FULLERTON PTA OPEN HOUSE AND MEETING GRAND AFFAIR MONDAY

To an attentive audience of 275 parents and teachers, Fullerton PTA presented its first fall meeting, Monday evening, Oct. 4. The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Arthur Lamka, who extended a welcome to all. Presentation of colors was made by boys from Boy Scout Troop No. 114 of Fullerton, who led the flag salute. Invocation in the form of the PTA prayer was given by Louise Sulter, character and spiritual education chairman.

Mrs. Lamka made several comments explaining the basic aims and basic policies of the PTA. She reminded the members that they all have a voice in the association, as it is a democratic group with the welfare of children and youth as its goal. Mrs. Ted Prusia, vice president, gave an interesting report on two executive board meetings held prior to the regular meeting. Twenty-two members which includes the officers, the committee chairmen and the school principal. All board members were introduced. A cookie and cake sale sponsored by the Lu Ok 1 Ya Horizon Club will be held Saturday in front of the old Penney Store building on Jackson Street.

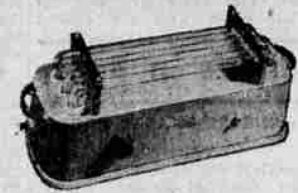
OSC MOTHERS CLUB TO MEET MONDAY
