

Two Schools Join Junior Red Cross 100 Per Cent

One hundred percent enrollment in the Junior Red Cross by two schools in Douglas has been reported.

Students at Gunter school in the northern part of the county and Roberts Creek near Roseburg sent their money to Mrs. Mildred Herman, executive secretary of the Douglas County Chapter. The regular enrollment period does not officially start until November, Mrs. Herman said.

The money from the youngsters of Gunter school came in September, that from Roberts Creek Oct. 11.

Mrs. Herman pointed out that Junior Red Cross money is handled separately from the adult fund. Much of it is used to aid children in countries outside the United States.

The role of a member of the Junior Red Cross was summed up by its president, Patricia Lynch of the Erie, Penn., chapter, at the 1954 Red Cross National Convention in Los Angeles: "He's an ambassador of good will at home and abroad and there's no iron curtain thick enough anywhere to hold back the thought waves of friendship and good will that this junior can send out."

The students at Gunter and Roberts Creek have taken up the project of making afghans for Camp White.

7 Days Of Travel Offered Chamber Sponsored Tour

A thrilling seven days of travel and vacation awaits the group of Douglas County people who reserve a place on the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce sponsored flight scheduled to leave the Mah-long-Sweet Airport, Eugene, Dec. 6.

The tour, offered in cooperation with Transocean Airlines, was arranged through John Aymond, formerly with Transocean, and now a rancher above Steamboat, Aymond describes the tour as offering "a maximum of enjoyment for your travel dollar," and amounts to \$290.50 per person.

Included in that price is round trip air transportation from Eugene to Honolulu, federal transportation tax, complimentary meals aloft, limousine service between the hotel and Honolulu Municipal Airport, seven full days and nights of relaxation in guest cottages at the Niumalu Hotel on Waikiki Beach with dancing and Hawaiian entertainment nightly; a native luau in the exotic gardens of Queen's Surf; an outrigger canoe or glass-bottom boat ride; a tour of Mt. Tatalus, including a visit to Iolani Palace, Punchbowl National Cemetery, Diamond Head, Manoa Valley and other scenic points; luncheon at the Waiohale Tea Room, the site of Robert Louis Stevenson's grass shack, and a tour of a pineapple cannery.

Secretary - Manager Harold J. Hickerson promises there will be time allowed for sun-tanning, bathing and fishing by day and dancing by the light of the tropical moon at night.

Reservations for the tour may be made through the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce office, but must be completed by Nov. 10 in order to allow ample time to complete all arrangements. Reservations will be accepted on a first-come first-serve basis, Hickerson said, until a full complement of passengers is secured.

Attend To Business — Charles V. Stanton, editor of the News-Review, and Mrs. Stanton spent Wednesday in Eugene on business.

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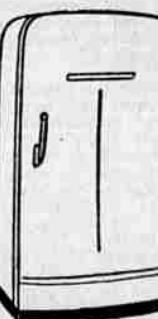
