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work crammed into the usual 365 last year.

He said the record showed 75 jury trials, which he estimated took up 175 days, 20 equity trials (40 days), a host of non-contested divorces (50 days), correspondence and routine matters (25 days), study of briefs and compilation of opinions (50 days) and criminal cases (25 days).

"It's no bed of roses," he said. To add to the load, Wimberly said, "They are thinking of dumping juvenile and probate on us." He estimated this would add another 50 days of work.

"The county is progressing, but so is litigation," he said.

Wimberly also showed that the amount of litigation increased considerably even quarter to quarter. His friend, Pro Tem Judge Orcutt, ticked off several reasons for this increase. He noted that a third of the Pacific Highway is in the county, leading to damage litigation stemming from accidents. Also, the logging and lumber industry, with a comparatively high degree of danger, boosts the court action considerably because of accidents.

Both men agreed that the community should get behind any move to secure another resident judge in Roseburg. "The work has simply outgrown one man," Orcutt said.

Horror Comics Topic Of Meet At Myrtle Creek

Crime and horror comics and their effects on today's youth highlighted a PTA discussion which brought out more than 100 parents and teachers in Myrtle Creek recently.

According to News-Review Correspondent Ruth Evans, guest speaker Raymond J. Martin of Roseburg, discussed the dangers of such comics and suggested remedies to the situation on the part of the adults.

Martin told his audience that an FBI report on J. Edgar Hoover stated that 60 to 90 per cent of sex crimes committed by children are committed by those who have habitually read filthy literature. He intimated that communist money was backing many publishing houses printing such literature.

The speaker listed five types of literature found on news-stands to be outlawed: (1) the magazine which glorifies crime and the criminal; (2) the type that portrays a passion for illicit love; (3) the predominantly sexy type; (4) magazines with suggestive illustrations (5) and those carrying disreputable advertising.

Martin added that the cleanup of undesirable literature must come from the local level. He suggested three ways of starting such a campaign: (1) make sure it isn't in your own home; (2) ask your neighbors if they won't comply with the plan and make the neighborhood clean; (3) talk to the proprietors of stores and suggest he not sell such material. If he refuses, trade elsewhere.

Mrs. Neuberger Speaks On Oregon Education Status

The work of a former school teacher in the Oregon State Legislature was discussed in Roseburg Saturday afternoon.

Guest speaker before a near-capacity crowd in the Civic Room of the Umpqua Hotel was Mrs. Maurine Neuberger of Portland. Mrs. Neuberger told her audience (nearly 90 AAUW members and several teacher guests) the "you don't know your own strength."

"It's your letters and post cards that enable legislators to know what constituents desire," she said. As an example, Mrs. Neuberger said such letters had passed the oldsmarine bill in a recent legislative session — "not me, a woman AND a Democrat."

The speaker stressed that the Legislature in session works along a non-partisan basis. She cited the case of her appointment to head the House education committee by a Republican speaker.

Mrs. Neuberger dwelt at length on the bill introduced in the 1953 legislature which she referred to as "the pilot program for exceptional children between 8 and 12 years old." The program concerns the children on either end of the school program, she said, those who are retarded and the exceptional child. According to Mrs. Neuberger, the bill has set up in the state five schools for retarded children and two for advanced youngsters.

Members of AAUW, League of Women Voters and PTA constituted a big lobby for more help in the pilot program, Mrs. Neuberger believed. She asked her listeners not to think of "lobbying" as a bad word. "Lois of lobbying is the public interest," she said, adding that perhaps a more gentle phrase was "legislative representation."

Along other lines, Mrs. Neuberger, a former teacher, said she had found the AAUW was the quickest group to come to the aid of good educational legislation. "AAUW is interested in the advancement of education," she said, "and does something about it."

A vast improvement in teacher stability in communities was noted by Mrs. Neuberger. "Teachers used to always be on the move, she said, "now they have a place in the community." She said it had been brought about by such fringe benefits as retirement pay, accumulative sick leave and in some instances better minimum salaries.

Mrs. Neuberger was introduced by Mrs. William Green, chairman of the association's legislative committee.

Ohio Flood Loses Punch In Sweep Through Valley

POMEROY, Ohio (AP)—This village of 4,000, as accustomed to highwater as the next one, waited without any apparent excitement today as the Ohio River's latest eruption moved downstream.

It was hardly a flood—just high water. The Ohio's Sunday punch was spent, and nearly all the force that brought death and destruction upstream appeared to be gone.

The cold, muddy waters which had taken four lives Sunday in Pittsburgh were expected to invade only a few bottom lands in these parts.

Autumn rains tore the river from its banks Sunday in Pittsburgh and 400 families evacuated at Wheeling, W. Va. The crest at Wheeling was 44.7 feet, nearly 9 feet above flood stage.

Its flood force apparently spent, the river leaked into some lowlands downstream, where altered farmers had hastily picked their late corn. Occupants of lowland areas had cleared some basements but feared no first-floor damage.

CIO United Rubber Workers Sign Contract

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—CIO United Rubber Workers and B.F. Goodrich Rubber Co. Monday night signed a new master contract here extending through April 1, 1957. It covers working conditions at nine plants.

Negotiators did not outline the working conditions. They said only that wage scales were not involved. The old contract expired last Friday.

Goodrich, one of the nation's big four rubber producers, has its headquarters at Akron.

