

Lutherans End Long Convention Held In Canada

TORONTO — The United Lutheran church has put off action on a proposed new pronouncement to guard the "right uses" of Holy Communion.

The decision to refer the doctrinal statement back to a special commission for further study came Wednesday in the closing session of the church's biennial convention. Before heading home, the delegates also churned out a set of

new policies to give their church a more closely-linked chain of government.

The eight-day convention was the first ever held in Canada by the church, the continent's largest Lutheran body embracing 2,150,000 members.

Dr. Elmer E. Flack, Dean of Hamma Divinity School, Springfield, Ohio, and head of the special commission on Communion, made a final plea for action on the recommended new pronouncement.

"It is the result of a very careful study," he said. "We have no intention of presenting a law, but there is a need for this statement as a guide for the whole church."

The lengthy statement asserts that "misunderstanding, misuses and abuses of the Holy Communion

are occurring" and cites various examples. It prescribes stricter supervision of the Sacrament.

Generally, it would discourage inter-denominational Communion and Communion in groups, such as youth camps, where all may not be confirmed church members.

The Rev. Robert L. Lang Jr., Altoona, Pa., urged its adoption, calling it a needed guide. But others questioned it.

Although this matter hit a snag, other policy questions were approved quickly. The new measures supplement previous actions to strengthen the church's central administration. They give the church's president and 21-member executive board general supervisory powers over church-wide agencies and activities.

.22 Rifle Links Two With Slaying

LOS ANGELES — A .22 rifle has linked two men—a missing former official of the AFL Sheet Metal Workers Union and a union member in custody in Washington, D.C.—with the slaying of an official of the same union near Las Vegas, Nev., last March, police said.

Detectives said that ballistics tests showed that bullets from the rifle killed James Hartley, 33, Southern Nevada business agent for the union, whose body was found in a shallow grave in the desert.

The gun was found in the car of Sheldon Rich when he was arrested in Washington last July 28, officers said. At that time Rich, a Las Vegas sheet metal worker, was charged with conspiring to

kill Edward Carlough, a Washington official of the union.

That charge was dropped, but Rich now is held on a charge of illegally possessing the gun.

Det. Lt. Claire Dedrick of suburban Lynwood said the gun had been purchased on a trip to Las Vegas last winter by John Fuller, 39, of Lynwood, ousted welfare fund administrator of Local 108 of the sheet metal workers.

Fuller had been missing since leaving his home last Thursday. His wife, Virginia, said his life had been threatened.

Fuller was the union's welfare fund administrator until ousted by the international union in a dispute. Litigation over his expulsion is pending in Washington, D.C.

Riddle School Board Sets Vote October 25

Voters in the Riddle School district will vote Oct. 25 on a \$195,000 bond issue, reports Correspondent Erma Best.

The date had previously been a tentative one. This week, the school board approved the date.

The board described the \$195,000 as the "very minimum" for construction of 11 classrooms, office and storage space, lavatories, covered play area and remodeling of the high school science and home economics departments. The cost would also cover grading of the elementary playground.

Estimates of cost were submitted from general contractors and the architect.

Two Evangelical Groups To Merge

CLEVELAND — Top executives of the Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical and Reformed Church have approved merging the two denominations into the United Church of Christ.

The joint session set 1957 as the date for forming the new body, expected to have a membership of more than two million.

No further legislative action is required, a spokesman for the two groups said.

The Congregational Christian group has 1 1/4 million members in 4,573 churches and the Evangelical and Reformed has 760,850 in 2,733 churches.

Originally approved a number of years ago, the merger plans were blocked by court action. Then

the New York Court of Appeals last March overruled lower courts and gave approval to the union.

