

Cordon, Supporters Keep Heavy Speechmaking Pace

Sen. Guy Cordon and his supporters continued a heavy speechmaking pace in Oregon Thursday in his campaign for re-election.

In one of his busiest days so far the senator made seven speeches in Benton County Wednesday, while Sen. William F. Knowland of California moved into Portland to make two talks in Cordon's behalf.

The Democrats also continued firing away, with Cordon's opponent, Richard L. Neuberger, in Southern Oregon.

The "solonist," head-in-the-sand voting record" of Cordon was Neuberger's theme in a speech at Southern Oregon College of Education in Ashland.

Cordon defended his record with talks at a variety of places, including an auction house, the Philomath Lions Club, the Oregon State College campus and a radio studio.

On his stand on the Bricker amendment, which Neuberger had attacked, Cordon said he and Wayne Morse were co-sponsors of the first Bricker amendment, but that Cordon later voted against it when teeth were put into the measure.

Cordon said, however, that something would have to be done about it some day, because the executive department still is free to make laws through treaties. Cordon said law-making is the prerogative of Congress.

Meanwhile, Albert Ullman, Democratic candidate for Eastern Oregon representative, told a Madras audience that the Republicans "are so frantic and confused by trying to sell the phony power partnership scheme they are now manufacturing contradictions for their own arguments."

Ullman asserted, "The traveling troubadours of partnership power—Cordon, Cordon and McKay—are telling Oregon voters that federal money has dried up while administration sources in Washington."

A hue and cry of protest went up immediately after the speech from some Democrats and labor union leaders—and some Republicans as well.

Among those who at first reacted against Wilson was Republican Gov. William G. Stratton of Illinois, who suggested early yesterday that Wilson's scheduled speech to the GOP fund-raising dinner be called off.

However, Stratton decided later to go along with the decision of the dinner sponsors to carry out the program as planned. And as planned, he introduced Wilson, referring to him as "a man big enough to fight against odds and misunderstanding and partisan attack when he believes himself doing his best for his country."

In Denver, the vacation White House termed "100 per cent wrong" a published report that President Eisenhower had persuaded Stratton to go through with his appearance at the Chicago dinner.

After Wilson spoke, Eisenhower's Denver headquarters had no comment.

While this was going on, the political pot kept bubbling elsewhere.

Vice President Nixon, speaking in Van Nuys, Calif., said Democratic party leaders offer the voters little but a "thrust of anger and criticism, fear and smear."

He labeled Democratic chiefs "Doom-crats."

In Houston, Rep. Sam Rayburn of Texas told a news conference he cannot see where Secretary of State Dulles has changed any of the fundamentals of the Truman-Acheson foreign policy. But, added the House Democratic leader:

"It is being administered in such a way that we have fewer friends in the world than we've ever had."

In Washington, Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) just out of the Bethesda, Md., naval hospital after treatment for a sinus condition, told newsmen he is "supporting all of the Republican candidates with one exception"—Clifford P. Case, who is running for the Senate in New Jersey.

Case said last July 7 that if he were elected, he would vote against continuing McCarthy as chairman or member of the Senate Government Operations Committee "or any other committee with similar functions."

McCarthy said he took his position on Case's candidacy, not because of what Case had said of him, "but for other reasons I think will be made public before the election." He provided no details.

Case, who is opposed by New Jersey elements of his own party as being "too liberal," had no comment.

Self-Admitted Firebug Indicted In Portland

PORTLAND (AP)—A self-admitted firebug found himself under indictment a few hours after he had confessed Wednesday to setting out on a fire-setting spree that caused at least \$180,000 in damage.

A grand jury quickly took the case and quickly returned two arson indictments against Richard Ray Kidd, 20. Bond was set at \$10,000 on each of the charges, and officials said they expected that to hold Kidd in jail this time.

After his earlier spree a month ago, in which he confessed setting three fires that caused \$100,000 damage, Kidd was released on \$3,000 bond.

