

Girl Living Alone While Father Awaits U.S. Reentry

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Inez de Koning, a Dutch girl who doesn't exactly like living alone, but the 12-year-old Dutch girl says she manages to keep occupied enough to prevent boredom and loneliness. Inez, who came to this country less than three years ago, has an apartment in a central Philadelphia hotel where she cooks and keeps house for herself, when she's not in school. She has been living there, alone, since her father, Theodore de Koning, an electrical engineer, returned to the Netherlands for a visit more than a month ago and then found himself barred by immigration rules from immediate reentry to the United States. Blonde, blue-eyed Inez had gone to camp for the summer. She got back on Aug. 21. Since then, with Mrs. Agnes Allen, the hotel manager, keeping a motherly eye on her, Inez is a "very independent and self-sustaining child," says Mrs. Allen. The girl attends Friends Select school, a private institution run by the Quakers and has made many friends in her three school years. She passes part of her time with them and devotes many hours to reading and studying. Inez's father was in the United States for eight years, having entered on a first preference classification because his services were "urgently needed," by an American concern according to Henry Mulle, acting district director of the immigration and naturalization office here.

De Koning returned to Europe without "any knowledge on our part and even without the Low-ledge of his employer, Mulle added. An extension of the first preference classification was rejected, Mulle continued, because the "concern advised us" it was no longer interested in his services. The director said de Koning could return to this country under a first preference classification if another American concern filed a petition for reentry. The first 50 per cent of a foreign country's immigration quota is reserved for first preference classifications. The other way de Koning could come back, said Mulle, would be under the regular quota system. De Koning wrote his daughter that he was trying through both Dutch and American officials to speed his readmission.

Suspect Is Held In Boy's Death

SIoux CITY, Iowa, (AP) — A Sioux City detective said Thursday "I think we have the right man" in the abduction-slaying of 8-year-old Jimmie Bremmer. Detective Lt. Harry J. Gibbons identified the man as itinerant salesman previously questioned at length in the case. No charge has been filed. The salesman, described by Police Chief James O'Keefe as "psychotic as well as homosexual," steadfastly denies any knowledge of Jimmie's death. The man has admitted talking to the boy on Aug. 31, the night he disappeared from near his home here. Police decline to name the man. The month long search for the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Bremmer ended Wednesday in a pasture only four miles from the lad's home. Three highway maintenance men found the mutilated body.

Secretary McKay Enters Campaign For Republicans

PORTLAND (AP) — Interior Secretary McKay, pressed into the Oregon election campaign, will open with a series of conferences in Portland Tuesday and close with a Friday luncheon at Medford. Republican headquarters here Wednesday said this is the schedule as McKay presents the administration point of view. Tuesday: A series of conferences and personal appearances during the day, climaxed by a TV address in the evening. Wednesday: Conference with Republican leaders at Astoria; luncheon talk at Tillamook; chats with party leaders at Hebo, Valley Junction, Dallas and Corvallis en route to a 7 p. m. address before Linn County precinct workers at Albany. Thursday: Meetings in Eugene through the early part of the day including a luncheon and a 1 p. m. address at a University of Oregon assembly; afternoon visits and informal talks at sawmills at Oakland and Sutherlin; a public address at 8 p. m. at Roseburg. Friday: Talks with Josephine County party heads at Grants Pass in the morning and a luncheon with precinct committeemen at Medford at noon. Following the luncheon McKay will go to California where two talks have been scheduled. He then will return to Washington, D. C.

Mitchell's reply Wednesday: "When Mr. Nixon conglomerates Communists, fellow travelers and security risks in one group, he is playing a dishonest game of words to give a false impression. It is as though a police chief boasted about capturing 'thousands of murderers, kidnapers and parking violators,' when his record shows one suspected murderer, one suspected kidnaper and 2,000 parking violators."

quille see a need for improvement of that route. Other communities, along the bay, eye the path of the old Coos Bay Wagon Road, now maintained jointly by the counties. That difference was resolved in the proposal to the Highway Commission. The commission will be asked in the resolution to build a "heavy-duty highway of State Highway Commission engineering standards from the ports of the Coos Bay area, Roseburg, to the junction of the Cascade Lakes Highway." It added that the route should be made the most "direct and feasible" to best serve the economy of the area.

The Cascade Lakes Highway is Highway 230. The resolution was introduced by Mayor L. N. Bartley of North Bend. Bill Oeding, member of the Roseburg Chamber, started the resolution on its way to approval when he told the assembly to "think big" in planning for development. He predicted that it might be possible to ship wheat from Coos Bay that now goes through Portland, "then spends three days on its way down the river to the sea." "I'd like to see the diesel trucks go roaring through Roseburg from eastern Oregon," he declared. Then he explained that if such a highway were opened, the way also would be clear for tourists from the East to head directly for the Coast.

Varied Weather Reported Over Country Today

There was a variety of weather across the nation Thursday. It was cool, with snow in the Rocky Mountain regions; cool in northern Midwest areas; hot and humid in the Southwest, and normal in most other parts of the country. Several areas reported rain, while skies were cloudy over many sections. Snow was reported in parts of Montana, Wyoming and Idaho, with falls from Northern Montana into Wyoming and as far south as Laramie, Wyo., which reported two inches on the ground. Temperatures were below freezing in some sections.

