

Farm Dept. Sees Business In 1955 About Like 1954

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department, in the first of a series of economic outlook reports for 1955, predicts that the year will be pretty much of a match of this year, business-wise.

The department annually makes forecasts for the year ahead for use of farmers and of its own officials in mapping farm production programs for the coming season.

The agency expects the general level of farm product prices to change little from this year. Currently, farm prices are 246 per cent of the 1910-14 average, compared with 257 per cent a year ago and the record high of 313 in February, 1951.

Today's farm prices average 88 per cent of parity, compared with 93 per cent a year ago and the record high of 123 per cent, set in October, 1946. Parity is a farm price said by law to be fair to farmers in terms of the costs of what they buy.

In its outlook reports, the department says prices of beef cattle and dairy products are not expected to be sharply different from this year, but that hog prices may be lower. Hog production has been increasing rather sharply.

Eisenhower Slates Political Conference Before Election

DENVER (AP)—President Eisenhower and Republican congressional leaders will hold a political strategy conference here Friday on the November elections.

Announcing this Tuesday, the Denver White House said the leaders and the chief executive also will review the international situation.

The conference will be held late in the day about two hours before Eisenhower makes a nationwide television-radio address here in behalf of election of a Republican Congress.

The congressional leaders and Vice President Nixon will join Eisenhower at the rally in Denver's Municipal Auditorium (6:30 p. m. PST).

Announcement of the Friday conference came shortly after the White House said the President is considering several invitations to make additional campaign speeches.

Some of the party leaders have been displaying increasing concern about Republican chances to maintain control of Congress. Some have called for Eisenhower to take a more active personal role in the campaign.

Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, told a news conference that the President and the congressional leaders—meeting for the first time since Eisenhower came to Colorado Aug. 21—will have "a general exchange of views on the political situation and other matters."

He added that those other mat-

ters "undoubtedly will include a review of the latest information the President has on the international situation."

Snyder said all of the top congressional leaders have been invited to the conference, but that he was unable to say for sure at this time just how many will be on hand because some have previous engagements.

He said the group being invited includes those who meet regularly with the President every Monday morning in Washington when Congress is in session.

Among those in that group are Sen. Knowland of California, the Senate majority leader; Sen. Ferguson of Michigan, chairman of the Senate Republican policy committee; Sen. Millikin of Colorado, chairman of the conference of all GOP senators; Sen. Saltonstall of Massachusetts, deputy majority leader; House Speaker Martin of Massachusetts; and Rep. Halleck of Indiana, the House majority leader.

Marchers To Protest McCarthy Censure Move
BALTIMORE (AP)—The head of two militant anti-Communist organizations has announced here that a nationwide "march on Washington" asking senators not to censure Sen. McCarthy will be staged Nov. 11.

Rabbi Schultz said the march will be a "people's movement especially for Sen. McCarthy."

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
