

Riddle Outgrows Schools; Bond Election Slated

Riddle school administrators are keeping their fingers crossed in hopes that the \$195,000 school construction bond issue Oct. 25 is approved by voters.

Building enrollment figures have pushed overcrowded conditions to the limit, according to Supt. Kenneth Stuart. He points out that enrollment has increased steadily. To prove it, he relates that elementary enrollment is more than double (472) that of eight years ago. Total registration then was 214.

Outlining the problem to correspondent Erma Best, he said present class loads range from 30 to 76 and individual teaching loads from 24 to 30 for the 12 teachers. He said additional space is needed for instruction of music, remedial work and physical education. He estimates that by next year, three teachers will be needed for each of the lowest three grades. The Hanna mine and smelter development has put a great load on the school system, Stuart said. At present, 30 families, including 87 school-age children have come in as a result of the mining operation. Over 100 school-age children live outside the district but attend Riddle students, he said.

The story in the high school is the same. Four years ago enrollment was 93. This year, it is 135. "Rooms once large enough to comfortably handle high school classes are now inadequate," Stuart said. This means need for change and expansion, he continued.

It is predicted that the proposed 11-room addition will only care for school growth over a two-year period, Stuart said.

McCarthy, at a news conference in Washington, said he was supporting all Republican senatorial candidates with one exception—Case. The Wisconsin senator said his reason for not supporting Case had nothing to do with the latter's campaign statement. Rather, he said, it was because of "other reasons I think will be made public before election."

The two-day convention will be highlighted this evening by a torchlight parade for Sen. Guy Cordon which will be followed by a dinner at Salem's Senator Hotel. Sen. Cordon will address the convention delegates at 7 p.m.

Saturday business for the convention includes an address by Gov. Paul Patterson at 10 a.m., Emeritus Professor U. G. Dubach of Oregon State College will speak at the closing noon session.

State Highway Crews Digging Away Slide

State Highway Dept. crews this morning began digging away a 150-foot long slide that buried relocated Highway 99 near Wilbur Wednesday afternoon.

Tom Edwards, division engineer, said there's an outside chance the slide area may be cleared by Saturday evening, but gave no promises.

About 6,000 cubic yards of rocks and other debris blocked off traffic when the mass slipped from the top of a cut. The slide came only a week after the new highway had opened for traffic.

Motorists are being routed around the slide area on the old highway through Wilbur.

BUILDING CONTINUES
The Sutherlin Sun crows happily that the building boom in Sutherlin is continuing at a snappy pace. It reports that building permits during September totaled \$71,790. Building Inspector J. C. Irwin said the permits included eight dwellings, a truck garage and 12 alterations and repairs to buildings.

Frank Woodley of Glendale narrowly escaped injury Friday afternoon, when his lumber truck turned over while being dumped. Woodley was delivering a load of lumber to the Sam Phillips residence on Glendale Road and had tripped the dump mechanism. Part of the load caught, and the weight shifted to one side, causing the truck to tip. Woodley jumped clear and was uninjured. He estimated damage to his truck at about \$80. The driver of a passing lumber truck righted Woodley's vehicle.

Hurricane Deals Damage To Carolina Coastline

It was feared they might strike highway bridges in their path. Gov. William B. Umstead, from his sickbed in a Durham, N. C., hospital, ordered on three North Carolina National Guards to the request of Wilmington's city manager.

In response to a radioed appeal from Mayor Ernest Williams of Myrtle Beach, a resort halfway up the South Carolina coast, Gov. James F. Byrnes ordered the Conway tank battalion to duty to prevent looting. It is composed of several officers and 50 men. All Myrtle Beach telephone lines were down.

"We're going to have considerable damage along the water front," Mayor Williams said. "That's usually followed by lots of looting."

The tropical storm, which wrought heavy damage and loss of life in Haiti Tuesday, struck the U.S. mainland a severe blow, but towering waves caused more damage along the coast than wind. The Miami Weather Bureau hurricane forecasting headquarters, reported the storm center crossed the coastline a short distance east of Myrtle Beach at 5:15 a.m.

Thousands of beach homes were torn up and many homes and concession stands washed away. Associated Press photographer Rudy Paireth reported from Myrtle Beach watching a virtually undamaged house with attached garage float majestically out to sea, its weather vane proudly turning.

Highway Dept. Maintenance Will Get New Building

The State Highway Commission, crowded in by a residential area near the Roseburg office on Cobb Street, has completed plans for moving its maintenance operations to Winchester.

Tom Edwards, division engineer for the State Highway Dept., said bids would be called in Portland Oct. 28 for construction of a 100x32-foot masonry block building into which maintenance operations will be moved.

The building will be located on the old shoemaker property just north of the Winchester bridge between the old and new highways. The Highway Commission has purchased the entire property between the two highways.

Edwards said the department now requires more room for its equipment, the present location being too crowded for the heavy construction load. He said it's hard to operate efficiently under those conditions.

Another motive for the move is that the presence of the construction equipment doesn't add to the appearance of the residential area, Edwards explained.

The Highway Commission also will open bids on grading and filling of 1.36 miles of the west unit, Reedsport-Dean Creek section of the Umpqua Highway east of Reedsport. It is a federal aid project.

Ashley Is Given Boost By VFW

Frank Ashley, Democratic candidate for Douglas County commissioner, received a boost from the county Veterans of Foreign Wars this week.

