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Chief Suggests Fire Prevention Be Every Week

"Fire prevention week should be every week," Roseburg Fire Chief W. E. (Dutch) Mills said Tuesday, "not just this week."

Meanwhile, during this National Fire Prevention Week of Oct. 2-8, local firemen were quietly tending to business. Too busy seeing that fires were prevented to make comment about the special week.

Chief Mills said he was making regular inspections of schools and all public buildings to see that any possible fire hazards were eliminated. "Let's clean up, not burn up," he added.

From the local department and rural fire departments came an cautionary warning that right now was a good time for residents to start checking their homes preparatory to winter.

They suggested starting the check up in the basement. Roseburg rural fireman Fred Lamoureux pointed out that "people have the bad habit of throwing things around a furnace in the summer and it isn't running."

In case heat is provided by an oil stove, he advised checking the stove carburetor.

"Make sure it's working right," Lamoureux said. If a carburetor is plugged with oil, the jets remain open and the oil runs directly through into the burner, he said. And he added a suggestion that chimneys be checked for cracks and dirt.

African Mission Topic Subject At Open Bible

The Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Clark, newly returned missionaries from River Cass, Liberia, West Africa, will speak at the Open Bible Church at 943 S. Jackson, at 7:45 p.m. Thursday. They will show color slides of African scenes, sing songs in the native dialect, and display unusual carvings.

The Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Clark studied at the Open Bible Institute at Des Moines, Iowa, and pastored at Kewanee, Ill., before going to Liberia under the auspices of the Open Bible Standard Missions. The Rev. Mr. Clark is a builder, and besides his duties as teacher and mission supervisor, constructed a new house and church building on the compound. Mrs. Clark taught school for two years to the tribal children.

Among the curios they will display is a pair of horns taken from a man-killing water buffalo, a python snake skin 14 feet in length and a replica of a devil mask. Tribal life is portrayed in vivid color in the slides. One unusual shot is of "Santa Klaus" dancers. These dancers are so-called because they dance at Christmas time in part of the devil ceremonies.

The Clarks are home on a year's furlough following a three-year term in Liberia. They will be returning the first of the year to establish a Bible training school in the same area.

'High And Mighty' Fete Relieved By Patrol Plane

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Eleven men threw all their baggage into the ocean and even tossed out parts of the plane in helping a Navy patrol bomber limp on one of its two engines for half of the 2,400 miles from Honolulu.

The plane landed safely Monday at Half Moon Bay, south of here.

At that, the fliers heard their good engine sputter 400 miles out when the Neptune was 1,000 feet above the Pacific. Only a quick adjustment of fuel mixture prevented a crash into the sea. The port engine caught fire when the Neptune was 50 miles beyond the halfway "point of no return."

The pilot, Lt. Robert E. Combs, 25, of Denver, feathered the engine and the wind blew out the fire.

Clinic Scheduled On Employment

A Federal employment clinic will be held in seven Oregon cities in November to familiarize veterans with job opportunities in Federal service.

In making the announcement, the U.S. Civil Service Commission said the clinics would also tell the benefits connected with such employment.

The holding of these clinics marks the second in the series of such meetings. The first was held last spring as a part of the commission's expanded program for counseling veterans.

George A. Reid, regional Veterans Federal Employment Representative will head the clinic. Two meetings will be held in each of the cities. The afternoon sessions will be particularly for service officers and personnel officers of federal, state and private industries. All veterans are invited to the open meetings in the evening.

The evening meetings will be sponsored jointly by all veterans' organization in the city, according to the announcement.

Meeting dates in cities, as now planned, include: Astoria, Nov. 8; Pendleton, Nov. 9; Klamath Falls, Nov. 15; Medford, Nov. 16; Eugene, Nov. 17; Salem, Nov. 18, and

Portland, Nov. 19. Services organizations invited to participate include the DAV, American Legion and the VFW.

Nautilus Sea Trials Set Back

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sea trials of the atomic submarine Nautilus have been set back three months or more to permit replacement of steam piping which did not meet the Navy's standards.

The defect showed up when a pipe burst on Sept. 18 while routine steam pressure tests were being made while the submarine was at its fitting-out berth at Groton, Conn.

Navy spokesmen said the reason for the setback was that all the Nautilus' equipment — steam lines, hull and compartment pressure, control mechanism and other equipment — was to spot any weakness before the craft started out under her own power for operational trials.

Rear Adm. B. E. Manseau, acting chief of the Navy's Bureau of Ships, made the announcement of the delay Tuesday night.

Episcopal Vicar Keeps Pastorate In Hit-Run Case

SEATTLE (AP) — An Episcopal vicar charged with hit-run and drunken driving will retain his pastorate.

The decision to retain the Rev. Herman A. Berngen, 44, as vicar of the St. Elizabeth's Episcopal Church in suburban Sashurst, was announced to the congregation Sunday night in an address by the Rt. Rev. Stephen F. Bayne Jr., bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Olympia (Western Washington).

Mr. Berngen surrendered his driver's license after a Justice Court hearing last week in which witnesses testified his automobile hit two other cars. His attorney entered a plea of innocent but did not attempt to refute any of the state testimony. The case was continued to Nov. 18.

Bishop Bayne told the congregation: "In our judgment, no further cause now exists for ecclesiastical trial and censure."

"After taking full counsel with the bishop's committee of this mission, and with their unhesitating agreement, it is our will that the present pastoral relationship continue."

Bishop Bayne said "we rightly do not, as a church, adopt a puritan attitude toward drinking," but he commented that Mr. Berngen "by intemperance... has come close, himself to a catastrophe which would have ruined his life and ministry beyond repair."

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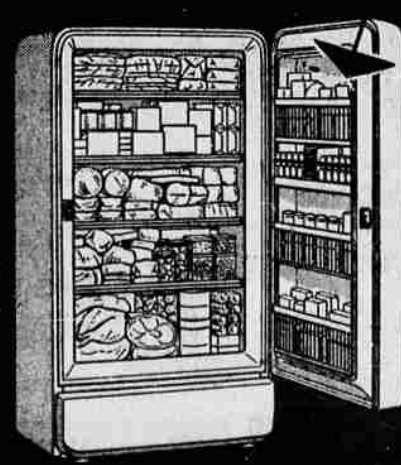
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