The colder Canadian air continued to move southward across the plains. Showers and thunderstorms were reported from the Western Great Lakes southward into Texas. There was a broad belt of light rain and drizzle extending over Western Minnesota and the Eastern Dakotas into Northern Nebraska. Another band of drizzle stretched along the Southern New England coast. Widely scattered showers fell over the southwestern states. Negroes Seeking Action To End Desegregation

A move by a group of Ohio Negroes to bring about an immediate end to public school segregation has been blocked by the ruling of a federal judge, while the governor of Delaware pondered ways to ease tense integration problems in that border state between the North and South.

Negro leaders said at Columbus, Ohio, Thursday they planned to carry their fight to the U. S. Supreme Court if necessary. The immediate situation in Ohio centers at Hillsboro, The National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People is spearheading the fight.

John L. Francis, president of the Ohio conference of the NAACP branches, said he was "shocked" at U.S. Judge John H. Druffel's refusal to act now on a request to halt "enforced segregation" in Hillsboro schools.

In turning down a plea for an injunction, the judge said that any decision given at this time might be contrary to the pattern of integration yet to be decided on by the Supreme Court. Several Negroes sought ways to bring peace to troubled areas in the southern part of that state. Schools are being boycotted at Milford and nearby communities by white families who object to the integration of 11 Negro students at the elementary high school where 1,562 students attend classes.

Only 537 white students in a registration of 2,074 reported Wednesday for classes here and in four surrounding communities. In Georgia, Lt. Gov. Marvin Griffin accepted the formal Democratic nomination as governor with a renewal of his pledge that "during the time I am governor there will be no mixed schools or colleges."

Democratic nomination is the same as election in Georgia. Griffin favors a so-called private school system under which grants of state, county or city funds would be made to individuals in discharge of all state education obligations.

INDIA FOURTH

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru proclaimed Thursday that India is "obviously the fourth country in the world" after the United States, Russia and Red China.

Douglas St. has been promoted and will be headquartered in Pendleton beginning Monday. McGuire said Dryer will be supervising wire chief for the eastern Oregon district. He will be replaced by Lucian Clement now in Medford. Dryer's wife and daughter Karen will remain in Roseburg until the close of the current school year, McGuire said. He was honored at a luncheon Tuesday by 12 local supervisory employees. The new wire editor will be moving to Roseburg with his wife and two children shortly.

Canyonville Man Dies Wednesday

John Daniel West, 67, Canyonville, died Wednesday following a short illness. West was born at Des Moines, Iowa, Jan. 8, 1887. At the age of 10, he moved to Oklahoma, where he lived eight years. From there he moved to New Mexico, and later to Los Angeles, Calif., where he spent most of his life. He operated a ranch near Riddle from 1926 to 1946 and moved to Canyonville a year later. On April 12, 1912, he married Martha Lee Haynes, who preceded him in death in 1953. Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Myrtle Schertz of Canyonville and Mrs. Olive Winters of Los Angeles and a brother, Ray, of Paso Robles, Calif. Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Friday at the chapel of Ganz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek. The Rev. Ronald Curran of the Assembly of God Church of Shady Cove will officiate. Interment will follow in the Masonic Cemetery in Canyonville.

Retrial Slated For John Provoo; Warrant Issued

BALTIMORE (AP) — John David Provoo, former Army staff sergeant, whose conviction and life sentence for treason were upset by the U. S. Court of Appeals, will be retried here, probably early next year. A new warrant charging the 36-year-old former San Francisco bank clerk with treason while a prisoner of the Japanese in World War II, was issued here Wednesday. U. S. Atty. George Cochran Doub said he will seek an indictment before the Federal District Court grand jury convening here Oct. 18. He hopes to bring Provoo to trial within three months of that time. Doub, who said he believes the government considers "this the most important treason trial since that of Aaron Burr," indicated the new trial will be as costly and drawn out as the first. In one of the weirdest cases to come out of World War II, Provoo was convicted Feb. 11, 1953, of broadcasting wartime propaganda for the Japanese, of abusing fellow American soldiers in prison camps, and of causing the death of Army Capt. Burton C. Thomson of Swea City, Iowa, by informing on him. Federal Judge Gregory F. Noon sentenced him to life in prison. The U. S. District Court of Appeals in New York last Aug. 27 upset the conviction and sentence on the ground that Provoo should have been tried in Maryland where he was an Army prisoner at the time of his arrest on the treason charge. The Appeals Court also said the government wrongfully insinuated before the jury that Provoo was homosexual.

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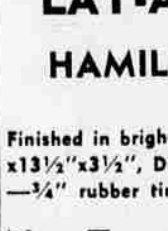
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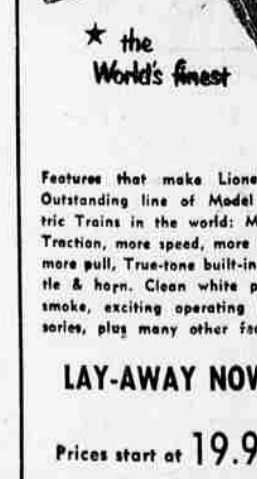
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