There was a wave of indignation among officials when they learned Wednesday that Kidd was out on bond when the latest four fires were set Tuesday night.

Naden Statement On Diamond Lake Misunderstood

Don Naden, executive secretary of the Roseburg YMCA office, reports today that his statement about Diamond Lake as a camp site had been misunderstood.

In a News-Review story Wednesday, it was reported that Naden said the water was dangerous because of the cold. He corrected that statement today saying, "The Diamond Lake site is one of the finest I have ever seen for a youth camp."

But he explained that the "need for warmer weather and water for swimming is more urgent for Roseburg" than for other YMCAs using the site. He pointed out that the other communities have access to indoor pools the year around, while Roseburg does not.

This means that summer camp swimming is more important to Roseburg than elsewhere.

He continued that three years ago, the Roseburg YMCA Camp Committee decided to try to locate a campsite nearer the coast at lower altitudes for "year-around" use. The committee is currently considering purchase of a boys' camp 25 miles from Roseburg on the north fork of Smith River.

Naden emphasized that Diamond Lake was still considered as tops despite the desire to find a new camp for Roseburg. "It provides many fine activities for youth and has been of great value to the local youth attending there the past three years," he said. "As far as parents and youngsters are concerned, Diamond Lake is a fine place to send youth."

Several Gauging Stations To Be Added In County

Several additional gauging stations and new precipitation measuring stations probably will be established in Douglas County as a result of a consultation of government officials and members of the Douglas County Court Wednesday.

The stations will be of great value to the county in collecting data which will be used by the Douglas County water resources survey in its plans for future flood control according to Ben B. Irving, acting as engineer for the survey in the county.

Meeting with the court were J. Van de Erve, western area engineer for the U. S. Weather Bureau, Sacramento; Kenneth Phillips of Portland, district engineer for the surface water resources branch of the U. S. Geological Survey; Ivan E. Anderson, in charge of the Eureka Weather Bureau; and County Surveyor Irving.

As a result of the meeting, Irving expects the stations to be established cooperatively by county and federal agencies.

Following the conference, the men went on an inspection trip to the Cow Creek water measuring station near Riddle, the Elk Creek station near Drew and the South Umpqua station at Tiller.

A. M. Lander Jr. of the Roseburg Weather Bureau accompanied the men on the trip.

Government Seeks End To OGC Lands Law Suit

shall continue to administer this particular government property," the reply continued.

The reply called attention to the fact that the law also orders distribution of some seven million dollars held in a special fund, pending settlement of the jurisdictional problem. Clackamas County sought such a distribution, but also filed recently an attorneys' fee action, seeking to recover a percentage of the money.

"It might make a difference in that suit, of course, if the money is distributed under the act of Congress rather than under a court decree Clackamas County now believes it can eventually obtain," the government attorneys said.

Besides asking dismissal of the entire complaint, the government also said a portion of it "contains scandalous material which should be stricken as a preliminary matter."

This is the portion which "makes some reference to a powerful Northwest lumber organization" attempting to have OGC lands transferred to the Agriculture Department "where it has built up an entire cordial whereby it receives preferred treatment in the acquisition of logs," the government attorneys said.

"These allegations and others that follow of similar import are not only irrelevant but are scandalous in their implications. They improperly and gratuitously impugn the reputation of the Forest Service and perhaps the Congress as well," the reply said.

Gunfire Halts Escape Attempt At Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP)—Gunfire ended another attempt to scale prison walls Wednesday night and one of two penitentiary inmates involved in the escape effort was shot and seriously wounded.

Prison officials said Vertis Barrett, 26, serving time for a Pierce County burglary conviction, was struck in the hip and shoulder with buckshot and creased across the stomach with a rifle bullet.

Robert McDonald, 24, convicted of burglary in Okanogan County, was captured at the base of the prison wall inside the grounds.

Prison officials said the pair attempted a break shortly after they had finished work on the night shift in the prison canteen. The two men crawled about 30 feet to the north section of the wall and hooked a makeshift ladder, constructed of a section of pipe which hook on the end, over the wall.

