each leaf representing an "H". The pledge is: "I pledge my head to clearer thinking; my heart to greater loyalty; my hands to larger service; my health to better living—for my club, my community and my country."

There are 706 girls in the county who are devoting their interest and projects to better living, home economics, food preparation, clothing, food preservation, camp cooking and homemaking. There are 9 of the girls who have selected beef as their project and 27 girls who have selected dairying and 41 girls have selected sheep. Sheep growing is major in Douglas County, which probably accounts for this interest on the part of the girls. There are 17 of the Douglas County 4-H Club girls who have selected poultry as their project and 6 selected swine.

The 472 boys who are members of the Douglas County 4-H Clubs select livestock, beef, dairy, sheep, swine, rabbits, poultry, tractor maintenance and electrical. There is a beginning interest in forestry. There are 41 of the boys who have selected cooking as their projects.

The projects that are completed by the county 4-H Club members are shown at the Douglas County fair which is held the latter part of August. These projects are judged by competent judges who also make the awards to the project winners. The displays by the 4-H Club members have always been one of the most interesting and attractive exhibits at this annual fair.

## Porter, Ellsworth Will Meet At Candidates' Fair

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Porter did not campaign or debate because his record was "undefeatable."

Porter cited a record of voting compiled by the American Federation of Labor on "30 significant" issues. He said Ellsworth voted "wrong" 29 times and was absent for the 30th vote.

Porter said the record showed Ellsworth had "no interest in the average family." He said the incumbent had always voted against public housing, Point 4 and reciprocal trade, federal crop insurance, tax exemptions for individuals and had "gone along" with the "give-away" of offshore oil and atomic energy.

The Democratic candidate also scoffed at Ellsworth's accomplishments for the state of Oregon.

He led off on the Talent Reclamation Project on the Rogue River. He called it an "election-year gimmick." He said: (1) It follows the Democratic pattern; (2) it is only authorized, and no appropriations have been made; and (3) it was an "investment" and not a partnership of the type GOP candidates have been thumping for in this campaign. Beside these criticisms Porter said Ellsworth didn't even write the bill.

Turning to the timber exchange bill, Porter said it was "opposed by every conservation group in the nation." He said "even the head of this county's Republican Central Committee, Gen. Curtis T. Beecher, was against it."

Porter said the bill, which has been turned down in the House, favored the "big operators," as does the timber access road bill.

Porter also severely criticized Ellsworth again for his part in the Al Sarena mining claim patent grant and for standing by for the "scuttling" of BPA.

For his own platform, Porter said he would work for individual income tax reductions and a plan along the lines of the FHA pattern for offering loans to the smaller and medium sized timber operator. "We should maintain the competition represented by small and medium-sized operators," he said.

## Roach Given 15 Years In State Penitentiary

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mony in trying to establish an alibi.

Roach's father, who also was on the stand, was criticized by the judge, who said Roach hadn't hid any parental care and had been shielded too much. The testimony of the father and of Roach's young friends also was false, Wimberly said.

The judge went on to say that all persons who testified falsely in order to help establish an alibi for the defendant were "guilty of perjury," as well as anyone who might have urged them to give such testimony.

Roach did not make a statement on his own behalf, but his attorney, William H. Jones, asked the court to take into account the youth of the defendant. He related a familiar story of a boy getting into trouble at the early age of 13, and so forth.

Stults pointed out that Roach had been previously convicted of two felonies and had served time in the state prison after conviction in Klamath County.

Before sentencing, the judge carefully reviewed the history of the case and the defendant's trial. He said it "doesn't take a handwriting expert to see" the \$30 check in question was forged.

Roach was accused of forging and passing a check on Pacific Seafood Co. in July. Irene Winzer, whose name appeared on the check as payee, testified she had not written it.

## Cancer Producing Substance In Fags Can Be Removed

NEW YORK — A researcher says there is a way to eliminate a reported cancer-producing substance in smoke from cigarette paper.

H. J. Rand, head of a Cleveland research organization, told a news conference here Thursday that his experiments show that treatment of cigarette paper with ammonium persulfate would prevent formation of benzpyrene, the reported cancer-causing element.

Existence of the benzpyrene in smoke from cigarette paper was reported almost simultaneously Thursday by Rand and D. V. Lefemine, chemist at the Cancer Institute, Miami.

Lefemine said the benzpyrene, which causes cancer in mice, has proved in animal experiments to be one of the most powerful known cancer-producing agents.

Rand said that while there had been some criticisms of his findings on the treatment of cigarette paper, there were "good prospects" that some cigarette companies will start treating paper with the chemical.

## Double Funeral Planned For Accident Victims

Double funeral services will be held in Grants Pass Saturday for Clark Woodley, 85, of Grants Pass and his son, Earl H. Woodley, 53, of Dufur. Both men were killed instantly Wednesday morning when a load of logs fell from a passing log truck, crushing their car. Critically injured in the accident was the younger Woodley's wife, Depha, 51, who is in Sacred Heart Hospital, Medford.

Mrs. Woodley, a sister of Mrs. Ralph Pace, Glendale, was en route to her home in Dufur with her husband and father-in-law when the accident occurred. Hull and Hull, Grants Pass, is in charge of arrangements.

PORTLAND — Mrs. Fred J. Toole, Portland, who has headed the Oregon Woman's Christian Temperance Union since 1941, was re-elected at the annual meeting here Thursday.

## Italians May Permit Burial For Mussolini

ROME — Newspaper dispatches here Friday indicated the Italian government may finally have decided to permit public burial of Benito Mussolini.

These reports said the former dictator's widow, Donna Rachele, and his youngest son, Romano Mussolini, have hurried to his birthplace to examine a tomb prepared for a final resting place. Their trip suggested that the secrecy may soon be lifted from the nine-year mystery of what happened to Mussolini's body after he and his mistress, Claretta Petacci, were shot by partisans and hanged by their heels at a filling station outside Milan in 1945.

Presumably only the government, and perhaps the Roman Catholic Church, know where the body has been hidden. The government has kept the place secret for fear Fascists might make a shrine of his tomb.
