Israel Offers To Enter Pact With Arab States

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Israel offered Wednesday to enter into a series of nonaggression pacts with her Arab neighbors as the first step toward ending the mounting tension in the Middle East.

The offer came from Israeli Ambassador Abba Eban who told the U.N. General Assembly the present trend of Arab policy appeared to be directed toward resumption of the war with Israel. Eban also urged nations outside the Middle East to refrain from provoking an arms race in that area by "premature and especially by one-sided military arrangements. This apparently was aimed primarily at the United States and Britain. The ambassador declared that the present situation hardly appeared suitable for peace moves, but said he had been directed by his government, nevertheless, to propose the nonaggression pacts.

The pacts, he said, "would include undertakings to respect each other's territorial integrity and political independence; to refrain from all hostile acts of a military, economic or political character and to settle all existing and future differences by peaceful means."

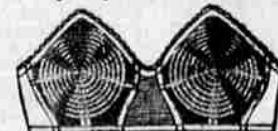
