience rendition of "The Star Spangled Banner," accompanied by violin and piano, closed the program.

According to the Roseburg Kiwanis Club, sponsor of the violinist's appearance, nearly 500 attended the violinist's afternoon concert.

Rubinoff's real virtuosity was occasionally given an opportunity to shine through. More so in the final half of his program when he played "straight" the selections "Sousaphone" and "When Day Is Done."

In his other numbers, which ranged from 14 interpretations of "Don't Fence Me In" (an audience favorite) to "Rhapsody in Blue," the artist's control of his instrument was evident. The violinist, laughing, whistled, gave bird calls, did almost everything except tell jokes. Rubinoff used the pizzicato technique frequently, with much skill.

Prior to his first encore, Brahms' "Lullaby," Rubinoff said he had given the concert with a temperature of 101 degrees. Adding, though, that "I might as well play another number since there's no place to go here at night." (The audience clapped agreement.) In additional comment, the violinist

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speech did no out-and-out plugging for election of GOP candidates for Congress.

But he did have kind words for Republican Sen. Guy Cordon of Oregon, who is bidding for reelection in a hard fought contest with Richard Neuberger, the Democratic candidate.

"My good friend Sen. Guy Cordon," Eisenhower said, is one of those who has "labored tirelessly" to complete McNary Dam, which is named for the late U. S. Sen. Charles McNary of Oregon.

The President also praised by name Rep. Hal Holmes, Washington Republican seeking re-election, as another who has worked in behalf of the project.

Without naming any of them or mentioning the party tag, Eisenhower took a verbal swat at Democrats — and Independent Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon — who have been critical of his administration's power policy. Of the critics he declared:

"They argue that to permit any state or local government or any private company under governmental regulation to develop... power capacity is to give to a special group an asset belonging to all the nation.

"Indeed, in some instances these enthusiastic disciples of centralized responsibility and authority insist that since the federal government should provide all hydroelectric power, it should eliminate competition by providing steam electric power as well....

"These believers in centralization fail to warn us that monopoly is always potentially dangerous to freedom—even when monopoly is exercised by government.

"Curiously enough, they proclaim their fear of a private power monopoly in a country, city or state, but urge upon us all a gigantic, overwhelming, nationwide power monopoly. But, of course, they see themselves as the all-wise directors of that monopoly—so all would be well."

The President said that as federal power expands in a region, local enterprise "becomes increasingly intimidated and discouraged."

"Thus still more federal intervention becomes necessary. Such a conversion of local regions into federal satellites poses a threat deadly to our liberties."

The main issue in the controversy, Eisenhower said, is not public power versus unregulated private power.

"The true issue posed to us is federal monopoly of power, as against public or regulated private power, freely chosen in each instance by the citizens of the area, with the federal government drawn in as a co-operating partner where this seems necessary or desirable," the President said.

He added that he will "continue to recommend federal construction of such beneficial projects" as the proposed Libby Dam near the U. S. — Canadian border. But he said:

"It is not properly a federal responsibility to try to supply all the power needs of our people. The federal government should no more attempt to do so than it should assume responsibility for supplying all their drinking water, their food, their housing and their transportation."

Eisenhower said the philosophy he set forth is only a part of a commonly held objective which "transcends all partisan and sectional considerations." That objective, he added, "is that this republic shall, in every way, grow stronger and more secure—that it may remain at peace in a world freed of the threat of atomic war."

Former Glide, Roseburg Resident Dies In Salem

Mrs. Addie Witham, 90, widow of the late Henry C. Witham and former resident of Glide and Roseburg, died at Salem Sept. 22. She was born at Corvallis on Feb. 24, 1864, and was married there on July 20, 1884, to Henry C. Witham who preceded her in death in Roseburg on March 12, 1940. She has made her home at Glide for many years and later resided in Roseburg until 1942.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Ray (Edna) Vanderbeck, Salem, and Mrs. David (Annie) Flemings, Corvallis; a brother, three grandchildren and a number of great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

Graveside funeral services will be held at Roseburg Memorial Gardens, Saturday, Sept. 25, at 1:30 p.m., with the Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church officiating. Funeral arrangements are in care of the Long & Orr Mortuary.

