ic leader Rayburn of Texas said his swings across the country have convinced him the voters will pick his party Nov. 2 to control the next Congress.

GOP national chairman Leonard W. Hall took the opposite view. He told a news conference in Indianapolis he's "more confident now than heretofore" of a Republican victory.

Hall said "the swing has been going our way" as a result of speeches by Eisenhower.

It was announced Tuesday that Eisenhower will add another talk to his pre-election schedule—a nationwide TV-radio political broadcast from Washington Oct. 23.

Vice President Nixon discussed federal security risk firings at a Republican rally in Philadelphia Tuesday night. He said a "left-wing clique" has tried to create the impression that the firings were for "inconsequential" reasons.

Nixon said a Civil Service Commission report showed that 70 State Department employees left their jobs while their files contained information allegedly indicating they were Communists or had Communist associations.

Of these 70, he said, 69 were holdovers from Democratic administrations and one a temporary employee.

A Douglas County Court order Tuesday approved acquisition of some small strips of land for widening a portion of Garden Valley Road, county clerk's records show.

Ten-foot strips were purchased from Hans T. and Hanna Hansen, Elton J. and Lenore Zuver and R. F. and Verner P. Denton for a total of \$420. The money will come from the general road fund.

School Planner Commends Riddle Administration

A. L. Beck, director of school-house planning for the State Dept. of Education, has written a commendation for the Riddle School board and administration.

The commendation is for development of a set of preliminary plans to solve immediate building needs and a long-range master plan.

The success of the immediate plans are dependent on the outcome of a \$195,000 bond issue to be decided by voters Oct. 25.

Beck points out, however, that proposed construction revealed in the preliminary plans will not meet the building problems for the "foreseeable future." But it will "solve immediate needs."

He went on to say that "projection of enrollment figures show a need for additional facilities in the near future."

Beck lauds particularly the designation of future office area and library as temporary classrooms and the attempt to meet requirements of a covered play area. He points out that the present situation is not good but will be remedied by new construction. He states that use of the present high school plant for elementary classes "creates a shortage of space for high school instruction."

10 Puerto Rican Reds Nabbed By FBI Agents

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department announced Wednesday that FBI agents in New York City and Puerto Rico have arrested 10 leaders of the Puerto Rican Communist Party on charges of seeking the violent overthrow of the government.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said the arrests would cripple the Communist apparatus in Puerto Rico. He said the group, which is not directly connected with the American Communist Party, has agitated, along with the Puerto Rican Nationalist group, for independence of the island commonwealth.

The police stepped in as Columbia Broadcasting System cameramen were filming the touring Maine Republican as she looked into a state-owned department store.

Mrs. Smith was whisked away from the scene as soon as her party was approached by an East German plain clothesman. She learned details of the incident only after she returned to Allied West Berlin.

Germany is one stop on Mrs. Smith's European tour, which will include a visit in the Soviet Union.

Ocean Liners Idled In Strike

LONDON (AP)—Striking dockers walked off the liners Queen Elizabeth and America at Southampton today, spreading the shipping paralysis that now threatens this island nation's food supplies.

Approximately 39,000 men—half Britain's waterfront working force—were out at London, Liverpool, Birkenhead, Hull and Southampton. Some union leaders striving to get the men back to work say the strike is being fomented by Communists.

Highway Section Reopened Tuesday

Traffic flowed once again over the new Deady-Winchester section of Highway 90 today. The stretch was reopened to north and south bound travel Tuesday at 4:15 p.m. It was closed by the Oregon State Highway Department Oct. 13 when a slide of disintegrated rock blocked the roadway.

Traffic was detoured for slightly more than one week over Old Highway 90. The slide occurred just northwest of Wilbur, when rock aloft a near 90-foot eastern cut in the mountain slid down on the roadway.

Engineer Carroll Keasey said this morning that an estimated 4,500 cubic yards of disintegrated rock was removed. The work was done by the J. C. Compton and C. C. Hall companies. The two firms have a contract with the state for paving the area from Deady to the South Umpqua River.

Oregon State Highway officials reported that no vehicles or pedestrians were found to have been caught by the slide. They also expressed the hope that no additional dirt would fall into the cut.

the posse, a non-profit corporation, assists in preserving law and order, aids in searches and helps promote the general welfare and administration of justice.

He claims further that only members of the corporation who hold commissions as deputy sheriffs can adequately render such assistance and perform such duties and that the defendants named in the action do not hold commissions.

The complaint states the sheriff has asked them to resign, and they refuse to do so. This materially hampers the work of the corporation (posse) and the work of the plaintiff in his duties as sheriff, it is alleged.

Baird concludes that the defendants cause confusion in the mind of the public by holding themselves out to the public as representatives of Douglas County and as agents or employees of the sheriff.

The main annual function of the posse is the Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, the 10th such spectacle being held last June. A. J. Farenbaugh is posse captain. G. W. Tipton heads the Mounted. There has been some talk as to whether the Sheriff's Posse or the new group would contract with the County Fair Board for sponsorship of next year's rodeo.

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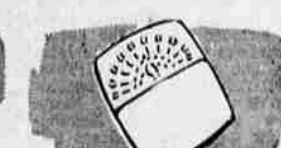

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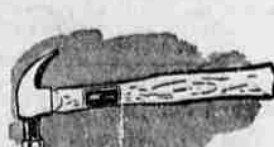
