Roseburg's high school football team, aided in the clutch by timely passing, returned to the winning and scoring columns Friday night in Cottage Grove, nearly trimming the Lions, 28-6.

The win was the second in district action this year, matching the team's number of losses. It evened the record at three won, three lost for the season.

his first catch of the night on the first play of the second quarter. That one took him 35 yards to paydirt for his team's initial counter.

It culminated a seven-play Indian drive that started on their own 34. And what a dilly the pass and catch was. Bill Oeding, well-protected by a blocking "pocket," leisurely faded back and arched the ball at the speeding Hargis, who had breezed past the safety almost before anyone realized the play was developing.

Catch On Fingertips
For a moment, it seemed he'd lose the ball as it balanced on his fingertips. But he trapped the ball and kept speeding forward, scoring untouched. Tackle Gary Crenshaw then booted the first of his four straight conversions of the evening.

The second TD also came in the second quarter. Halfback Nub Beamer, looking like the old runner again, primed the drive by intercepting Lion quarterback Pete Summers' heave on the Roseburg 39 and returning it to the Cottage Grove 21.

Bob Thomas, who has taken a back seat to Beamer all year, moved the ball 17 yards on the next play. Oeding ordered Thomas over from four yards out on the succeeding play. It was Thomas' first carry of the year.

Beamer got his sixth district touchdown of the year in the third quarter with barely three minutes played. Roseburg took the kickoff and moved the ball right over the goal line on nine plays, including a strange break.

Oeding Clobbered
That break came after the Indians had rushed the oval to their own 48 from the 31. Oeding stepped back to punt after losing 13 yards on a muffed pass attempt. An overzealous Lion clobbered Oeding as he got a short kick away to the Lion 42.

Officially ruled Roseburg in possession on the 37, penalizing Cottage Grove for roughing the kicker. That left Roseburg with fourth down and eight to go for a first down.

Oeding promptly stepped back and hurled a clutch pass to Hargis, who caught the ball on the 22 and juggled it to the 9. Thom-

as gained two at right tackle, and Beamer went the rest of the way around his own right end.

The last three plays of the game were passes. Two were intercepted and the third went for a touchdown. The series went like this: Roseburg gained possession of the ball on the Cottage Grove 44. Howard Backen, shifted over to the wing-T flanker position most of the night, traded places with Oeding. His first call was for a pass. Cottage Grove's Jim Childers stood in the way of the receiver, taking the ball on his own 33 and returning to the 47.

Summers copied the Backen formula by immediately dishing a pass which Oeding intercepted on the Roseburg 31. He returned to the Cottage Grove 39.

Backen, a mountain of faith in his right arm, stepped back again. This time it was Hargis who took the ball over his shoulder on the 16 and fled untaged into the end zone.

Cottage Grove's lone touchdown came in the third quarter. Oeding lost his target on a pass, and the Lion's beefy fullback Dean Castle belled his bulk by outspeeding everyone to the goal line. His return of the interception went for 62 yards. When he tried to run for the extra point, the Roseburg line stopped him cold.

Tribe Form Changed
The Indians came out in another new formation—a straight T—on a few plays during the evening. Most, however, were from the familiar wing-T, but with new faces on the wing—Backen (who started at quarterback previously), newcomer Bill Johnson and Marvin Fray.

And look out in the year to come for a shrimp of a halfback playing for Cottage Grove. Dean Crammer, 123 pounds and a junior, moved the ball 76 yards on 16 carries, besides worrying the Indians on kickoffs and punts. With all that action, he took some of the hardest tackles the weighty Indians could throw and came up whole.

As for Roseburg runners, Beamer went 94 yards on 12 trips and Thomas 86 on 11 tries.

The Indians next week play their last district game against North Bend on the local field. It could well be a battle for third place.

Medford and Prineville posted football victories Friday night and earned berths in the state high school championship playoffs.

Medford won the class 1-A district 6 title by blanking Klamath Falls 13-0. It was the sixth straight win for the Medford squad which was second in this week's Associated Press poll. Klamath Falls was tenth. Alton State scored both touchdowns for the winners.

Prineville, only A-2 team among the top ten in the poll, had to fight from a scoreless halftime tie for its 14-0 victory over Lakeview for the 2-A district 8 championship. Prineville, undefeated in 23 starts, was ranked fourth.

Milwaukie, the No. 5 team, moved to within one victory from the district 3 title by dumping Gresham, tied for No. 7, 14-0.

Pendleton, tied for seventh place in the poll, came closer to the 1-A district 7 championship by coming from behind in the last three minutes to beat La Grande 19-14. Pendleton is heavily favored to top its two remaining district opponents—Hermiston and Milton-Freewater.

South Salem, the state's No. 1 team, was idle Friday but resumes action in district 8 Saturday against Lebanon.

Marshfield, ranked No. 3, posted its sixth straight victory, overwhelming Reedsport 64-7 in a non-district contest.

Sutherlin and Drain saw-sawed back and forth with the Bulldogs finally emerging with a 26-20 triumph in a traditional game on the Sutherlin gridiron Friday night.

The Warriors jumped to a 7-0 lead after Eddie Burns, scoring the first of three touchdowns, plowed across from six yards out to cap a 62 yard drive. The kick from placement was good.

Sutherlin came back to tie things on Skip Stillwell's eight yard drive and Morris Churchman's run for conversion. The Bulldogs had taken over on the Drain 40 to start the drive.

Burns' 12-yard sprint after Drain had taken over at midfield put the visitors in front again 13-7 at the quarter mark. The placement try missed.

The Bulldogs went ahead for good in the second chapter when Stillwell passed 20 yards to Cliff Whiting in the end zone. Churchman ran end for the conversion to make it 14-13 Sutherlin.

Sutherlin added two more touchdowns before the Warriors retaliated with one in the final 15 seconds of play.

Les Emerson broke through the Drain line for 58 yards for one in the third period and Stillwell passed 25 yards to Orville Gulseith for the other early in the fourth quarter.

Sweitzer, who became a graduate student this month, and Patera were hunting east of Eugene when Patera mistook his friend for a deer and shot him.
