On leave of absence for 30 days, he had reenlisted for 3 years and expects to reenlist every term until retirement.

Leaving Idlewild Park, the Dolans drove to San Francisco, Los Angeles, through Old Mexico and back to Yuma, Ariz., where it was 118 in the shade. Driving through New Mexico, with a stop at Hernandez, Miss., they arrived at New Orleans, where Sgt. Earl Dolan was married to Veronica Radiques of Venezuela, South America. The new Mrs. Dolan is at present a patient at a New Orleans hospital where she is receiving treatment for infection from a snake bite.

North Umpqua Garden Club will hold the home of Mrs. Harry Bruffy on meet at 1:30 Monday afternoon at Little River Road.

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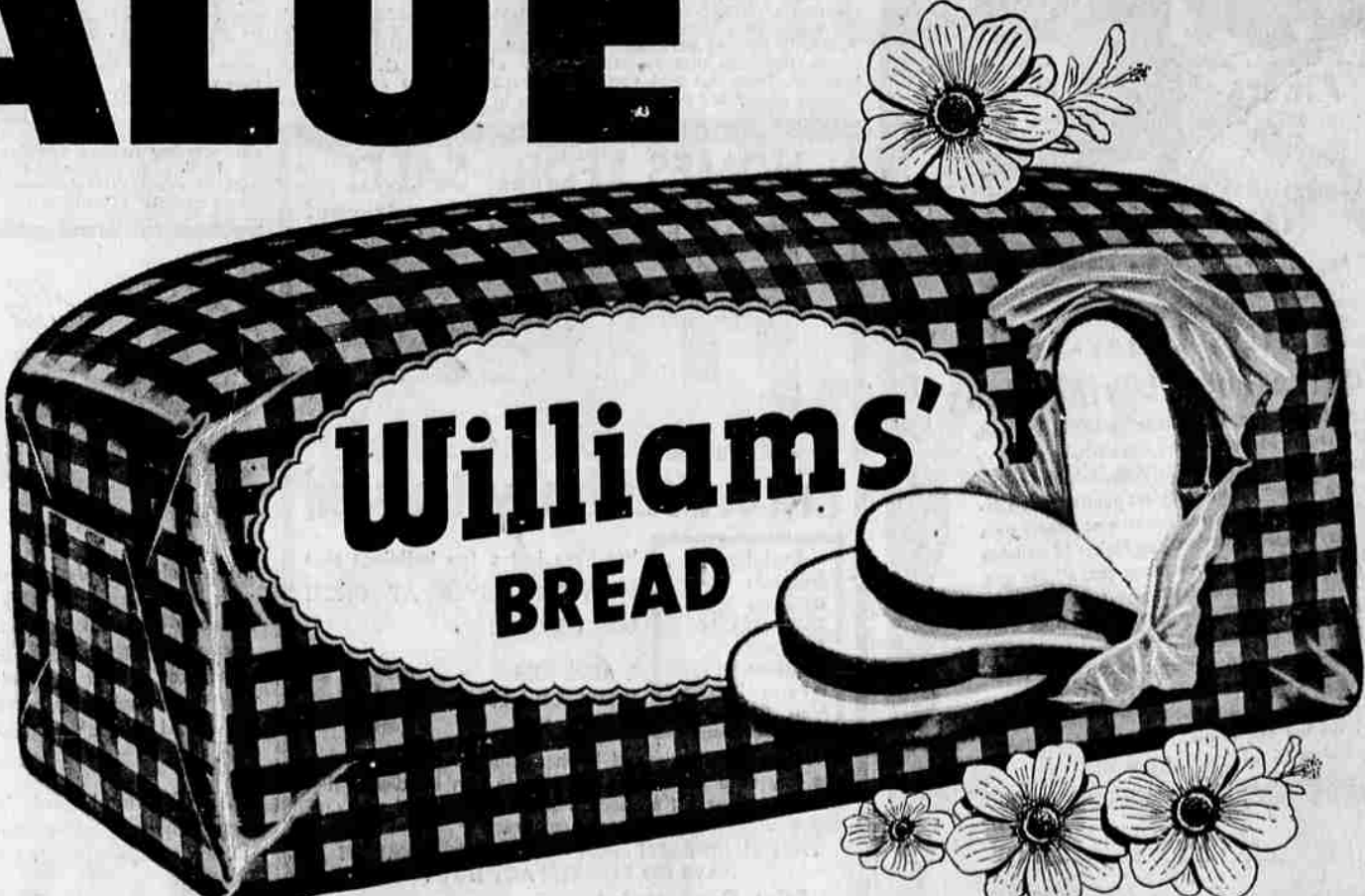
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
