FHA Standards Set Up For Slum Clearance Aid

WASHINGTON — Housing administrator Albert M. Cole has set up standards cities must meet to qualify for federal aid in slum clearance and "urban renewal" projects.

Each mayor, Cole said, must file with the Housing and Home Finance Agency a "workable plan" for slum clearance and slum prevention. Federal aid comes in loan and grant form.

But in issuing a leaflet describing the steps which must be taken to get federal help, Cole emphasized that the government considers antislum activity a "community responsibility."

"Each community will be expected to organize itself to approach these objectives in its own way," Cole said.

The leaflet contains an "outline of essentials" in questionnaire form to guide city authorities in preparing applications. These applications are to be sent to regional HHFA officials.

For the time being the applications will be relayed to Washington headquarters for processing. Later the regional offices will handle this job, Cole said.

HHFA certification will be required before a community can qualify for (1) Loans and grants; (2) Liberalized FHA mortgage insurance for renewal of deteriorating neighborhoods and for building low cost housing for displaced families; and (3) Low rent federally subsidized housing.

Convict Is Performer In Texas Air Show

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. — A parachute jump by an inmate serving two years for forgery highlighted the opening of the annual Texas Prison Rodeo Sunday.

Bill Kennedy, 34, left the plane at 1,500 feet and plopped down safely two blocks north of the prison stadium in front of Huntsville High School. He was trying to land in the stadium.

Kennedy, in on a forgery conviction from Dallas, will parachute again during succeeding rodeo performances, held each Sunday in October.

GOP Will Win Nov. 2—Nixon; CIO Criticizes

Vice President Nixon says the Republicans will win the Nov. 2 election "going away" and National Chairman Leonard Hall now sees the GOP "firmly on the high road."

Both men have emphasized in recent weeks that the Republicans must "run scared" to retain control of Congress.

The principal Democratic campaign volley fired off during the weekend came from Adlai Stevenson, the party's 1952 presidential candidate.

Addressing a Democratic rally in Detroit Saturday, Stevenson said "the most disturbing aspect of the GOP economic record in these past months is not just that we have slipped backward but... failure to show genuine, human concern over it."

The CIO's legislative department reported Sunday that in its view GOP members of Congress voted wrong and Democratic members voted right about three-fourths of the time in the last two years.

The report, based on voting on 28 "showdown" issues, said it will take "at least a few dozen replacements in Congress next year to make sure that the damage that had been done will be repaired."

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EDUCATOR DIES
PORTLAND — Dr. William "Monty" Griffith, 61, former head of the Reed College psychology department, died here Saturday.

Griffith retired from his Reed post in 1953 because of ill health. He came to the college in 1926, after teaching a year at the University of Washington.

Two sons, W. Brooks Griffith, Portland, and David L. Griffith, a student at the University of Oregon, survive.

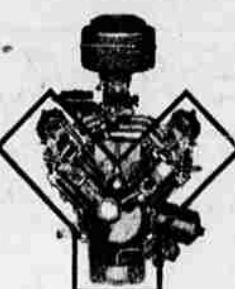
