Frying Chicken, Pork Loin Share Honors For Best Buy

Frying chickens and pork loin share the honors this week as the best buys in the meat departments of food stores over the nation. And if you're looking for bargains in food, bear in mind that eggs are really low these days.

Frying chickens will be down anywhere from a couple of cents to six cents a pound from a week ago in many stores. In the wholesale markets, broilers are selling at the lowest prices for this time of year since back in 1940.

A good number of markets will feature turkeys, too. Again it's a matter of near-record supplies on the farms.

The pork situation has shown

considerable improvement lately—from the standpoint of the consumer, that is. Last spring's big pig crop is coming to market and wholesale prices are declining. That's why you'll find pork loin on the bargain counter this week. Pork chop price tags are being trimmed, also.

Beef prices will be down in some areas and up in others. Lamb prices won't show much change from a week ago.

Some markets are reducing egg prices by as much as 10 to 12 cents a dozen this week. For eggs also are at 14-year-lows at wholesale.

On the other hand, butter prices appear to be headed higher. Some markets will add two or three cents to the price of a pound of the spread this week.

At the top of the list of good buys in vegetables are cabbage, onions, potatoes, cauliflower, beets and peppers. Produce men also consider celery, spinach, eggplant and sweet potatoes as good values.

Corn and cucumbers were among vegetables moving lower at wholesale this week. Lettuce went up.

Grapes are more plentiful and moderately priced, with red Tokays the best buy. Apples are a bit lower.

Limes are plentiful and supplies of grapefruit from Florida are increasing. Prices are moderate.

Western oranges are a little lower.

Court Of Claims Awards Contractor Damages

WASHINGTON — The U. S. Court of Claims Wednesday awarded a San Francisco contractor damages as the result of delayed deliveries of reinforcing steel to the Deschutes, Ore., irrigation project.

William C. Thompson, worked on the project under contract with the Bureau of Reclamation. The unanimous five-judge decision held the bureau had been "negligent in failing to furnish the contract in the specified time in an orderly and efficient manner."

Thompson, acting on behalf of himself and a subcontractor, J.D. Proctor, Inc., had sought \$6,144 damages as the result of the delayed deliveries. He also had asked an additional \$132,912 because of over-purchases of concrete caused by bureau estimates and delays which he said resulted from an inadequate labor supply.

The court rejected the latter claim but, after upholding the government liable for the delayed steel deliveries, referred the case to a court commissioner to determine the extent of such costs Thompson is entitled to recover.
