

Questionnaires For Farm Census Go Out In Mail

Questionnaires for the 1954 census of agriculture are now in the mail. It was announced today by Field Supervisor Don C. Mole, Corvallis.

The questionnaires are being mailed from a central point with the distribution timed so that report forms will arrive about a week ahead of the date when enumerators will begin the field canvass. Advance mailing will prompt farm operators to consult their records before filling in answers required by the questionnaires. They should be ready for the census enumerators. This procedure is designed to insure greater accuracy of reporting and to save time for both farmer and enumerator when the latter calls at a farm.

The census questionnaire is designed to provide information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment, selected farm expenditures, farm values and mortgage debt.

On the average, each farmer will be asked about 100 questions, many of which may be answered simply "yes" or "no."

Justice Dept. Asks Interstate Segregation Ban

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department said Tuesday the time has come for the Interstate Commerce Commission to issue a flat ban on racial segregation of interstate travelers.

The department made its declaration in a "friend of the court" brief filed with the ICC, which is considering a complaint by the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People that many railroads maintain discriminatory regulations for handling white and Negro passengers.

Seven railroads named in the complaint also filed a joint brief Tuesday, contending that provisions of separate but equal accommodations for the two races does not violate any section of the interstate commerce act.

These railroads recently stated in connection with the proceeding that they do set aside separate coaches or portions of coaches for the exclusive occupancy of one race or the other.

They contended that the practice conforms to customs and laws of some of the states in which they operate.

Churchill Ready To Meet With Georgi Malenkov

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill said Tuesday he remains ready to meet Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov "at some agreed place on rendezvous if the right time and occasion is found."

The Prime Minister made the statement in the House of Commons in answer to Laborite questions.

Churchill said he and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden previously made it clear they are prepared to discuss world disarmament at any level "or to employ any other means which may best help us towards agreement on a safe and fair disarmament program and on other great issues."

ROBINSON FINED

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Edward G. Robinson Jr. was fined \$100 and placed on probation for a year after he pleaded guilty to a drunk charge.

The actor's son is to be tried Nov. 16 in Santa Monica Superior Court on two charges of armed robbery involving holdups of two taxicab drivers. He is at liberty on \$10,000 bond in that case.

Automobile Is Ditched In Clash With Deer

DAYTON, Ore. (AP)—A 140-pound buck deer sent an automobile careening into a ditch, where it caught fire, but both occupants escaped with scratches near here Monday night.

The deer, badly hurt, was killed by another motorist.

Mrs. Gustafson of Grand Ronde was driving. Her husband was riding in the front seat with her. The deer darted in front of the car which swerved and plunged into an embankment across a ditch, and broke into flames. The Gustafsons, thrown into the back seat, got out through a front door.

The deer was thrown into the ditch beside the burning car. It got to its feet, stumbled toward the flames and collapsed. The motorist dispatched him with a car jack. The car was destroyed.

Interest Must Be Paid On Delayed Payments

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that the State Highway Commission must pay interest to contractors when the commission delays payments to them.

The decision upheld Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson, Portland.

The suit against the commission was filed by C. F. Eldon, M. P. Hunter and James Wasco, all contractors.

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