Lower guard spotted Barrett as he started up the ladder and opened fire, officials said. McDonald then surrendered.

It was the fourth prison break attempt in less than a month and the second in which a crude ladder was used. Two inmates using a ladder made of pipe and a hook went over the wall Monday night but were caught the next day by three hunters.

Deputy Warden Al Remboldt, who was investigating Wednesday night's attempt, said McDonald escaped from the minimum security building several months ago and was recaptured in Missouri.

Dachshund Still Seeking Owner After Three Weeks

A male dachshund in Glendale is apparently still looking for its owner after three weeks.

The dog was picked up south of Roseburg, by a Roseburg resident en route to Glendale, who planned to bring it back to advertise for its owner, but the dog got away. It could not be caught according to Mrs. Wayne Close of Glendale.

It has been in the vicinity of the Glendale High School for three weeks, but still is too frightened to be caught.

Claxton was taken to Myrtle Creek Hospital where he was reported doing fine Thursday morning by personnel. He received chest and head injuries. No citations were issued at the time of the accident, according to the report.

The truck-trailer driven by Vernon Lambert St. John, of Porterville, got into trouble near Canyonville. State police said that as St. John rounded a bend north of Dodge Inn, the trailer went on to the road shoulder. The driver couldn't bring it back.

The truck remained on the road and the trailer was not too badly damaged. It was brought to Roseburg by P & B Towing Service.

Washington Bureau might order up hurricane warnings in the Virginia-Cape area later today.

Davis said there must be a "wait and see attitude at the moment on possible threats to the mid-Atlantic and New England coasts."

Meanwhile, relief operations began in the storm-stricken Caribbean Island republic of Haiti to which hurricane Hazel dealt a mighty blow early Tuesday in its course from the Caribbean northward to Atlantic waters.

First reports from the U. S. aircraft carrier Saipan, whose helicopters were landing doctors and medical supplies at the ravaged town of Jeremie, indicated the loss of life in Haiti's hard-hit southwest peninsula might be much lighter than was first feared.

The Saipan messaged that hurricane Hazel had destroyed 50 per cent of Jeremie, a town of 11,000, but "There are no signs of dead people."

"Grave digging observed in cemeteries near Moron and Dam Marie," the first fragmentary report from the big carrier said.

Dam Marie and Moron are small villages on the tip of Haiti's southwest peninsula, roughly 25 to 30 airline miles from Jeremie.

County Engineer Helps Prevent Traffic Tie Up

Quick work on the part of a Douglas County engineer averted a major traffic tie-up on the northern end of the slide on Highway 99 near Wilbur Wednesday afternoon.

Douglas County Road Engineer F. C. Frear, 138 Meadow Lane, Roseburg, was credited with getting traffic and spectators away from the scene quickly. Frear was coming south on the new Deady-Winchester section of Highway 99 shortly after 2:30 p.m. when he sighted the slide.

He had been in Oakland on county business and was returning to Roseburg at the time.

Frear estimated Wednesday evening that he had rerouted around 200 vehicles away from the slide between 2:30 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. He stopped the traffic by parking his car crossways in the road.

Taking cardboard out of his car he fashioned some "detour" and "road closed" signs, then stood by to stop the oncoming cars until state highway men arrived. The cars were directed down and over to the old Highway 99 by the engineer.

"I think there were people there from almost every state," he said, and drivers of all sizes of trucks. All he admitted were curious to look, but didn't stay around to cause a traffic tie-up.

Frear's action in rerouting the cars was praised by one Roseburg citizen, A. U. Taylor, who complimented him for "being right on the job."

The engineer said his being there was just luck and added that there was no sign of a slide when he drove north Wednesday about 11:55 a.m. Frear said that it looked as though the slide was caused by a fault in the rock and recent heavy rains.

Former Resident Dies Suddenly

has spent 18 of his 44 years under prison sentences and who has been tagged by the National Guard as a "professor of burglary" teaching others his trade, was convicted of possessing burglary tools.