Oregon's Development Board Lists Results Of Its First Year Job

The Oregon Development Commission, established by the last session of the legislature at the suggestion of Governor Paul Peterson, has accomplished "a tremendous amount of organization, study and research" during the first year of its existence and has set the stage "for a comprehensive action program," according to the commission's first annual report submitted to the governor Saturday.

"Smokestacks don't sprout up overnight," Joseph W. Smith of Portland, commission chairman, commented in the report. "An intelligent program for the orderly development of the economy of the state must be based upon facts. We have accumulated many of these facts and have translated them into a sound program of action in the field of industrial development."

The report includes a recommendation that the legislature appropriate additional funds for increasing the staff, for carrying on an industrial advertising program and for a complete survey to pinpoint developmental potentialities of specific industries within the state.

Accomplishments Listed

The report highlights the commission's accomplishments as follows:

1. Assisted Consolidated Mining & Smelting company in obtaining information on available lower Columbia river sites for an ammonia plant that will represent an investment of approximately \$20,000,000 and employ nearly 300 persons. An option on a site at Columbia City has been taken by the company.

2. Assisted a chemical company, which has licensed a process developed by the Oregon Frost Products laboratory for the extraction of chemical derivatives from Douglas fir bark, in surveying the supply of raw materials and possible site locations. The commission anticipates the firm will announce plans for an Oregon plant soon.

3. Played a major role in having a jet plane squadron based at Klamath Falls airport. This will add approximately 800 civilian and military payrolls to the area.

4. Assisted in obtaining congressional approval of the Talent irrigation project near Medford.

5. In cooperation with the unemployment compensation commission, initiated a survey of all manufacturing establishments in Oregon for the purpose of securing a greater volume of government contracts and to stimulate local manufacturing.

The report said the commission's research program included examination of the potentialities for fuller utilization of forest resources, study of a more diversified agricultural economy and the possibility for further processing of farm products, a joint survey and evaluation of mineral deposits and reserves by the U. S. bureau of mines and the Oregon department of geology and mineral industries, study of possible commercial uses of surplus wheat stored by the commodity credit corporation and a preliminary study of business and industrial taxes.

Republicans Hold Very Slight Lead Over Democrats

SALEM (AP)—Republicans hold a narrow 404,694 to 402,283 lead in the number of registered voters for the general election, the State Elections Division announced Tuesday.

The total number of registered voters is 810,930, compared with 785,285 for last May's primary election, and 851,516 for the 1952 general election. That was the all-time high.

Since the primary election, the Democrats have gained 23,502 registered voters, while the Republican gain is only 9,773.

The totals include 3,904 Independents, 92 Progressives, 192 Prohibitionists, 120 Socialists, and 8,254 others.

Since the general election of two years ago, two counties switched from the Republican to the Democratic column. They are Douglas and Lincoln.

The Democrats gained registration in the past two years in Lincoln, Grant, Lake, Wasco, Wheeler and Curry counties. The Republicans gained only in Lincoln, Lake and Curry counties.

Half of the 38 counties have Democratic majorities, and half Republican.

Drunken Driving Charge Filed After Accident

A Myrtle Creek man was lodged in Douglas County jail early Tuesday morning following his arrest by state police on a drunken driving charge.

Robert Joe Pitchford was reported by state police to have rolled his car into a ditch 12 miles south of Roseburg about 1 a.m. Tuesday. Witnesses told investigating officers that Pitchford's vehicle was all over the road before it hit the ditch.

A man riding with him was taken to Myrtle Creek Hospital by Mohr Ambulance. The passenger, Jim Jeffers, was reported suffering from minor injuries.

State police said Tuesday that Pitchford had signed a statement that he had been drinking.

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Misleading Advertising On Health Plan Probed

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renewable only at option of the company and can be cancelled at the end of any term for any reason.

2. Extent of coverage. FTC said that, whereas benefits are advertised "for each sickness or accident," many policies pay nothing for losses due to nervous disorders, venereal disease, childbirth, dental operations and so on.

3. Maximum dollar limits. Advertising claims of "up to \$500 for each surgical operation" are deceptive in many cases, said FTC, because the full amount is payable for only one or two relatively rare operations.

4. Starting time of coverage. Although some companies represent insurance as being effective when issued, FTC said, coverage for many sicknesses is delayed until the policy has been in effect for a time—such as six months for tuberculosis or heart disease.

5. Health status of the insured. FTC charged many companies state they do not require medical examination, but fail to say the policy does not cover any loss traceable to a condition which existed when the policy was issued.

6. Sale of a plan. Some companies imply, FTC said, that many benefits are obtainable from purchase of a single policy for a few cents a day, when actually several policies are required to get all the advertised benefits.

7. Some advertisements offer regular monthly income "even for life," FTC charged, but only in cases of total disability due to accidental bodily injury are lifetime payments made.

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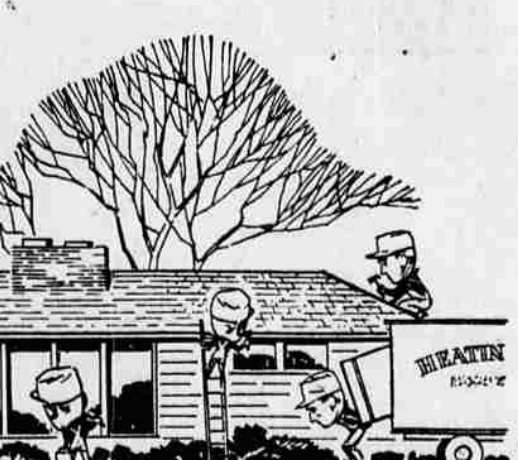
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