Ora Close, Oakland, secretary-treasurer of the VFW reported that the Douglas County Veterans Council has gone on record in support of Ashley's campaign.

Meanwhile, Ashley was set for some heavy slumping in the north end of the county next week. Monday, a visit is being sponsored by the Reedsport Chamber of Commerce. He will state his views on the improvement of the harbor at Reedsport and improvement of roads into Drain and from Sutherlin to Elkton.

Next Wednesday at 7 p.m. in the American Legion Hall, Ashley will speak again on his program for the northern part of the county. He is being sponsored by the Non-partisan Committee for Ashley.

Treble Damages Asked For Alleged Trespass

A suit for treble damages totaling \$102,960 against each of two defendants has been filed in Douglas County Circuit Court by two timber companies.

A. F. and Delma Mitchell, doing business as Mitchell Logging Co., and Donald C. and Leona B. Piper, doing business as Piper Lumber Co., filed the suit against Harry W. and Nina E. Johnson.

The plaintiffs allege the defendants entered upon their property just south of Myrtle Creek and unlawfully cut and removed 1,560,000 board feet of timber between April 1 and Sept. 10 of this year. The plaintiffs claim their property was worth \$37,320 before the trespass and only \$3,200 after. They seek three times the alleged damage of \$34,320 from each defendant.

boycott out attendance to a third of normal and resulted in the resignation of the Milford School Board. A new board ordered the return of the Negro students to an all-Negro school in Dover, Del. Bowles already is under arrest on charges of conspiring to violate Delaware's compulsory school attendance law in connection with the boycott last month. He is under \$6,000 bond on the charges, filed last Sunday at the direction of Gov. J. Caleb Boggs, and has been summoned for hearings Nov. 2. Maximum sentence under these charges is a \$500 fine on each count, or a prison term if the fine is not paid.

Richard L. Neuberger, Portland, candidate for U. S. senator, Saturday will return to Douglas County for a series of talks in Myrtle Creek, Roseburg and Sutherlin.

Neuberger, a state senator, will dine with Myrtle Creek Democrats at noon and speak in the New Rio Theater at 1:30 p.m. From there, he will go to Roseburg for a conference with officials of the Western Forest Industries at 4 p.m.

At 6:30 p.m., he will speak for a half-hour over KRXL. A major campaign address, at 7:30, will be delivered in the American Legion Hall in Sutherlin.

Accompanying Neuberger will be Charles O. Porter, candidate for Congress from the 4th Congressional District, who will introduce the Senate aspirant.

Mrs. Neuberger also will speak. She is to attend a meeting of the Roseburg chapter of the American Assn. of University Women at noon in the Umpqua Hotel. Her subject will be non-partisan.

tion from Moscow Radio. Wilson returned to Washington Thursday night and reporters asked him whether he regarded the incident as closed. "I would think so," replied the defense secretary. He also said with a grin that he's "not in the humor" to make any more political speeches.

Moscow radio commentator Valentin Zorin called Wilson's Detroit news conference remark a "scandal" and he added: "Wilson's attack . . . showed up the true attitude of the Washington politicians toward millions of people who are deprived of work by the American way of life." Zorin made no mention of Wilson's public apology in Chicago Wednesday night.

Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.), Democratic vice presidential candidate in 1952, Thursday night disputed Wilson's claim that "left wing opponents" had twisted his remarks. Sparkman said Wilson's exact words "do the damage. No interpretation is needed."

Republican Gov. William G. Stratton said he did not believe the incident would have any bearing on Republican fortunes in the congressional elections, now less than three weeks away. Stratton was one of a number of Republicans who—like some Democrats and labor union leaders—criticized the defense secretary after his news conference remarks.

But the Illinois governor said in Springfield Thursday night he believes Wilson's Chicago speech two days after the incident "put the Republican party on record where it belonged" on labor policies.

In Detroit, CIO president Walter Reuther said he was "pleased to learn that Mr. Wilson . . . recognizes that he made a serious mistake."

The situation took something of a twist Thursday when—after an anonymous tipster phoned news offices in Washington—a check of Senate Labor Committee records showed Reuther had used the figure of speech "strut the animals up" in testimony last January against an administration proposal for government sponsored polls of workers on the question of striking.

A CIO spokesman said later a reading of the testimony "will clearly show" Reuther was "pleading against a return of the law of the jungle and the spirit of the jungle in collective bargaining."

First Well-Child Conference Held Here Thursday

Roseburg's first well-child conference of the fall was held Thursday night in the County Health Office in the courthouse from 1 to 4 p.m. The conference, sponsored by the women of the American Legion Auxiliary was designed to "keep the well child well," Dr. Roland Cuts, Portland pediatrician with the State Board of Health, supervised examinations for 14 pre-school children.

The conferences are scheduled each month on the second Thursday, the next one in Roseburg being slated Nov. 11. Parents wishing to make appointments should call the health office, 3-4037.

Part of the sessions are devoted to discussion of common problems of children in the infant-to-8-years group, such as sleep disturbance, behavior problems, fundamentals of good nutrition, and so forth.

If examination shows anything requiring medical attention, parents are asked to take the child to their family physician.

It was emphasized that the conferences are not for sick children, and parents are asked to avoid bringing in children with colds or other contagious illnesses.

Similar conferences are being held this year in Sutherlin, Elkton, Glendale, Yoncalla and Drain.
