

Highway Dept. Given Permission To Move Building

The Roseburg City Council Monday night approved waiving a setback regulation for the State Highway Dept. in regard to moving a building at local headquarters of the department.

A shift is being made at the location in the south part of Roseburg for better utilization of structures. In one spot the edge of the building will not be set back from the street as far as called for in city regulations.

In other council action, Lyle Glenn was appointed to the planning commission to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Lenora Housley.

The council approved establishment of a stop sign on the north-east corner of the intersection of Roberts and Jackson streets. Traffic westbound on Roberts will now have to stop at Jackson. The move is designed to give Rose School students more protection from cars speeding down Roberts.

A petition, bearing nine signatures and requesting an alley between Ella and Claire streets be opened up, was referred by the council to the street committee for a report at the next meeting.

A license for sale of beer for Roseburg Cafe was approved by the council. An application from Service, 501 N. Jackson St., is still to be studied by the council. Action is expected at next meeting, Nov. 1.

Education in the United States is an accepted fact. A child enters school at the age of six years and 12 years later is awarded a certificate of graduation with at least four years of higher education available to him if he desires it. If he does not want a university education, several other modes of furthering his knowledge is open to him. In any event, it is an accepted matter that he can obtain that education.

No so in Germany. The war-ravaged nation, only now rising out of the ravages of a generation under dictatorship, is beginning to make available to their young men and women the chance to obtain a university education. Men like Dr. Walter Rassmann, on a 90-day tour of the United States with a study group, are doing their utmost to enable German youth to obtain the education such as is available to American young people.

Dr. Rassmann, who spent several days in Glendale, is the head of Braunschweig Kolleg, near Hanover in Lower Saxony, an adult high school which prepares men and women for German universities. The college is in reality a high school, not to be compared with our colleges, since students who attend must take pre-college courses in order to pass entrance examinations to a university.

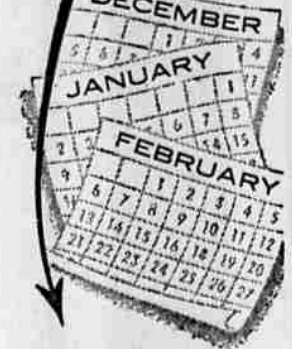
Pro-Neuberger Club Discusses Campaign Spur

A conference of Neuberger-for-Senator club members was held in Roseburg Sunday. Club leaders from Oregon's 4th Congressional Dist. met in the Council Chambers of City Hall for a near daylong session. The conference was held to exchange experiences and get ideas for intensifying the candidate's campaign according to Al Flegel.

Chairing the meet was Mrs. Edward Kelly of Medford, chairman of the Neuberger clubs in the district. Representatives from Corvallis, Eugene, Coos Bay, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford and Klamath Falls were present to discuss matters.

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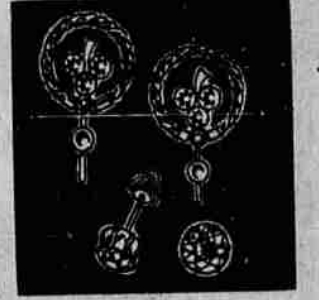
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
