

Trusties Take Leisurely Ride In Stolen Plane

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—Police arrested two young men Monday who they said walked away from an Army stockade at Hanford, Wash., stole an airplane and took a leisurely flight over road blocks set up below.

Detective Lt. Raymond Rainville identified the pair as Duane Frederick McMahon, 22, of Clarkston, Wash., and Raymond Whaley, 18, Buhl, Idaho. They were arrested in a hotel here.

Rainville gave this account: McMahon and Whaley were trustees at the stockade. Last Saturday they went to the supply room and got some civilian clothes that had been checked in by other prisoners. They hid them in a trash barrel.

On Sunday, they put on the clothes and walked out through the gates. An alarm went out and police set up road blocks on the highways.

But McMahon and Whaley went to the Richland airport and spent the night in a light Stinson 205 plane. The next morning, with McMahon at the controls, the two flew off to Clarkston as police checked cars on the highway below.

Rainville said McMahon got in touch with his wife and son at Clarkston and took them for a ride in the airplane. They later went to a Lewiston hotel where Whaley also had a room, he said.

The detective said neither offered any resistance and that both were being held for Army authorities.

Rainville said officers checked the Clarkston airport after a stolen plane report came in and traced the pair to the hotel. He said McMahon told him he had taken flying lessons at Moscow, Idaho.

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Girl's Quick Action Saves Home From Fire

The Fred Broszio home in Wilbur escaped serious damage from fire Friday due to quick thinking of their young daughter, and to the haste of neighbors.

Maria, 11 years old, and her younger sister, Connie, were alone at home while their mother was out on her regular school bus run. The girls discovered a fire burning in their brother's room. The fire had started from a heater he had thought was out, and had ignited some clothes.

Maria tried to use the telephone, and finding the line was busy, she interrupted the parties using it by announcing that her home was on fire. Everett Thomas, who was using the line, and Mrs. Thomas rushed to the Broszio home, and put out the fire before any more damage could be done, other than the loss of the clothes and some damage by smoke.

This incident recalls a coincidence of several years ago, when the Broszios awakened the Thomas family in the middle of the night, to tell them the Thomas home was surrounded by a grass fire. This fire was also controlled before damage could be done to the house.

Two GIs Resist Efforts Of Czechs To Gain Secrets

NUERNBERG, Germany (AP)—Two American soldiers Monday accused their Czech Communist captors of threatening them with 10 years imprisonment if they refused to divulge U. S. military secrets.

The men, Capt. Richard H. Dries, 32, of St. Albans, Long Island, New York, and Pfc. George Pisk, 22, of Austin, Tex., talked at a news conference of their two-week confinement. Seized near the border in Bavaria on Sept. 17, they were released by Czech army officers Oct. 2 at the West German border point at Waldhaus.

"Czech officials asked me specifically about atomic weapons in Europe, what types of weapons

were here," Dries said. "I said: 'I know nothing about them.' That's all I told them other than what my name was, by rank and serial number."

The Red inquisitors angrily threatened to have both Dries and Pisk tried before a Communist court "and sentenced to 10 years in prison," the two men said.

Dries acted as spokesman through most of the conference. He said that neither he nor Pisk was physically mistreated, but they spent their two weeks imprisonment in solitary confinement.

"They put a tremendous amount of psychological pressure on us throughout the whole time," the tall, serious-looking captain said, chain-smoking as he told newsmen of the ordeal.

"From the beginning it was strongly indicated that if we did not talk, we would be considered spies and would be tried under Czech law," he continued. Neither he nor Pisk broke under the nearly constant interrogation, he emphasized.

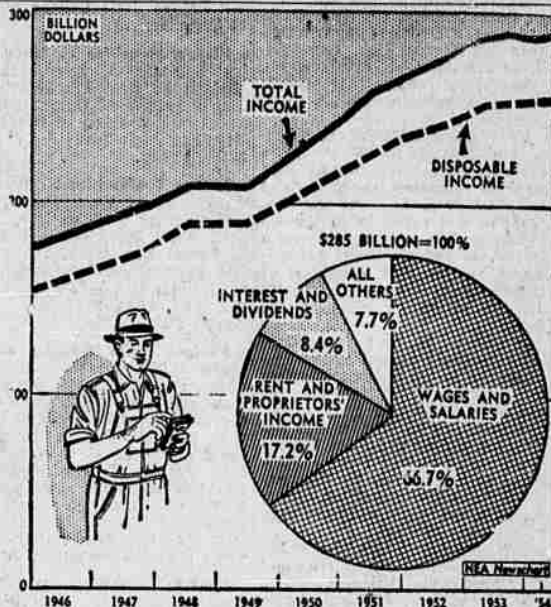
Hurricane Hazel Grows In Caribbean Waters