He was fined \$100 and sentenced to 12 months, the maximum imprisonment under Alabama law for that offense.

Twenty-four hours earlier, gambler H. Harden Jr. entered the first guilty plea of the vice trials and drew a \$300 fine and a nine-month prison term.

Harden's abrupt withdrawal of his plea of innocent came after defense attorneys had failed in repeated attempts to get a new jury list for the antiracket trials or get them postponed or transferred to another county.

Bus Strike Action Still Pends In Northwest Areas

SEATTLE (AP)—Deadline of a threatened strike of Pacific Northwest Greyhound bus lines employees has been postponed until midnight Thursday.

Some 600 members of two Northwest AFL Motor Coach Employees Union, who were scheduled to walk out at midnight Wednesday to support wage and other demands, voted early Thursday to extend the deadline 24 hours.

The extension was approved after word was received bus employees reached an agreement at San Francisco staying off a threatened strike south of Portland.

Federal labor conciliator William G. Hosie said negotiations for the Northwest employees would resume at 10 a.m.

A strike of Northwest locals would affect Greyhound service between Vancouver, B.C., and Portland, and Seattle, west to the Olympic Peninsula, and east to Butte, Mont., and between Spokane and Portland.

The union is demanding a 10 per cent pay increase and a health and welfare program for the 600 bus drivers and station employees who work in the area.

Special guests will be Miss Agnes Shields, school specialist from Oregon State Library; Dan Arensmeier, president of Roseburg Senior High School student body; M. C. Decker, superintendent of schools, and Miss Muriel Mitchell, Roseburg City Librarian.

In addition to student participation, the school librarians will have a sectional meeting in the afternoon.

Plane Wreckage Spotted On Side Of High Mountain

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—A squad of experienced mountaineers, clinging to the sides of rugged Mt. Arrowsmith, Wednesday spotted the wreckage of an RCAF Expediter, missing since Sunday.

RCAF officials said the team reported "It doesn't look like there are any survivors" from among the four aboard.

The plane was on a 260-mile round trip from Vancouver to Tofino, B.C., on the west coast of Vancouver Island. The wreckage was sighted at the 5,100-foot level on the mountain's east slope, 85 miles west of here.

The squad which found the plane was one of two dropped atop the peak early Wednesday by RCAF helicopter. Each team was led by one of the Bitterlich brothers, Olaf and Adolph.

The brothers received permission to lead the teams after they reported to RCAF they heard a plane crash above them while they were climbing on Arrowsmith Sunday.

Temperatures in the area were well below the freezing mark, but the aircraft, a twin-engine plane, carried full survival equipment including snow shoes.

It vanished while taking an RCAF padre to Tofino to conduct church services.

Aboard were Fo. L. E. Oppenheimer of Winnipeg, the pilot; Fo. Michael Saunders of Bristol, Eng.; R. D. Hall, an engineer of Beau Repaire, near Montreal and the Padre, Sqn. Ldr. B. G. Stubbards of Vancouver.

Rock Slide Closes New Highway Section

Department was busy bringing up a large shovel from Winchester to dig out the slide. They believed it would require about three days to dig out. The shovel was expected to begin operations Friday.

Edwards said cost of the operation would range between \$4,000 and \$5,000.

After the slide occurred, Edwards said the highway department men found there was a sloping plane of rock underneath. It slanted in a direction which made the dirt unstable," he said, "but was hidden at the time the cut was made."

Edwards said that before shoveling began it would be necessary to remove the rock and dirt above the slide which was about ready to fall. We'll take it out with a dozer on top or blast it out," he added.

A Roseburg man driving south from Sutherlin said "great pieces of rock were falling as he neared the slide area around 3:30 p.m. A. U. Taylor, 749 S. Stephens, said Wednesday evening that he watched as rocks plummeted down. He described two pieces each as large as a automobile.

The new Deady-Winchester highway section had been in use just a little over one week before the slide. It was opened to traffic Oct. 6.