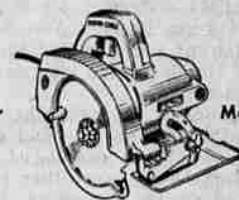

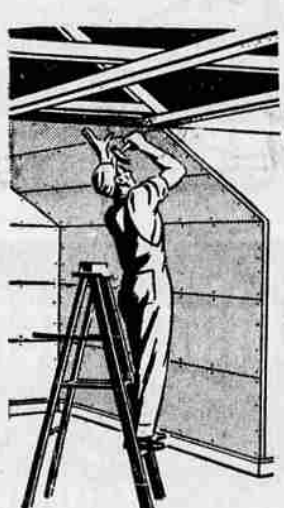
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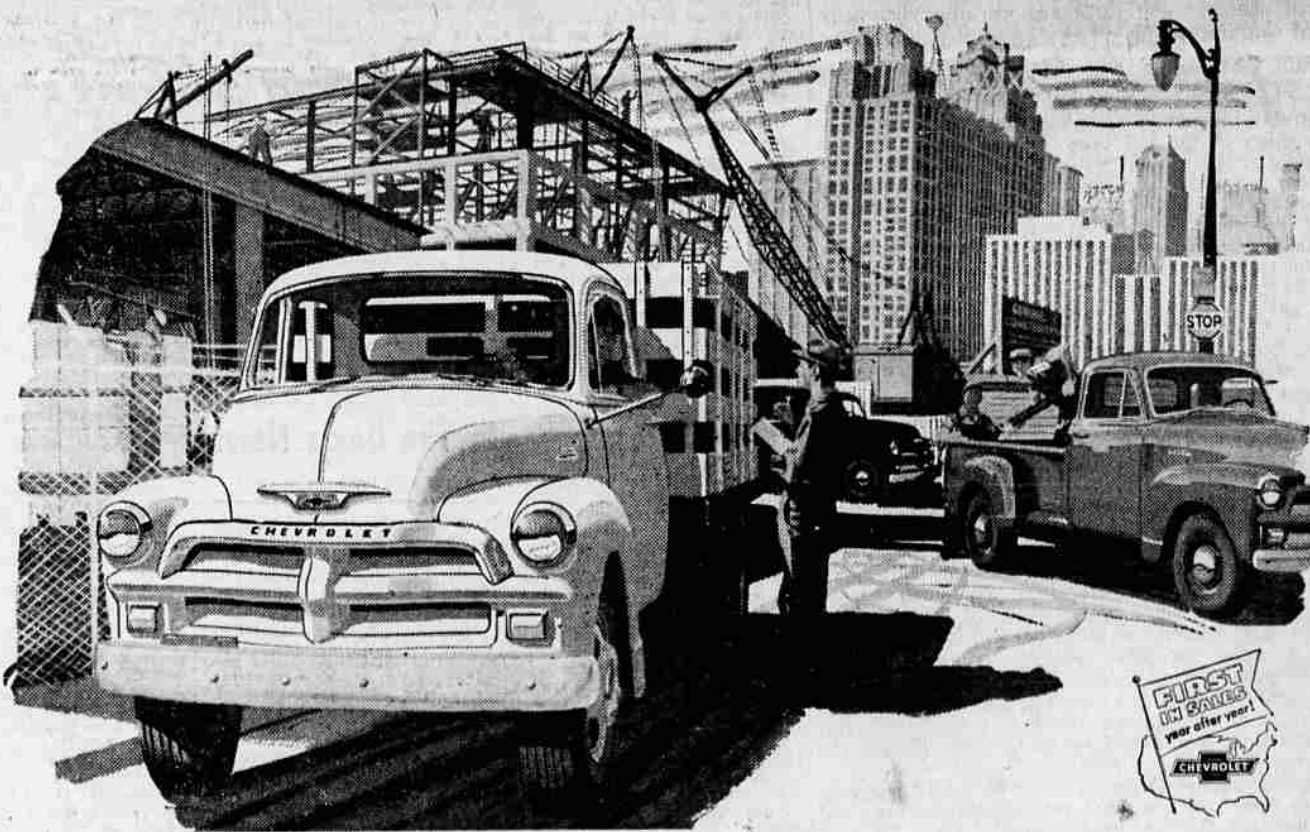
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
