

McKay Addresses Astoria Meeting

ASTORIA (AP) — Interior Secretary McKay spoke to a hundred businessmen and Republican Party workers at a breakfast meeting here Wednesday, ranging over topics of interest in this river town. He said the government looks with favor on such municipal power systems as those of Forest Grove and Tacoma; said the federal government will get much revenue from tidelands oil despite claims to the contrary; and said research would be pushed in an effort to improve fishing. When he had finished, someone in the audience called out, "But you didn't say anything about Cordon."

McKay then lauded the record of Sen. Guy Cordon, whose difficult fight for reelection against Richard L. Neuberger prompted the McKay visit to Oregon. "He could step out and make some real dough," McKay said of him, "but he can't step out of office because he's a patriot."

Attacks made on Cordon's vote for the Bricker amendment should be disregarded, McKay said, because "if they weren't attacking him on that, they would be attacking him on something else."

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Tearful Marilyn Declines To Give Reason For Split At Newsmen's Conference

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Sobbing and clutching the arm of her lawyer, Marilyn Monroe went to work Wednesday an hour after Joe DiMaggio moved out of their honeymoon home. Her distraught condition caused her attorney to call off a press conference at which he had said she would tell the reasons for her unexpected breakup with her famed husband. Fifty reporters and photographers clustered on the lawn of the Beverly Hills home as the front door swung open and revealed Miss Monroe in a severe high-necked black dress. She wore full makeup and her eyes were full of tears. She clung to the arm of Jerry Giesler, who initiated divorce proceedings Tuesday against the former baseball hero. "Miss Monroe will have nothing to say," Giesler told the throng. He said the marital breakup was due merely to "a conflict of careers" and that the full story "will be presented in the proper place at the proper time." An hour before, DiMaggio made an unexpected exit. "Hello, fellows," he said, with a forced smile. He hurried to the curb where a blue Cadillac was waiting. A divorce from Barcelona, earlier had put two suitcases in the car and was seated at the wheel. "Where are you going?" reporters asked. "I'm driving to San Francisco right now," the former Yankee Clipper replied. "Is that going to be your home now?"

Senator Ives And Wife Showered With Tomatoes

WATERTOWN, N.Y. (AP)—Republican Sen. Irving M. Ives, campaigning for the governorship of New York, ran into a barrage of ripe tomatoes while making a speech here Tuesday night but escaped unscathed. Mrs. Ives, however, was splashed by a tomato that struck the rail of the speaker's platform and state Assemblyman Orin S. Wilcox took a direct hit on the thigh. Ives, whose temper flared when his wife was sprayed, called the incident typical "of the kind of dirty, nasty campaign" he said the Democrats were conducting. Mrs. Ives shrugged off the incident as a "tomato surprise." "Why let something so small bother you?" she said. Police said they heard that a "gang of kids" threw the tomatoes from a hotel roof. But they said they found no trace of the throwers.