Opponents Batter Hells Canyon Dam Issue In Talks

Oregon's rival candidates for the U. S. Senate seat now held by Republican Guy Cordon continued their long-range debate Wednesday on power policy.

Cordon spoke twice in Northeast Oregon before crossing the state line to greet President Eisenhower at Walla Walla.

He told groups at Joseph and Milton-Freewater that he was instrumental in getting McNary Dam built, and added that his position on the Hells Canyon Dam had been presented fairly.

Cordon insisted that he had favored a federal Hells Canyon Dam, and said of his Democratic opponent, Richard L. Neuberger:

"Has he told you this—that Cordon in 1950 drafted and presented on the floor of the United States Senate an amendment to authorize the Hells Canyon Dam to be built by the Bureau of Reclamation? That amendment was killed with the help of every left-winger in the Senate except one—the Independent Party."

Meanwhile Neuberger spoke at Astoria, and again accused Secretary of Interior McKay of abandoning Hells Canyon to the Idaho Power Co., and Sen. Cordon of supporting the abandonment.

"These men have not acted in the best interests of Oregon in relinquishing Hells Canyon to an absentee-dominated power company," he said.

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From their cells was not known. From then on for six hours, officers said the place "looked like a madhouse," with men running shouting, howling and fighting in the glare of fire from burning buildings.

"They ran in and grabbed me and pushed me outside just as the shooting started," Carlington related.

Myrtle Creek Youth Bound To Grand Jury

One of two 18-year-old Myrtle Creek youths arrested in connection with a recent series of burglaries was bound over to the grand jury Wednesday after arraignment before Justice of the Peace Nina Pielzold, Canyonville.

Bail of \$1,500 on a burglary charge was placed on Everett Edward Carleton. He pleaded guilty to an earlier charge of carrying a concealed weapon and was fined \$50, plus court costs.

Another 18-year-old, Robert Keith Reymann, is also being held for the grand jury. His bail is \$3,000.

Several juveniles have been arrested in connection with burglaries in the Myrtle Creek area. Two of them have been granted probation, following their appearance in juvenile court at Roseburg.

Father Misses Seeing Own Baby Born On TV

CINCINNATI (AP)—Television viewers in southwestern Ohio watched a baby born by a cesarean operation here Wednesday night but the father missed most of it.

Shortly before the operation went on the air over station WLW-TV, the father had to take his mother-in-law home because she was ill. He was reported to have seen a bit of telecast at his mother-in-law's home but by the time he got back to the hospital the baby girl had been born.

North Bend Man Pleads Innocent To Gold Charge

PORTLAND (AP)—Wilbur M. Walls, North Bend hotel owner, pleaded innocent Wednesday to illegal possession of gold bullion, and trial was set for Nov. 30 by U. S. District Judge Claude McCulloch.

Walls, 60, is accused of acquiring 100 ounces of gold bullion without a federal license. Two other men, Woodrow W. Atwood, 41, and Stephen Crippen, 44, both of Medford, pleaded guilty to similar charges last month.

Senate Session Date Uncertain

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republican leader Knowland of California advised Senate officers Thursday that it may be several days before a decision is reached on when the Senate will reconvene to consider proposed censure of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Mark Trice, secretary of the Senate, gave this statement to reporters:

"I have just talked over the telephone with Sen. William Knowland, majority leader, and he informs me that further consultations are necessary before a decision can be reached in regard to the reconvening of the Senate. Several days may be required before a decision is reached in the matter."

Trice had indicated earlier that he was expecting instructions momentarily from Knowland and Sen. Johnson of Texas, the Democratic leader, to issue a formal call for the Senate to convene. He waited in his office until late Wednesday night to hear from Knowland.

Trice's announcement appeared to eliminate the possibility that the Senate will be called back on Sept. 29, a date that had been widely mentioned at the capitol earlier. Senate leaders must give five days advance notice in calling a session.

