

Oakland Curfew Rules Announced

Mayor W. O. Wegner and night patrolman Ed McDonald clearly outlined the demands of the curfew for minors in Oakland today. They reported the program to Oakland correspondent Mrs. Edith Dunn.

Under the curfew, any Oakland minor under the age of 18 found wandering on the streets or causing a disturbance after 10 p.m. will be classified as a violator. Parents as well as children will be liable for prosecution.

The exception is Saturday night or any other night of a school affair, such as a ball game or dance. At dances, no minor is permitted to loiter on the streets after 10. He or she must remain in the dance hall.

Minors under 16 years of age must be accompanied by parents or guardians when they attend dances.

Disastrous Flood Hits Chicago And Vicinity

When the havoc of the river overflow became apparent, the gates of the lock at its Lake Michigan end were opened to relieve the situation. The river level was two feet above that of the lake, and the turgid flood waters were permitted to flow into the lake for five hours.

Meanwhile, the outflow was stopped up at the sanitary district locks 25 miles southwest of the city at Lockport. But despite the surge which raised the Illinois River stage by 10 feet at Peoria, small streams which normally flow into the waterway north of Lockport backed up.

The skies over the Chicago area remained murky Monday, but there was no additional rain, and gradual improvement in the situation was apparent.

Indiana Also Suffers

Communities in northern Indiana—in the Hammond-Gary area—were hit hard by the storm. The Hammond area was declared in a state of emergency by Mayor Vernon Anderson. Several towns in northern Illinois, where the Illinois River was reported near flood stage, reported rainfalls of from 4 to 6 inches.

Hundreds of persons were evacuated from their homes in southwestern suburban areas as well as in the Hammond area, which is about 20 miles southeast of Chicago.

The Little Calumet and Wolf Lake overflowed in the northern Indiana region. In the Hammond area, all residents of Munster—some 5,000—were alerted to move. Highland, Whiting, Robertsdale and southeast Gary also were battling floodwaters.

Accused Parisian Danies U. S. Intelligence Link

PARIS (AP)—Jean Dides, the former police inspector whose suspension touched off an inquiry into espionage in the French Defense Council, denied Monday he ever had any connection with U. S. intelligence services.

Communist and pro-Communist newspapers have hinted recently that leaks in the council benefited American spy networks. However, one of the key figures in the case, Andre Baranes, has admitted giving defense secrets to the French Communist Party.

Observance Set For Poetry Day

Oregon's Fifth National Poetry Day has been designated as Oct. 15 in a proclamation by Gov. Paul Patterson. Roseburg's Mayor Percy Croft has joined him in noting the day honoring poetry and poets.

The day will be celebrated locally by radio programs sponsored by the Roseburg Writers Club and the Poetry Clinic. On Poetry Day two programs will be aired, on KXKL's noon broadcast, and at 5:15 on KRNR. The air show, "Music and Music," heard on Sunday, will honor local poets on Oct. 17.

It is planned to have local poets available as guest speakers for service and social clubs. Mrs. George Houck, secretary of the Writers Club, will make arrangements.

Both prose and poetry writers have been members of the Writers Club for many years, and persons interested in writing are invited to attend the monthly meetings held at the home of Dr. George Houck. New officers are James R. Daugherty, president; Mrs. Hilda Peterson, vice president, and Mrs. George Houck, secretary.

During the week "A Gift of Words," a collection of local poetry, is offered for sale at a special price at book stores.

Refused Use Of Jeep, Boy Slays His Father

HAYDEN, Ky. (AP)—A 14-year-old boy, refused permission to drive a jeep, shot and killed his father yesterday on a remote mountain farm.

Estill Gibson, about 45, was shot twice through the head with a .22-caliber revolver as he knelt on the floor of his barn inspecting tobacco.

Leslie County Sheriff Carl Farmer said his son Testier, taken into custody shortly afterwards, admitted the slaying because "my father wouldn't let me drive a jeep." The boy didn't elaborate, said the sheriff.

He was jailed here on a murder charge.

NO FIRE DAMAGE

Knife Blade In Head Removed After 8 Years

MARYSVILLE, Calif. (AP)—It wasn't work or worry that gave Robert McClellan those stabbing headaches — it was a 2½-inch knife blade imbedded in his skull for eight years.

Saturday a Marysville doctor took X-ray pictures that showed the blade pressed against the left optic nerve. In a delicate operation, where a slip could mean blindness, the doctor removed it.

McClellan, a Negro farm hand, figures the blade was plunged into his head during a fight in Arkansas, his native state.

This, and other actions of the traders alleged by FTC, the complaint said, "have a dangerous tendency unduly to hinder competition in the purchase and sale of coffee in interstate and foreign commerce."

He said Mrs. Grubbe apparently thought it had all passed and stepped into the highway. She was struck by a car driven by Doyle Lee Paul, 20, Cottage Grove.

Services for Mrs. Grubbe will be held in the First Baptist Church Tuesday at 11 a.m. with the Rev. Raymond Schaefer officiating. Concluding services and vault interment will follow in the family plot in Wilbur Cemetery.

Daughter of Pioneers

Mrs. Grubbe was born July 31, 1891, at Antelope, Ore., to Eastern Oregon pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Haight. She started teaching school at 16 as a substitute for her sister and later attended Oregon Normal School at Monmouth. She taught in Willamette Valley schools for 28 years. She was an accomplished pianist and well-known in local music circles.

She was married to Frank Grubbe June 30, 1942, at Cottage Grove and has lived in Wilbur since. She was active in the First Baptist Church at Roseburg.

Surviving beside her husband are two daughters, Mrs. Bernard (Sally) Martin, Grass Valley, and Mrs. William (Marguerite) Nicks, Sacramento; two sisters, Mrs. Harvey Watkins, Boring, and Miss Salline Haight, Portland; two grandchildren, Desna and Danny Martin, both of Grass Valley.

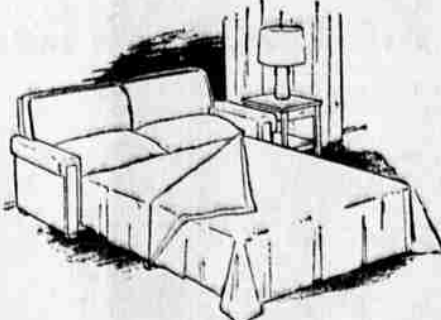
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
