County's Timber Volume Assures Good Economy

Since 1945, the annual aggregate lumber production by Douglas County sawmills totals 859,907,000 board feet—Scribner rule. Much of the rough lumber from the smaller sawmills is disposed of to the manufacturing plants located in Roseburg and other industrial centers in the county. These plants cut the lumber and finish on four-sides into popular sizes, and ship it to other sections of the nation. For economic reasons some of these smaller sawmills in the county have stopped, temporarily, their cutting of rough lumber.

It is also interesting to note that Douglas County is quite fortunate in having in its timber inventory a variety of softwood species for the manufacture of lumber and lumber specialties. It was pointed out by Chester O. Broders, in his economical survey of the Inland Empire Basin, published in 1951, that this is a distinct advantage to the Roseburg region since it opens up a broader scope of markets.

Douglas County area is favored by having a timber land ownership pattern which is conducive to setting up a sustained yield management pattern for the greater part of the forest area. According to the survey of the U. S. Forest Service many of the mature stands of sawtimber in the county are over-mature and actually losing, rather than adding, annual growth increment due to losses from the various decay agencies that attack the over-mature or over-aged timber. This condition suggests the wisdom of cutting this type of timber as heavily, in the next few years, as a sustained yield management program would permit. This should be done, in the opinion of some, as rapidly as possible in order to make room for healthy production stands.

about solely by reason of the provocation of an organization known as the National Assn. for the Advancement of White People," Marshall said in a telegram to Brownell last night.

In Washington, a group of white students arranged to meet with Principal Richard E. Bish of the McKinley school and discuss problems arising from the Supreme Court ruling outlawing segregation in the public schools.

The students were among 150 who walked out at McKinley yesterday and demonstrated for three quarters of an hour.

In a noisy session several pupils demanded the 419 Negroes at the school be sent elsewhere. There are 388 white pupils at McKinley.

About 400 other students walked out at Anacostia school, where 43 Negroes are enrolled.

In Baltimore, four representatives of civic groups asked the state's attorney to institute a grand jury probe into present unrest in the public schools in an effort to find out whether any criminal charges should be brought.

Italy, Yugoslavia Settle Vital Trieste Squabble

in Rome, Trieste and all major cities.

The Fascists oppose the compromise because Italy doesn't get all the territory. The reds are against it because Moscow is.

Under the agreement:

1. The Port of Trieste and the rest of zone A, except for a small strip on the southern border near Lazzaretto, go to Italy. The zone has been under British-American military occupation since World War II.

2. Zone B, along with the small Lazzaretto strip, becomes Yugoslav. The zone had been under Yugoslav control since Marshal Tito's partisans swarmed in on May 1, 1945.

3. The 3,000 Italians in the Lazzaretto strip can return to Italian-controlled territory and can be compensated for their holdings if they desire. Some already have begun moving.

4. Yugoslavia will have full access to the port of Trieste.

5. Minority rights are guaranteed for both Italians in Yugoslav territory and Yugoslavs in Italian territory.

6. The 3,000 American and nearly 2,000 British troops in zone A will be withdrawn in stages over the next three weeks.

7. The United States and Britain in a supplementary statement announced they consider the settlement as final. Neither Italy nor Yugoslavia officially waived its claim to that portion of the territory. Signed the other. However, both actually expect the new boundaries to exist indefinitely.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Today's the day that Marilyn Monroe asks waivers on Joe DiMaggio, the former Yankee slugger.

The busy blonde, the movies' hottest property since the Warner studio fires, is slated to file suit for divorce.

Her attorney, Jerry Giesler, said yesterday that a conflict of careers caused the rift in the nine-month marriage.

Actually Giesler made the understatement of the year. This was a romance that Hollywood never expected to get to matrimony's first base, so little did the two have in common.

Before she married Joe, Marilyn thought a shortstop was something that cross-country bus passengers did. DiMaggio hadn't seen a movie since "Pride of the Yankees," the Lou Gehrig story. He couldn't care less about Hollywood's dizzy whirl.

This breakup, unexpected as it was, is an old, old story. And it again raises the question: Why can't Hollywood marriages last?

There are many reasons, but career trouble is the most prevalent. Monroe is the town's biggest star, if not its best actress. She has to work even harder than some, because it doesn't come easy. Her studio, knowing that each will make more money than the previous, puts her in picture after picture, sometimes starting one before she finishes another.

What free time she has she spends reading and memorizing scripts. If Joe wants a dish of his favorite fodder, spaghetti, he has to tell the cook about it. In his spare time, which has been considerable, he plays poker or watches baseball on TV. He never has escorted his wife to any of the

functions a star of her import is expected to attend.

Shortly after their marriage a magazine named her as filmland's most popular star. A press agent escorted her to the affair while Joe waited outside the hotel. Marilyn told friends she was hurt about this, but that she knew she couldn't change the taciturn, Hollywood-shy DiMaggio.

It isn't a question of money. The Yankees paid Joe more than \$700,000. The fans now cheer for Dusty Rhodes. Marilyn earns \$3,500 a week, and the fans can't see enough of her.

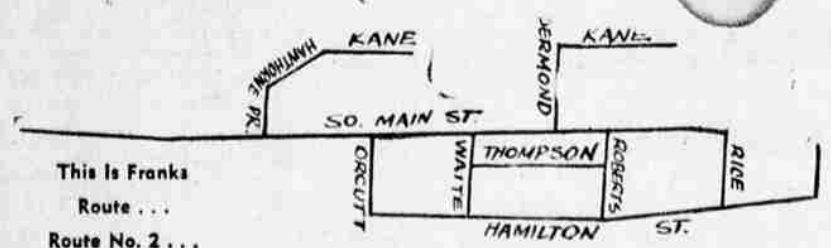