Some Slash Burning Continues In County

Slash burning throughout the county continues at a not-too-rapid pace. Douglas Forest Protective Assn. Dispatcher Wayne Miller added that permits on more than 13,000 acres have been taken out by residents.

Down in the southern portion of Douglas County about 1,000 acres of slash were burning by Wednesday, reports Glendale News-Review Correspondent Mrs. Gerald B. Fox.

Bud Knowles, DFWA District deputy at Quines Creek, told Mrs. Fox that all burning was under control.

Neither Plaintiff Nor Defendant Get Judgments

Neither plaintiffs nor defendant won judgments in a district court jury trial presided over by Judge Elmer G. Baldwin Wednesday.

John A. Harris and Premier Insurance Co. had sought \$237.66 in damages from Lee B. Vale as the result of a traffic collision on Jan. 23, 1954. In a counterclaim, Vale sought \$100.55 from the plaintiffs.

But the jury found for the defendant in the first part and for the plaintiffs in the second.

Martin Urges Election Of GOP

EVERETT, Wash. (AP)—House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, one of three top Republicans visiting the Pacific Northwest, urged election of a "solid Republican bloc" in Congress next November at a party rally here Wednesday night.

The Massachusetts legislator predicted a stalemate in Congress should the Democrats win in November. He said it happened in 1931 when the Democrats "sabotaged Herbert Hoover" and could happen again if the Republicans are not returned to Washington.

Martin, who with President Eisenhower and Undersecretary of Commerce Walter Williams arrived in Washington state this week, said the President's plans for the nation were based on a four-year program. The "34 million Americans who called him from private life two years ago have a responsibility to give him a Republican Congress," Martin added.

The President's stopover at Walla Walla was in connection with the dedication Thursday of McNary Dam, and wasn't billed as a political visit.

Sen. Kefauver Leaves For Speeches In Oregon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) left Wednesday night on a speech-making tour that will carry him through 14 states, including Oregon.

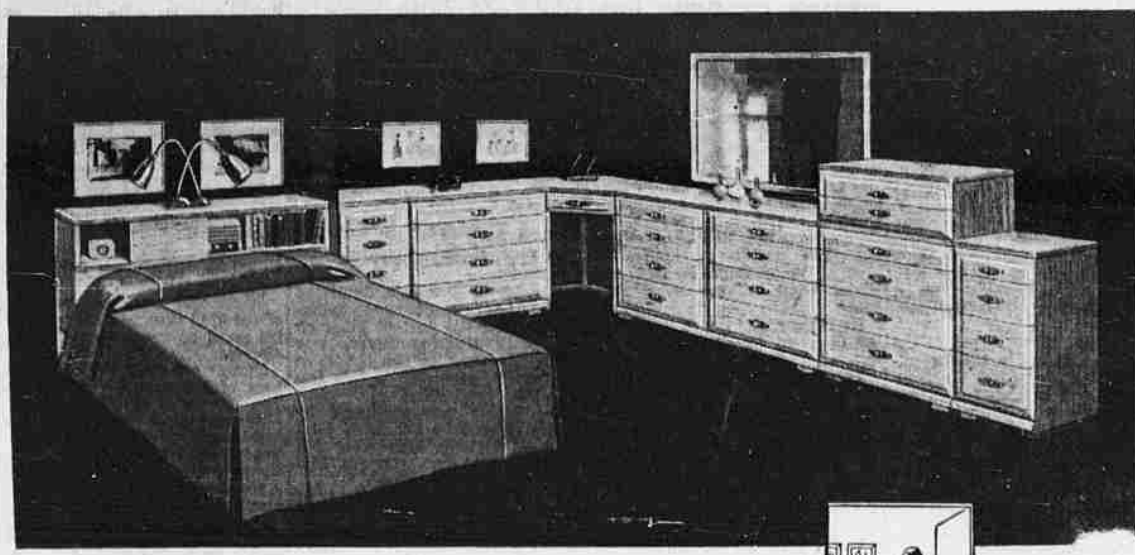


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
