New Champ Faces Jail

Saxton Grabs Ring Title As Crowd, Officials Hoot

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Johnny Saxton won the welterweight title from Kid Gavilan last night. Today, with cries of "robbers" from the Gavilan camp echoing around him, Saxton went into court to face a possible 15-day sentence. He is charged with 12 traffic violations.

"I hope the judge will give me a break," said the 24-year-old New Yorker.

Gavilan insisted he got no breaks last night when a highly controversial unanimous 15-round decision relieved him of the 147-pound crown he had worn for 3 1/2 years.

While the referee and two judges were in accord and had Saxton the champion by the 12th round, Gavilan's camp charged the decision was a robbery. The 15-round decision relieved him of the 147-pound crown he had worn for 3 1/2 years.

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Districts To Be Decided In B-School Grid Contests



A bunch of big fat question marks pop into view as the Pacific Coast Conference settles down to the bulk of its circuit schedule. The biggest, of course, is the Rose Bowl.

Inter-sectional contests don't count in Rose Bowl bids, and those have taken up the bulk of the schedule so far. Most of the Coast teams have yet to meet each other.

Eight of the nine outfits tangle with Coast rivals Saturday. USC hosts California, Washington travels to Stanford, Washington State and Idaho tangle in their annual battle at Pullman, and mighty UCLA visits Oregon State. Oregon and independent San Jose State knock heads on the Ducks' home grounds.

Logical choice for the Rose Bowl would be the Uclans—if the rules would let them repeat their New Year's Day victory of 1954. They are undefeated and lead the circuit in six of 10 statistical categories.

Bigger Schools In Tough Tilts

District championships will be at stake in two B school football contests this weekend as the Douglas County grid season heads into the final two weeks of regular season play.

Baseball Suit Threat Of Would-Be A's Buyer

CHICAGO (AP)—The stock-buying syndicate of the Philadelphia Athletics, sweating out word of an American League blessing that day was threatened with a big damage suit by Arnold Johnson.

The Chicago industrialist declared he felt "wronged by the Philadelphia group who so suddenly appeared on the scene," and has placed the matter in the hands of a Philadelphia law firm to study the advisability of filing suit.

"In view of the indicated advance ticket sale in Kansas City of almost two million dollars, the measure of my damages should be substantial," Johnson said. "The suit would not only be for the cash damages sustained by me, but also on the grounds that this group joined together to induce a breach of the contract which I made in good faith for the purchase of the A's."

In a Chicago meeting nine days ago, American League club owners voted to shift the A's franchise from Philadelphia to Kansas City.

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PCC Bowl Bid May Be Settled In Heavy Action

 The crowding out of the one-famous Diamond Lake rainbow by the ever-increasing roach was beyond recall by 1946.

In that year, the Game Commission began analyses of comparative fish populations in the lake. The first nettings disclosed 94 roach to every rainbow captured. In 1951, the figure was 137 to 1, and the next year it had climbed to 248 to 1.

In 1952, an average of 400 roach was brought to the surface in each netting. No rainbow were caught that year, according to Bill Pitney, Roseburg, Game Commission biologist.

The prolific roach is not a vicious fish. Non-carnivorous, he grubs his living from the bottom of still waters. And the interminable grubbing brought about the end of the rainbow. The lake bottom was being cleared of food on which the now starving rainbow also must depend for life.

In 1946, an analysis of the bottom showed 292 pounds of food per acre. By 1952, that had dropped tragically to 2.3 pounds.

Legal Size Planted
 The Game Commission had stocked the lake annually with fry through 1948. There was no planting in 1949. In the next three years, 50,000 legal-sized rainbow were stocked annually. In 1953, that was cut to 30,000, and in that year, fishermen caught only about 5,000 in return. One year, 37,000 fish had been caught.

Portland Aids Investigation

PORTLAND (AP) — The University of Portland gave full cooperation in an inquiry which led to a reprimand from the NCAA executive council, the athletic director said Wednesday, and now regards the case as "almost a closed incident."

The council scolded the school for holding what it said were tryouts of 11 prospective basketball players under the direction of head coach Art McLarney.

Athletic Director Ed Fiene described the sessions last April as "not exactly tryouts," but said "it's certainly not going to happen again."

"We had taken corrective action prior to the council's inquiry and gave them complete cooperation," Fiene said. "So therefore it is almost a closed incident."

Portland University was one of four schools cited in the NCAA report Wednesday. Western Illinois State College also was reprimanded. The University of Miami (Fla.) and City College of New York were suspended for one year.
