FIRST ALL-ELECTRIC COMMUNITY IN WORLD CHOOSES GLASHEAT

Twenty families on the windswept New Jersey shore will soon begin their fourth winter in homes without chimneys. They have no radiators, no heating ducts, no furnace rooms. In fact, they have no furnaces. There isn't a coalbin, oil tank or gas line in sight, for they burn nothing. They will be perfectly comfortable, however, in the coldest weather, for they live in Oak Park Manor, near Atlantic City, the first all-electric community in the world.

In place of ordinary heating plants, these folks have slim silvery panels of electrically heated glass, hung on walls as unobtrusively as well-placed pictures. These Glasheat panels, by Continental, radiate sunlike warmth into rooms so evenly heated that you have to look twice to tell where it's coming from.

The thin glass panel, heated by an aluminum grid fused into it, throws out infrared rays much as the sun does. These rays warm people and objects directly, instead of the air. It's like the heat you feel when you step into the sun, even though the air temperature there is the same as in the shade. The result is an even, draft-free heat that comes on almost instantaneously.

There's no need to set up the thermostat before you get out of bed. In the morning, Pop switches on a panel in the bathroom, plugs in his electric razor, and is shaving in comfort within a few minutes—even though it may be freezing outside.

In the kitchen, Mom fires up her electric range, puts on the electric coffee pot, and prepares an all-electric breakfast in front of another panel. During the day, Mom can keep the bedrooms cool, the living room moderate and perhaps a child's playroom or nursery extra warm, for each room has its

own thermostat that can be set at any desired temperature. Because there is virtually no time lag, there are no wide fluctuations in temperature. A thermostat can keep a room to within a degree of its setting. Because no fuel is burned, there is no soot to settle on clothes, drapes and furniture. Most homes, now nearly four years old, haven't been painted or papered inside since they were built.

If you were to eavesdrop on a group of Oak Park Manor neighbors, you'd be likely to find them discussing the price of kilowatts right along with butter and beefsteak, for this is the key to practical home heating with electricity. The Atlantic City Electric Company, which has been having a sale on kilowatt-hours, supplies them by the bucketload for 1 1/2 cents apiece. Individual users of electric heat throughout the country pay anywhere from seven mills a kilowatt-hour to five cents or more. The practical heating areas are those where the rate is two cents or less. If you figure in special savings—no chimney, installation cost about half that of other systems, and low maintenance on a system that will probably last you—you may go a bit above two cents and still be ahead.

The Continental Radiant Glass Heating Corp., which supplied the Glasheat panels in Oak Park Manor, already has close to half a million installations throughout the country. By 1960, the company estimates, 25 per cent of all U.S. homes will be keeping warm with kilowatts—the Glasheat way!

Dwight Beck, who underwent major surgery at Mercy hospital at Roseburg last Wednesday, is reported as getting along nicely.

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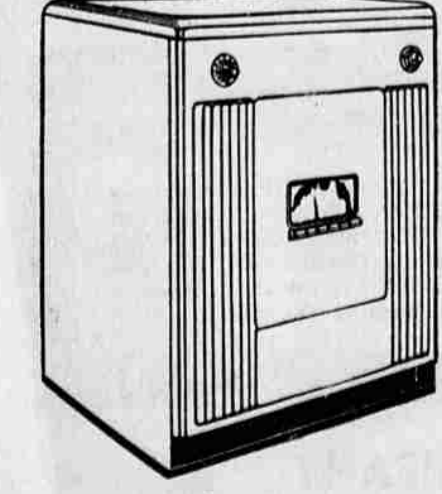
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