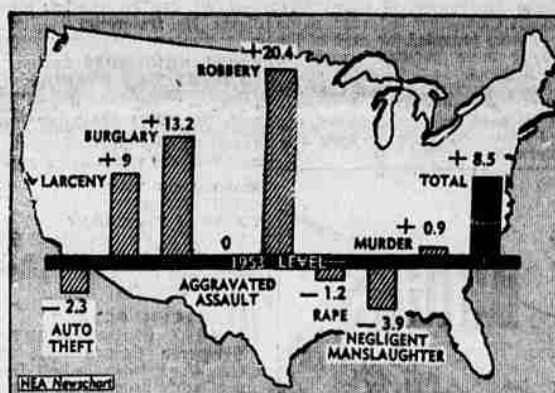
No land areas were in immediate danger from the eighth hurricane of the season, which was about 460 miles south-southeast of Puerto Rico.

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Police Force Architect From Top Of Steeple

BOSTON (AP)—While a crowd estimated at 5,000 persons looked on from below, police climbed the scaffolding around the steeple of the Park Street Church Monday night and brought down a man from a perch 156 feet up.

Police had been summoned by persons who spotted the man on the steeple.

"A man is going to jump from the steeple," police said they were told. The same phrase passed from the lips of one person to another as they gazed upward toward the man who didn't seem to notice the crowd below.

When police finally reached the man, he identified himself as Russell Oatman, 27, of Marblehead, and said he is an architect engaged in taking measurements of the steeple.

Police, who openly expressed skepticism, took him to the police station while Oatman protested: "I have no intention of jumping. I have work to do at the steeple." From the station, police called an official of Oatman's employer, Gilham, Hopkins, Greeley & Brodie Co.

Sure enough, Oatman had official business on the steeple. What's more he'd been up there several times the past few weeks making sketches from which a master remodeling plan will be drawn.

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Three-Year-Old Girl Dies From Switching

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—A tiny three-year-old girl, switched by her mother for wetting her bed, died here Monday night after lying in critical condition in Riley Hospital since Aug. 8.

Sheriff Walter J. Sauley of Jefferson County said he had held up a grand jury investigation to see whether Pamela Hulett of Madison would live.

Dr. Jack Modisett of Madison told Sheriff Sauley he sent the girl here by private ambulance after a call at the home of her mother, Mrs. Norma Hulett, 22.

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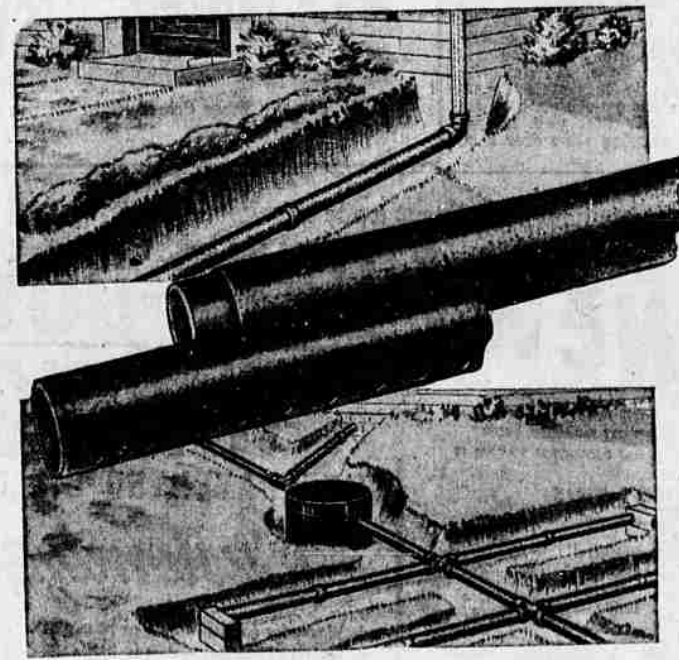
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
